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Equal rights amendment has nothing but woe for America's women

How can something that sounds so desirable be in fact so undesirable?

This is what many people are asking with regard to the proposed 27th amendment to the United States constitution misnamed the equal rights amendment.

Allowing no time for opposition arguments the New Jersey legislature has passed the amendment. It is highly unlikely that the Senate administration will support ratification. Nevertheless it is instructive to note some of the rights which women stand to lose under equal rights legislation.

According to Professor Paul Freund of Harvard Law School under ERA a wife who is a mother would be deprived of her right to be supported by her husband unless she has pre-school children. Even in that event she would lose that right should child-care centers be available. Note that by mandating equality of responsibility for family support ERA would be dictating an entirely new principle, which would be contrary to the law of every state in the union but also to that of the Bible wherein the husband is made responsible for the care and feeding of his wife.

Of course, not ERA but any other law could possibly make all women equal to all men in the job market. A girl who marries and spends 15 to 20 years raising a family is not going to be competition for men who have been moving up in the labor force for two decades. Thus under ERA a woman would be left with the heaviest, hardest jobs as is her counterpart in the Soviet Union.

According to the International Documentation and Information Center (Interdoc) published in the Netherlands, women in Russia are employed in literally backbreaking jobs such as road construction, maintenance of railroad tracks and in the building industry. Understandably the Soviet press is flooded with complaints about the heavy burden of household responsibilities imposed on the working wife.

Practical results of equal rights legislation may be observed in the case of Massachusetts. There the voters approved an amendment to the state constitution with the same wording as the federal ERA. The state attorney general compiled a list of 227 state laws which had to be modified because of their home-grown ERA, and in January 1973 Senator Newton L. Stearns, Jr. introduced 50 bills into the legislature to bring Massachusetts' laws into conformity with it.

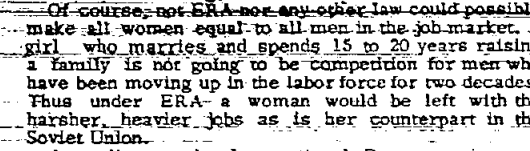
For example every law mentioning the word "woman" or "female" or "girl" had to be changed to "person," "husband" and "wife" had to be replaced with "spouse."

One law made a wife criminally liable for the support of her husband, exactly as she has traditionally been for her support. Another made a wife liable for her husband's debts, as he is for hers, even though he may have deserted her and left behind the children for her to raise. Still another deferred the prosecution of a wife's property "right" to her husband's estate, thereby equalizing alimony, so a wife could be required to pay alimony to her ex-husband. A fifth authorized the court to require a wife to make weekly support payments to her husband and children.

One bill made women automatically part of the state militia with no exceptions for pregnant women or women with small children and no provision for separate barracks or facilities.

Is this what the fathers and mothers of America want for their daughters? Do men and children for the women they cherish deserve the kind of discrimination the sexes are innumerable ERA radicals screaming for total equality of the sexes had better re-study their sixth grade biology textbooks.

Dr. Annamaria Binco, professor of neurology at Yale Medical School has predicted that the equal rights amendment and many of the other goals of its proponents would bring social disruption, unhappiness and increasing rates of divorce and desertion. Weakening of family ties may also lead to increased rates of alcoholism, suicide and possibly some mental disorders. But apparently America's radicals couldn't care less.

Federal railroad plan would cost NJ jobs

The federal government's proposed northeast railroad reorganization, which would sharply reduce freight and passenger service in New Jersey, poses a serious threat to the economy and job market of our area.

I am particularly concerned about the potential loss of access to Port Elizabeth and Newark, the world's foremost container port, that would be caused by impairment of a recommendation from the United States Department of Transportation (DOT) to eliminate the High Bridge branch of the Jersey Central Railroad. That rail line is now providing the Erie Lackawanna Railroad with access to the port.

As a result I am launching a concerted effort to prevent acceptance of the DOT recommendations by the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC).

In addition to registering my strong objections with the ICC's rail service planning office, which is currently reviewing the DOT recommendations, I will furnish data to demonstrate a vital need to retain and maintain service on this and other rail lines in New Jersey. I will be submitting this material as testimony in the rail service planning office.

Testimony by New Jersey state transportation and labor officials at a recent hearing in Trenton has confirmed my worst fears about the potential adverse impact on our economy and job market as well as rail service.

Abandonment and partial elimination of rail service would have a devastating impact on the people and economy of New Jersey.

GOP women told Rahway government is costly

The irresponsible spending policies of the Rahway administration of Mayor Daniel Martis are important reasons why Rahway taxpayers should support the public city candidates in the November election, Republican chairman James Toliver said at a meeting of the Rahway-Westfield Republican Club.

