Voters to select three education board members, vote on 14% budget hike in March 11 election

Rahway voters will be called upon to decide the fate of a school budget which increased 14% over the current year and select seven candidates for three seats on the board of education when they go to the polls Tuesday, March 11.

The budget for the 1975-1976 school year, if approved on Tuesday, would be up \$708,267 from \$642,822 for this fiscal school year to \$7,136,389 for the next fiscal school year.

If the budget is passed, \$5,955,489 would have to be raised by taxes. The rest would be funded through state and federal programs.

The terms of incumbent board members Larry Lockhart, vice president Eric H. Breckhusen and president Harry W. McDowell will all expire on Tuesday, Mr. Breckhusen chose not to seek reelection.

The candidates in the race, according to their ballot order, are Mr. Lockhart of 1180 Fulton Street, Barry D. Henderson of 459 Grove Street, Paul M. Geyer of 230 East Grand Avenue, Alan L. Rubin of 623 Harris Drive, Mr. McDowell of 284 Rudolph Avenue, Mrs. John (Lena) Dent of 889 Main Street and Paul A. LoRocco of 836 Pratt Street.

Messrs. McDowell and Lockhart, both incumbents, have joined with Mr. Rubin and are running as a slate, Mr. Lockhart is an appointed member filling an unexpired term.

The three have come out strongly in support of the policies of the current

members of the board and have defended board actions in such controversial areas as spending, hiring practices and the renovations at Washington School.

They have been severely criticized by a slate composed of Messrs. Henderson and LoRocco. Mr. LoRocco is a former board member who was defeated last year in a reelection bid.

The duo claimed the renovations done at Washington School, carried out to centralize school board offices, were done without the full knowledge and approval beforehand of board members.

Messrs. Lockhart, McDowell and Rubin have countered the allegations saying the renovations were done in a proper man-

ner and received the approval of school board members who were told what was to be done beforehand.

They also claimed a recommendation urging the renovation of Washington School for such a purpose was produced by a committee of which Mr. LoRocco was a member in 1971.

Messrs. Henderson and LoRocco have also hit long and hard on what they see as "wasteful spending" on the part of current board members citing in particular the increase in the school budget.

Their opponents conceded there was a need to keep expenses to a minimum, but said the increases brought about in the budget were unavoidable, as they involved either salary items governed by contracts or inflationary price increases.

The third area to come under attack by Messrs. Henderson and LoRocco is the controversial hiring of administrative personnel such as the recent appointment of Robert A. Searles as director of personnel.

The incumbents and Mr. Rubin said such positions were created in the past, not during the current board term, and most positions have been filled by personnel within the school system.

The latter is in answer to another charge saying too many people have been brought into the city, such as Mr. Searles who comes from Millburn, who was last employed in Hillside.

Mr. Geyer has also criticized "wasteful spending" while at the same time attacking the salaries paid to substitute teachers and teachers aides.

The independent candi-

date has also been strongly critical of having school children raise funds for class projects by selling candy or other items produced by private companies.

Other major concerns of the city fireman-turned-school-board candidate include establishing a "fair and sensible" athletic program which would give all students a chance to play and learn sports and the establishment of better communications between teachers, students and board members.

Mr. Geyer also criticized the state supreme court for extending the deadline to October on finding a new way to distribute state aid to local schools which would avoid property taxes.

Mrs. Dent has run a relatively quiet campaign in which she has emphasized the need to both consider tax dollars and the goal of good education when making board policies.

She too is an independent.

