The resignation of Lawrence E. Pratt of 363 E. Lake Avenue, Rahway, as a member of the Board of Education was accepted by the board "with regret" at its meeting on Monday night in Roosevelt School, Rahway. The resignation is effec-tive May 1, Mr. Pratt's lct-

city resident. The vote to accept the resignation was unanimous. Mr. Pratt was elected to a three-year term on the board at the elction of February 1971. Last February he was elected vice president of the board and was appointed chairman of the athletics committee.
