Council Will Meet With Teamsters About Agreement Municipal Council and -diree-60P councilman, Mrs representatives of Local 286 Forsythe, Mr. Voynik and

of the Teamsters Union; bargaining agent for the public works and water department -employees-of the city, will meet on Monday at 7 p.m. in City Hall in an effort to reach an agreement on a contract.

Council President Charles E. Crowell announced that the meeting between city officials and the union representatives would be held next Monday after the Council at its meeting on Monday night rejected a resolution approving an agreement. The vote was 6-2.

Voting against the resolution were four Republican councilmen, Mrs. Esther Forsythe, Richard J. Voy-+ nik, Peter M. Donovan and fames R. Pickens, and two Democratic councilmen, Francis R. Senkowsky and Mr. Crowell. The agreement was favored by Dr. Adam T. Ac Daniel and Wilson D leauregard, Democrats. Objections to the proposed greement between the ciry and the union centered on a provision for payment of 5,000 to the union by the city. The money would be used_to_provide_dental_care_

for employees covered by the agreement. Mayor Daniel L. Martin revealed that the proposed agreement would give emloyees a wage increase of approximately 5 1/2% and noted that the total amount of the increase had been appropriated in the 1972 city Third Ward Councilman Voynik expressed concern

about the money to be used for dental treatment and about future demands which might be made by the union. He added that the city would pay a lump sum to the union and that administration would be in the union's hands. Councilman Voynik stated

that he would prefer to see the \$5,000 included in the bargaining for wages. 'I don't want to make Rahway a pacesetter in such matters as dental care for employees," Councilman Voynik commented.

Councilman - at - large Beauregard said that rejection of the proposed agreement by the governing body would mean a return to the bargaining table. He suggested that the mayor select which councilmen he would like to continue the bargaining with the union.

Councilman Voynik said none of the councilmen were consulted by the city's negotiators during the bargaining sessions. He pointed out that the bargaining was done by Business Administrato Robert W. Schrof, City Attorney Richard Comerford and Joseph Hartnett, executive secretary to Mayor Martin.

An ordinance establishing ranges for salaries of officers and other employees of the city was adopted by a 5 - 3 vote. Casting ballots against the measure were

New Drain Approved By Council

Construction of a storm drain at Harold Avenue and Valley Road, Rahway, was approved by the Municipal Council on Monday night when it adopted an ordinance by unanimous vote despite an objection to financing the project as a general improvement.

The cost of the project estimated at \$19,000, will be borne by all taxpayers of the city instead of the property owners who benefit from the improvement.

Alonzo W. Lawrence of 1343 Madison Avenue, preaident of the Rahway Taxpayers Association, declared that \$19,000 "represents quite a few tax points." He said one - third of the cost should be paid by property owners who benefit from the Mr. Lawrence added that

The Clark residents indicted by the jury were Louis Wollman, former chairman of the township's Board of djustment, and Thomas Parrillo, who is a former Clark Democratic chairman. Mr. Kinneally, who was indicted earlier this year as a result of a grand jury probeof Rahway municipal affairs, was indicted last week on harges of bribery, extortion, conspiracy to commit oribery and attempted briperv. The indictment charges Mr. Kinneally demanded a \$10,000 payoff on various dates in September and October of 1971 in order to elp dispose of problems delaying granting of the variance sought by Billnan. Mr. Wollman was indicted on three charges of perjury, false swearing and conspiracy to obstruct justice. He was chairman of the Board of Adjustment when the Billnan Fifteen case was heard. Mr. Wollman served on the board until this spring when the Clark Council appointed James Flood whenMr.Wollman's term expired. Mr. Parrillo faces 30 counts of perjury, conspiracy and extortion. Board Votes, 5-4, to Hire Counsel

after Dr. Sprowls and Mr. McDowell left the meeting in an in Roosevelt School auditorium to retain Stewart M. Hutt of effort to prevent Mr. Rizzo's appointment, Mr. Eahn ruled at the time that a quorum was not present and that no business could be conducted. A petition asking Dr. M. rburger to set aside the appointment of Mr. Rizzo was filed by Dr. Sprowls, Mr. Beckhusen, Mr. McDowell and Mr. Keefe. They declared that the appointmen

was "void, illegal, ultra-vires, of no force and effect, and was arbitrary, capricious, and unreasonable, and in-violation of the oaths taken by those members who voted in favor of said appuintment_ The peritions maintain the appointment was in violation of state statute and in disregard of the board's by-laws. Mrs. Dorothy Schleifer of 1183 film terrace questioned th appointment of Mr. Hutt as special counsel, arguing that the taxpayers would be put to extra expense when they already

are paying for a board attorney. Mr. Kahn replied that he is paid a retainer by the board but that he would receive additional congensation for representing the board in any litigation. He explained that since he had given the opinion in public that the board lacked auorum when Mr. Rizzo was appointed a member, he could not argue now to have Mr. Rizzo retained on the board. Dr. Sprowls commented that it is "ironic" that the taxpayers will have to pay to retain counsel after the board attorney had

'ruled the action illegal' and that the petitioners will have to hire counsel at their own expense. Mr. Kernan told Dr. Sprowls that the situation and expense could have been avoided "if you had stayed around."

Dr. Sprowls than said he had attempted to change the date of the regular meeting scheduled for May 15 because of religious ceremony on that day and had been unsuccessful. Dr. Sprowls declared that Mr. Higgins, Mr. Boch, Mr. Kerna and Mr. LoRocco "knew we would leave if they brought up" the question of an appointment. Dr. Sprowls added that "everything of a business nature" had been acted upon by the time he and Mr. McDowell left the meeting. had been mentioned. He named them as Mrs. Elizabeth Davis and Mr. Rizzo. Mrs. Davis was a candidate for election to the board last February when Mr. Rizzo was seeking reelection. Mr. Rizzo received the highest number of votes among the defeated candidates.