The fact is that the city has the highest per capita income in the county. Thirty-seven percent of every Rahway dollar is spent for city hall purposes, Toliver said. He said that the city's budget is \$10 million, and that the city is spending \$1 million more than it receives in taxes.

Rahway has its own Horatio Alger story in 19th century career of G. O. Tingley

The stories created by Horatio Alger, describing a climb from poverty to wealth, have been perhaps the most haunting stories in the history of our country.

Rahway from rags to riches has since been the dream of many young entrepreneurs in all parts of our nation. In 1898 Rahway came up with its own Horatio Alger prototype in the person of Charles O. Tingley.

During the latter portion of the 1800s it was when a bicycle craze was at its height, Tingley was an associate of the bicycle craze. He had immediate success in the bicycle business.

Mr. Tingley himself was quite a bike rider traveling a busy route between Rahway and New York, New Jersey and Buffalo, N.Y.

By 1908 a new means of transport came on the scene which put Mr. Tingley in business. He used his Yankee ingenuity and modified his prototype to produce a new automobile.

He sold his daughter, married William McCollum, and took him as an associate.

The business grew and the new York-New York Road Street near St. George Avenue was built and W.P. Newark, Mr. Tingley retired in 1910. He was a business man and a manufacturer over a million dollars.

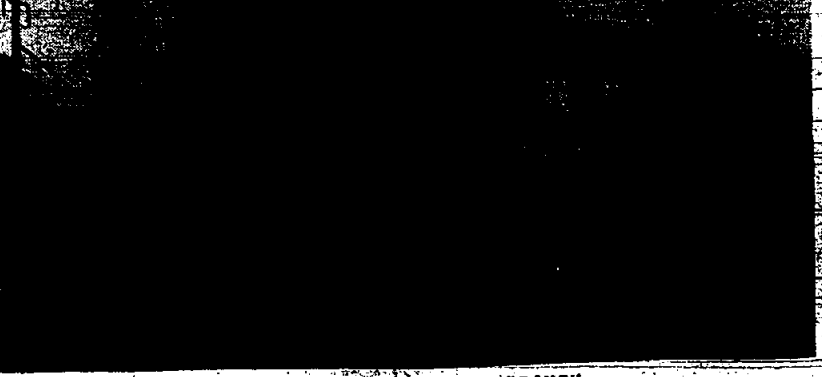

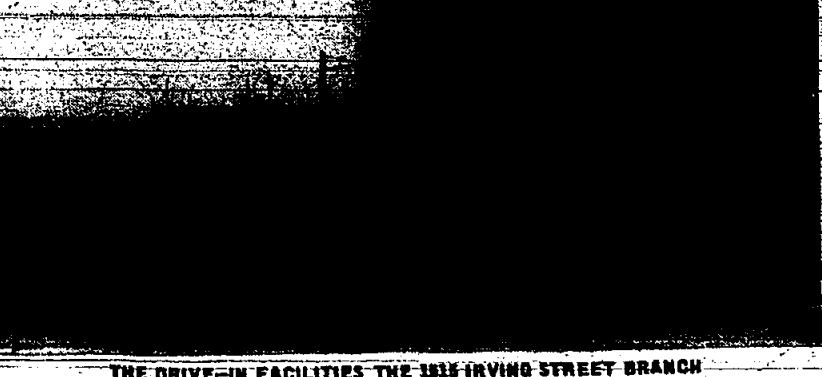

At a directors meeting on March 16, 1960, the first mortgage loan was granted. The property was appraised at \$4,500 and a \$2,000 trustee's trust loan was granted. A period of 60 days was allowed for the loan to be repaid. The white oak was cut and 5700 when the hour was called.

Of course the association was too small for a full-time office, so it was necessary to borrow an office and keep open only a few hours a week for the collection of accounts. The first office was that of C. B. Gehring at 149 Irving Street. In 1935 the association changed to the Citizens National Bank Building at the corner of Cherry and Irving Streets and later to the new National Bank Building in July 1937.

The association grew to a bank of \$200,000 assets in January 1931, but the depression came along making it difficult for some of our mortgagees to make their payments. As a result, it was necessary to lower the dividend to 2% in 1932. Assets continued to decline until a low of \$175,000 was reached in December 1938. Assets have increased since that time.

On August 7, 1935 a new constitution was adopted. This constitution permitted the granting of direct reduction loans. Serial loans were discontinued.