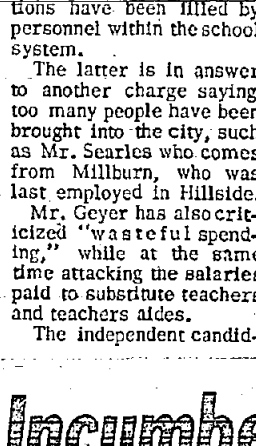

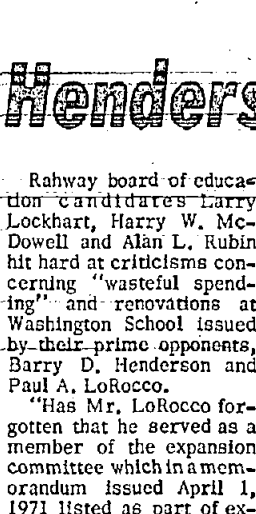

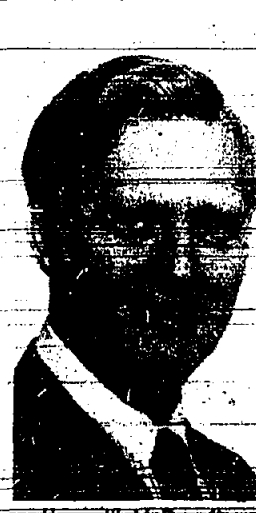


Another board candidate, Paul Geyer, came under attack for changing in printed statements that board members allocated \$70,000 for Washington School, according to the trio.

"In fact the total bill amounted to approximately \$20,000. Let us get the facts straight," they said.

Both Messrs. LoRocco and Geyer were criticized by Messrs. Lockhart, McDowell and Rubin who charged the pair did not attend any of the first five candidates nights. They further claimed Mr. Henderson only attended two of the five.

Incumbents, Rubin issue strong counter-attack; Henderson, LoRocco, Geyer reiterate stands

Rahway board of education candidates Larry Lockhart, Harry W. McDowell and Alan L. Rubin hit hard at criticisms concerning "wasteful spending" and renovations at Washington School issued by their prime opponents, Barry D. Henderson and Paul A. LoRocco.

"Has Mr. LoRocco forgotten that he served as a member of the expansion committee which in a memorandum issued April 1, 1971 listed as part of ex-

panation needs the remodeling of Washington School for administrative offices," Messrs. Lockhart, McDowell and Rubin said.

Mr. LoRocco lost his reelection bid last year. The trio said he served under expansion committee chairman Louis B. Rizzo.

Countering charges from their opponents the trio said, "the renovation which has been alluded to as some sort of 'shady deal' of an 'inner circle' of the board was discussed at a full

board meeting in July 1974."

They went on to say then business administrator Norman J. Anderson made a special presentation at that session on how renovations would be financed and assured members the funds would be available.

"It was further discussed at the public meeting in July and approved at the August public meeting with only two dissenting votes," said Messrs. Lockhart, McDowell and Rubin.

They stated, "It is a pity it took over two years to implement their expansion committee members' recommendation."

"Messrs. Henderson and LoRocco criticized present board members for providing a \$50 daily allowance for consultants," noted the trio, which includes incumbents and board members Mr. R. Lockhart and board president Mr. McDowell.

"Have they forgotten that Mr. LoRocco voted for a \$45 daily allowance three and one-half years ago on October 18, 1971?" they asked.

criticism of board budget increases saying 70-75% of the hikes could be attributed to increases in fuel, utilities and salaries which they called "amounts over which the board has no control."

"The opposition has been fit to criticize Mr. McDowell for the 'wasteful hiring of five additional and unnecessary' curriculum supervisors," the trio noted.

"In reality none were added during Mr. McDowell's presidency from last year to this year and one is budgeted for next year," they said.

They also said of the last seven supervisory or administrative appointments made five of the personnel involved have come from within the city school system.

In their final press release before the Tuesday, March 11, vote, Messrs. Henderson and LoRocco claimed "distortion and deception" are apparently still the trademarks of the present board majority and incumbent candidates for reelection.

They said a citizen was told at the public hearing on the school budget that a budgeted 12% increase for each administrator and su-

ervisor was necessitated by contracts.

"The fact is the contract calls for a 7.5% increase with the additional 4.5% an optional merit increase, if earned," the duo said. "It limits teachers to 6% increases with no mention of merit increases."

They further said three new board members joining forces with "the three members who reluctantly voted for the budget" can form a new majority on the board. "The 'Big Spenders' must be stopped. It is obvious they cannot learn by seeing how all of the other school districts and municipalities are reducing staffs and limiting tax increases," they said.

