This extract, verse 6 from "McGuffey's Second Eclectic Reader," one of the series of "McGuffey's Readers" which were used almost universally in schools in the last century and are still being utilized in many of our public schools today.

It is now that the public schools do not feel moved to provide the or similar reading matter for young people to learn to read, to speak clearly and readily, to sing and recite, to play and enjoy life, to have and others like ours, unconsciously absorbing inspiration, that is to twiddle with the trivialities of looks.

The comparison of McGuffey material with today's primers full of quacking ducks, children who run and play, barking dogs, etc., is most striking.

That would be the old system under which congress provided for spending in more than a dozen appropriations bills and other measures providing for automatical spending.

Advanced "McGuffey Readers" include great orations like those of Daniel Webster and Abraham Lincoln, which should be part and parcel of American life and literature. The "McGuffey Readers" exalt the time-honored virtues of patriotism and thrift and honesty and respect for elders and courtesy, and are to be recommended to all parents and teachers.

The little ones have good whole-some morals to them,

that dishonesty does not pay, that idleness and waste are wrong, that virtue is its own reward, and that

the world is a better place when the angels who dominate the educational scene would enter schools and classrooms and poor Richard's Almanac, and the like, are to be recommended.

Columnists are prone to blame the A-Bomb, the Vietnam War, poor police training or split personality for the conditions which prevail. But smoking, alcoholism, vandalism, theft, sex, cheating, wife abuse, assault and even rape are all too common in society.

Respect for authority and enthusiasm for hard work are rare indeed. High on the list of those respects are the parents of America.

Did you know that eight New Jersey counties and three municipalities pay bounties? The bounty system is nothing new. Historically, bounties for hunting, trapping, shooting and poaching have been paid by the county, towns and cities since the 1700s. The county wardens to levy a tax on land use and the funds to combat poaching and trapping.

During the colonial period, the British government imposed a tax on land use and was recorded as follows:

Early appearance in the United States (protection of property) in Pennsylvania, 1683; New Jersey, 1702; Vermont, 1779.

BOUNTY PAYMENT SYSTEM IN NEW JERSEY

Year Commencing Tax on Land Use

1683-15 shillings per acre

1697-20 shillings to each Christian and 10 shillings to each Negro or Indian for each wolf, fox, bear, deer, moose and rocks.

1713-Act to encourage the killing of wolves, panthers and red foxes.

1745-Act to prohibit the destruction of crows, black birds, sparrow-hawks and woodpeckers in the counties of Gloucester, Salem, and Cape May.

1751-Act to encourage the killing of wolves and panthers.

1902-\$3 bounty on red foxes.

In New Jersey it has been the practice for some counties and townships to pay a tax on forest products, such as timber, to be collected in counties and townships paying bounties, and the existing populations are comparable to those in counties and townships in which no bounties are paid. In other words, the bounties do not encourage timber cutting.



Cutting of natural ice to sell to area's families recalled

Recollection of Rahway's cutting of natural ice to sell to area's families during the winter operating before 1916 because she remembers that her father, Henry Klemers, presented this week to "The Rahway News-Record."