On February 7, 1940 the end of the first year was celebrated from January 15 to December 31. In the same year the association bought the mortgage portfolio of the Citizens Building and Loan Association of Rahway which was being liquidated. In December 1941 the new constitution was amended to provide for the retention of savings and investments.

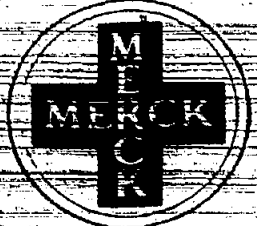

In 1973 Merck and Company, Incorporated celebrated its history of 70 years of growth with the community of Rahway. It was in 1903 that the company started up alkaloid manufacturing operations in a small brick building on a 150-acre tract of wooded land north of East Street Avenue. The firm's headquarters at that time were in New York, and the Rahway plant along with the purchase of a St. Louis-based chemical manufacturing company were among the first stirrings of growth for what has become one of the world's largest pharmaceutical manufacturing companies.

The physical contrast between the Merck plant of the early 1900s and the plant of today are dramatic. The small structure that stood isolated in the middle of a wooded area has given way to a modern production, research and development headquarters complex consisting of some 150 major buildings spread over 400 acres. Major products produced at the plant today include bulk pharmaceuticals, animal health and nutrition products and industrial agricultural and fine chemicals. About 3,000 persons

many of them Rahway residents, are employed at the Rahway site. In terms of financial growth, Merck's sales and earnings for 1973 reached record highs. For the first time sales exceeded \$1 billion, rising by 16% to \$1,115,322,000 compared with \$956,266,000 for the corresponding period of 1972. Net income was \$178,443,000 or \$2.40 per common share up 21% from \$147,556,000 or \$1.99 per share for 1972.

Continuing its growth to meet rising demand for existing major products and accommodate new products, the company committed itself in 1973 to the highest level of construction of new facilities in its history.

New construction planned at the Rahway site includes a project to expand the company's bulk chemical facilities. The multimillion-dollar project will be completed in 1975, will increase the company's total production of the chemical by more than 40%. This benzazole, a Merck discovery, is used in various different formulations as an anthelmintic (wormer) for livestock and as a fungicide and molluscicide in shrimp as well as a fungicide for plant agriculture.

In December Merck also announced plans for a new 41,000-square-foot building to be built at the Rahway site. The structure will be attached to a 4,000-square-foot warehouse complex. The building is scheduled for completion in the next few months.

While the firm can boast of 70 years of common history, the Rahway plant has origins that span over two centuries. Although not presently affiliated with the German firm E. Merck, the Rahway plant center is where with that company's heritage that dates back more than 300 years to a small apothecary acquired in 1668 by Frederick Jacob Merck in Darmstadt, Germany.

The Merck name became identified with the manufacture of the chemicals in 1827, when Friedrich Emanuel Merck, who had taken over the pharmacy a decade earlier, under-

took the first commercial manufacture of morphine. By 1856 the German firm had achieved an international reputation as a supplier of chemicals for medicinal uses.

The import of Merck into the United States began in 1887 when E. Merck established a "branch office" in New York City to sell pharmaceuticals. The firm manufactured in Germany.

Four years later Merck was established as an American partnership between George Merck, son of the head of E. Merck, and the former manager of the German company's New York City office.

In 1900 the company acquired the original 150-acre tract for its Rahway plant site and three years later manufacturing operations began.

The plant's early history is not well documented. One Merck employee who worked at the plant in the early 1900s completed the construction of the building in 1903. He said that the first building was a chicken house which was used to rear a flock of turkeys for the Merck family. The building was later converted into a warehouse and for some time afterwards it was used as a warehouse for the company's products.

The rural scene was gradually transformed however as manufacturing facilities were expanded to produce a growing list of chemicals for medicinal, nutritional and other applications. Within a few years Merck became one of the leading producers of a number of important products including a comprehensive list of prescription chemicals.

In 1908 the company was incorporated in New York State. In the years that followed business expanded steadily. In 1911 a Canadian branch office was opened in Montreal and by 1918 the company's sales had reached \$9,000,000.

