





superintendent and secretary of the commission, said removal of the silt-is part of the general improvement of the area. He said the pond will be approximately three feet deep and that it would be restored for recreational use. Mr. Cron, noted that he commission has been landscaping the banks of the

pond. Mr. Cron also said that the dam, which broke last August, will be repaired. He reported that the com-_mission - has - received proximately \$7,000 from the Office of Emergency Preparedness for the repairs.

The removal of the silt and improvements will make Bloodgood's Pond more attractive for the public.

Court Reverses Decision


Against Funeral Home The State Appellate Court in Trenton ruled last Friday that Superior Court Judge Milton A. Feller in Elizabeth

was correct when he reversed the Rahway Municipal Council's refusal to grant a variance which would permit James Jones of 602 Maple Avenue to operate a funeral home at 247 Elm The decision ended a four-year battle by Mr. Jones to

obtain the variance. He started his quest in April 1968 when he applied to the Board of Adjustment for a variance. His request was denied by the board on May 21. Mr. Jones then won a suit in Superior Court, but he failed to obtain the desired variance. He filed suit in the fall of 1968 and was represented by David Ravich of the Rahway law firm of Shevick & Ravich. In April 1969 Judge Feller decided Mr. Jones was entitled

to the variance and ordered the Board of Adjustment to recommend to the Council that the variance be granted. Judge Feller noted that all funeral homes in the city were operating under variances and that in 1966 a variance had been given to Corey & Corey Funeral Home for their place of business at 259 Elm Avenue The board recommended the variance be granted to Mr

Jones but Council failed to act until October 1969 when ordered to do so by Judge Feller. The Council voted, 5-4, on Oct. 14, 1969, to deny the variance. Mr. Jones then renewed his court battle in November 1969 by filing suit in Superior Court against the Council, charging that the governing body had acted arbitrarily, capriciously and unreasonably when it refused to grant the variance. The variance request was remanded t council with instructions to specify reasons for the denial The Appellate Division of Superior Court then took jurisdiction in the matter. When the Council voted, 0-3, last Sept. 13 to deny the variance, Mr. Jones had his case taken to the Appellate Court.

Senkowsky and Wilson Beauregard, First Ward Councilman J. Milton Grans and Dr. Adam T. McDaniel, Fourth Ward councilman, killed the measure, Favoring introduction of the ordinance were Mrs. Esther Forsythe,

The ordinance noted that public lands of the city, in--cluding the Rahway Public Library property, streets and parks are subject to flooding, and that landfill operations on properties abutting the Rahway River and its tributaries "pose the possibility of increased flooding to other properties. Steps to prevent or correct flood problems have not been taken because of the complex issues involved and "extensive information, expert advice and mature delibera-

tion' are needed, according to the ordinance. Councilman Donovan spoke in favor of the ordinance and showed a map defining the areas where filling and excavating would be prohibited He said that less than onefourth of the city would be affected by the ban on construction. Councilman Crowell stated

that he is opposed to the proposed ordinance, declaring that under the moratorium terms no one could build any structure or improve their property. He exhibited a map which he said shows that 32 percent of the city would be affected by the ordinance nrovisions. Dr. McDaniel also stated

On Measuring Economic Systems The only way to compare private enterprise with

socialism is to use a unit of value by which both systems can be measured. The best measure, we feel, a the length of time of the light worker must put in o obtain the commodities of everyday life. A New York research organization, America's Puture, Seck Papers Inc., has come up with the following figures, based on 1967 through 1969. Here is what it found: To obtain a pound of bread in New York, an American must work six minutes. In Moscow he must work 12 minutes. An American must work 24 minutes for a pound of sirloin steak, a Russian must work two hours and 12 minutes. The New Yorker requires only two minutes' labor to buy a pound of potatoes, the Russian requires nine. The American needs two minutes for a bar of soap, the Muscovite takes 25 minutes. With larger items the differences are more notable.

To buy a cotton shirt, the American works less than an -- 59 minutes. The Russian must work for 11 hours and 28 minutes. A business suit costs the American 13 hours and 22 minutes, the Russian a staggering 196 hours and 39 minutes. An automatic washing machine in New York requires 53 hours' work. In Moscow it takes 204 hours. The average American must work 57 hours for a black and white television set, the Russian, 695 hours, i.e. a U-nour week for four months. Apart from the priceless consideration of freedom, the material superiority of private enterprise over the socialist system is apparent. Strange, isn't it, that some people still want to exchange the free market for

The Least Reported of Crimes

Rape is the least reported of all crimes according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. In 1970, 37,270 rapes were reported, and an estimated four or five times that number were committed. One reason for the failure to report this crime consists in the difficulty to meet the requirements or proor demanded by the laws of some states. New York State law, for example, provides that every material element of a rape must be corroborated by evidence other than the victim's testimony. New York's corroboration rule is by far the most stringent in the



The main building is of substantial poured concrete construc-, which would cost about 50,000 to build today. The second building is a large three-bay garage with a full cellar to be used for police and Civil Defense vehicles and to house the traffic bu-

reau's sign shop. The land has 400 feet of ontage on Central Avenue. 165 feet of frontage on Hamilton Street and a 100-foot depth at its west end. Mayor Martin said that work has started on preparation of plans for conversion

The policy requires the superintendent of schools to submit a recommendation by May 1 on employment of full-time staff members who will reach their 70th birthday anniversary during the next fiscal year. The recommendation will state whether the staff member should be required to retire on the first day of the month following the anniversary month or be permitted to continue until the end of the year. The policy is in accord with state law which permits teachers to continue their classroom work until the age_of_70, if they receive board approval.




