The Union County Environ-mental Health Advisory Committee's request that the City of Rahway declare a City of Rahway declare a moratorism on construction within the city limits was rejected last week by Mayor Daniel L. Martin.

The committee's request was made to Rahway and other municipalities in an effort to lessen the possibility of more flooding caused by building on flood plains. Mayor Martin, in a letter read by the committee during a meeting in the Union County Annex in Westfield, said the moratorium would have little consequence for Rahway since most of the flooding in the Rahway-River basin originates in municipalities upstream from the city.
