result of the necessity to contorni to a court order requiring then: to be equal in population, Union county, which constructed one congressional district for decades, was dismembered several years ago, Rahway, Linden and Ell-zabeth were placed in the 13th congressional District with part of fludson County--Bayone, and five wards of Bayonne and five wards of Jersey City. The remainder of Union County was thrown into the 12th District with municipalities com rising the western part of Essex County.

Rahway's dismemberment, outlined in a series of re-districting bills introduced in the Legislature, was fough in Frenton by Assemblyman HerbertH, Kiehn of Rahway, Objections were raised by Assemblyman Kiehn, a Republican, to Senate Bill 744, which was favored by the Republicans,

Under the provisions of that bill, most of Rahway would be placed in the 12th District, A portion of Rahway would be severed from the main part of the city and tossed into the 15th Diswinfield and Middlesex County. The bill also would separate Hillside from the remainder of Union County and attach it to some Essen

County municipalities to form the 11th District. Assemblyman Kiehn objected on the floor of the Legislature to bills which would divide Rahway and place part with Middlesex

County. "Rahway should be kept intact in Union County where it belongs, Assemblyman Kichn declared, He abstained from soting on Bill No. 744.
