been_anticipated and included in the 1972-73 budget when it was prepared last January. Mr. Nash provided the Mr. Boch expressed an-

oyance at receiving the 971-72 budget report just pefore Monday night's meetng. Mr. Boch said he injuired <u>about the surplus</u> funds last Wednesday and last Thursday and did not eceive them at that time The board defeated the motion to direct the superintendent to prepare an exnlanation for the large surolus by a 6-2 vote. The only votes for the motion were cast by Mr. Boch and Mr. Kernan. Opposed were Dr Sprowls, Mr. LoRocco, Jo-

seph L. Keele, Eric F Beckhusen, Harry W. Mc-Cowell and Louis R. Rizzo. The surplus of \$283,442 represents approximately 47 tax points in the city tax

Dr. Sprowls said he would ask Mr. Nash to prepare a report on the budget expenditures to determine the reasons for the large sur-Mr. Nash commented that

he did not anticipate the size of the surplus and that he was 'astounded' when he was informed on Monday afternoon.

In explanation of budges procedures, Mr. Nash staed that the actual budget excenditures of the previous fiscal year are included in the budget as well as amounts appropriated during the past year and the present year. "No one is being deceived by the budgets," Mr. Nash declared.

The school superintendent said that all of the surplus not required to pay the outstanding bills could be invested for various periods and then, if the money still is not needed at the end of the investment term, re-

invested by the board. An attempt by a resident to discuss the controversy involving the appointment of Mr. Rizzo to the board was blocked. Leo Kahn, board attorney, advised board members not to comment on the case since it is before the state commissioner of education.

Mr. Rizzo was appointed by four members at the May meeting to fill a vacancy. The appointment was made after two members left the meeting, thus leaving the board without a quorum. Four other board members have challenged the appointment of Mr. Rizzo in a petition to the commission-