Amalgamation with E. Merck ended in 1918 when George Merck voluntarily signed over to the United States government shares of stock representing interests that

represented interests that treatment producers and machinery, signs and related products. In 1968, the more Alcolac Company, a manufacturer of equipment for the chemical and pharmaceutical industries, was acquired. In 1972, the company acquired the chemical pollution control, Hubbard Farms, Incorporated, a firm engaged in or in the application of harvesting help and man-poultry genetics to the

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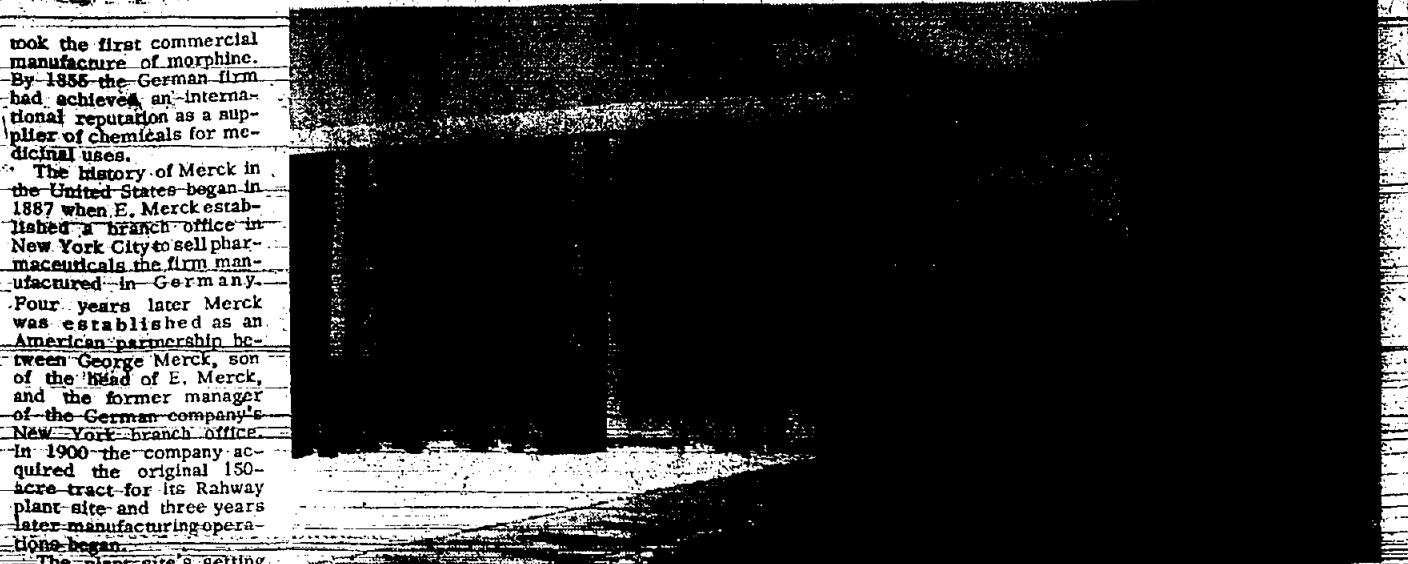

Rahway, like many cities of its age, with a history of rapid growth and expansion, was faced with several major areas in need of redevelopment. If we think of a city's blight or a neighborhood's blight as a disease or cancer of depreciation, perhaps we can obtain a better view of this overall problem. A look at our main shopping streets will prove that progressive businessmen change their store fronts, their interiors, and their methods of selling so that these renewed places are completely changed from the blight you bought in as a child. Yet in some areas of our community, housing and living conditions lagged way behind progressive movement.

Rahway had grown from its original hub centered on the railroad station until it had reached its boundaries. Much of the land was overcrowded by buildings and the dwellings were overcrowded with people. Some buildings were used for purposes never intended by their builders.

Rahwayites who took pride in their city were deeply concerned over the deterioration of other neighborhoods. It was at this point that the Redevelopment Agency was formed. Following are the changes realized by the adoption of the Urban Renewal Program.