Mr. Geyer reiterated his support for "strong fundamental education in basic skills in the lower grades and an emphasis on vocational training at the upper levels."

Teachers and students with problems should be aware they will be heard and will receive fair treatment," he said.

He claimed he could bring about cooperation throughout the schools and community.

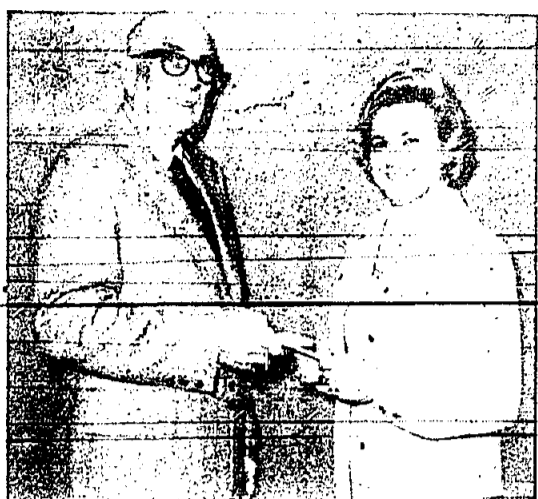

Rahway River and Green Brook flood authorities pass first hurdle

Separate bills creating flood control authorities for Rahway River and Green Brook were unanimously passed by the state assembly on February 27 and sent to the state senate.

The bills, which would place Rahway and Clark under the jurisdiction of the Rahway River Authority, were introduced by assemblyman Joseph L. Garrubo of the 20th district and assemblywoman Mrs. James (Betty) Wilson of the 22nd district.

Union County lawmakers have been trying for three years to get such legislation enacted so flooding problems may be dealt with on a regional basis.

The Rahway River bill would encompass communities along the river's basin in Union, Essex and Middlesex Counties.

Assemblywoman Mrs. Wilson's bill would involve communities in the Green Brook basin in Union, Middlesex and Somerset Counties.

Both measures specify which communities are to be members of the newly-created authorities and share in their expenses.

"Failure of voluntary efforts at regionalized flood control clearly demonstrates a firm, mandatory approach is necessary," assemblyman Garrubo said.

Without such compulsion, he said, some communities which do not have flooding problems themselves but add to the runoff problems their neighbors suffer might be reluctant to participate in or help finance the project.

He also noted the bill provides communities

which already have spent large sums of money on flood control measures will receive financial considerations when the costs of future projects by the authorities are assessed.

The Green Brook and Rahway River bills are identical except for the communities and boundaries involved.

Assemblywoman Mrs. Wilson predicted the measures will establish a model for responsible flood control projects in other areas of the state.

Legal advisors to governor Brendan T. Byrne helped draft the legislation which some say may be an indication the governor is prepared to sign the measures if they pass the senate.

Former governor William T. Cahill refused to sign a somewhat similar

Rahway River bill in 1973. Under the new bills nine-member authorities would be appointed by the governor. With the help of members of the department of environmental protection they would prepare comprehensive flood control plans.

The committees would have supervision over the budget of the agencies, the charges assessed and the issuance of bonds.

The Rahway River authority would include Clark, Cranford, Fanwood, Garwood, Kenilworth, Linden, Mountainside, Plainfield, Rahway, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Summit, Union, Winfield, Carteret, Edison, Metuchen, Woodbridge, Maplewood, Millburn, South Orange and West Orange.

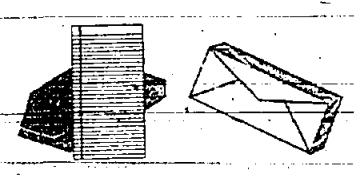

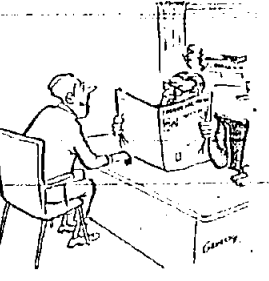

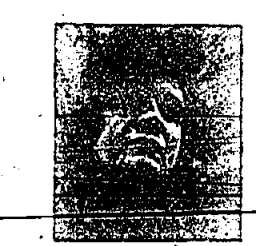