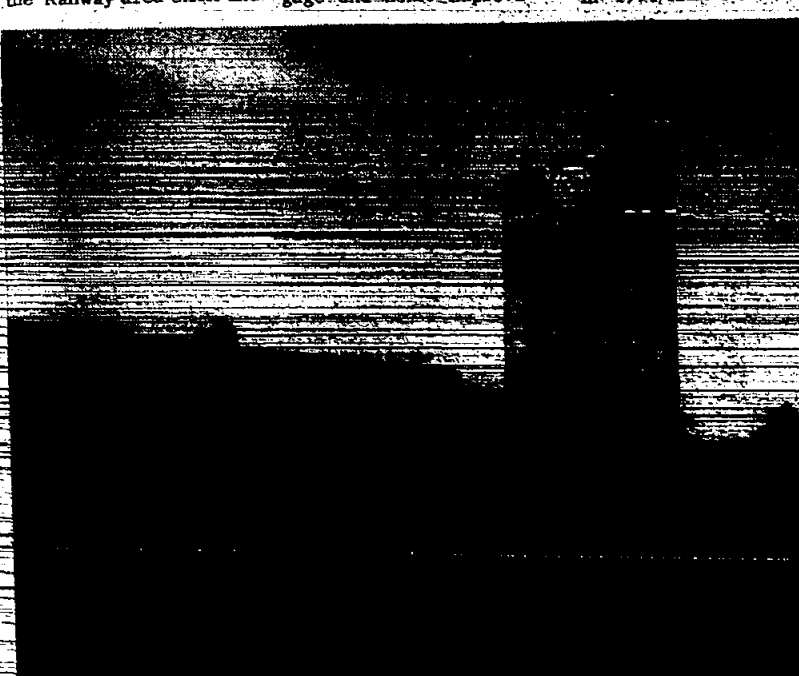

Sugar has curious effect on the diets of rats, Rutgers researchers discover

Overweight Americans take heart. The study, conducted by Rutgers University researchers, shows that a diet high in sugar can lead to obesity in rats, similar to the condition seen in humans.

The researchers found that rats fed a diet high in sugar gained significantly more weight than those on a standard diet. This suggests that a similar mechanism may be at work in humans, where a diet high in sugar can lead to obesity.

The study was conducted by Dr. Leonard W. Hamilton, an associate professor of psychology at Rutgers University. He is hoping to find out why some of us are fat and others thin by studying the feeding behavior of rats under controlled laboratory conditions.

The site is under contract to the city. The city is now negotiating with the developer to purchase the land. The city is also negotiating with the state to purchase the land.

The plan includes the construction of a new city hall, a new police station, and a new fire station.

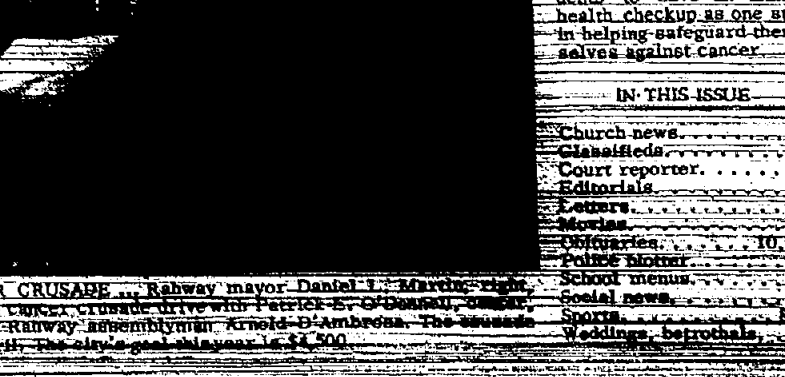
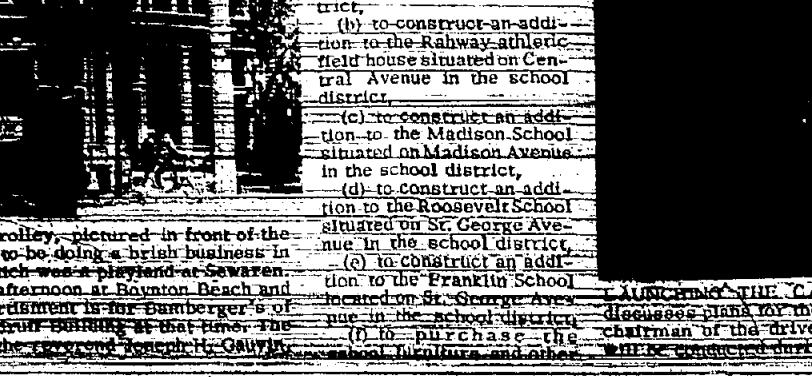
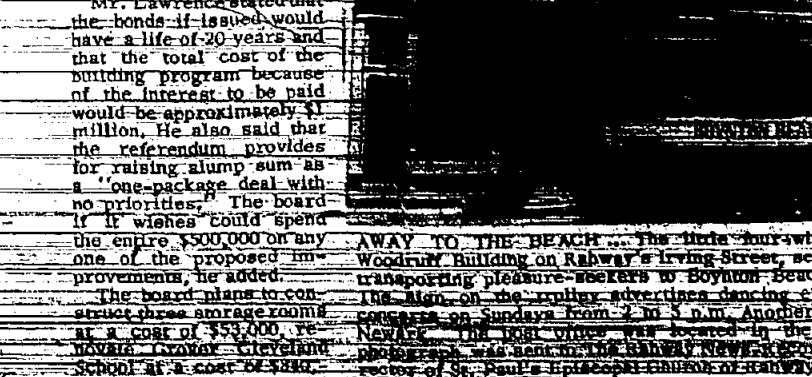
