

## Wanted: Full debate

What this country needs is exactly what secretary of ry bissinger says we should not have in election year debate on United States foreign and delense policy.

Recently In a speech in Boston, Mass., secretary divisions which, he says, are frustrating his carrot-and-stick approach to the Soviet Union, He also assailed critics he alleges are criticizing his policies for shortterm collitical advantage and who are "pretending that the soviets are 10 feet tall and that America, despite all the evidence to the contrary, is becoming a secondrate nation.\*\*

To us this seems yet another manifestation of secretary Kissinger's oft-reported private fear that the United States is in fact a declining world power, but one must sever admit it in public because to do so will only make matters worse. Apparently he lacks taith in the willingness of the American people to respond adequately to the challenges we face. His detente policy has been constructed as a holding action at best, aimed in the long run only at securing the best relationship. ossible with the rising soviet superpower.

The recent congressional refusal to support secretary Kissinger and president Gerald Ford in their requests for aid to the anti-soviet factions in Angola may seem proof of a lack of United States will. However we would note many negative votes were cast as protests against the other side of secretary Kissinger's diplomacy -- his refusal to let soviet adventurism in An-

in short it is the whole philosophy of United States foreign policy which must be debated and closely ex-

Whatever the administration claims the United States is falling lichind in relation to the Soviet Union -- both militarily and politically. It is ironic this can be per-fectly obvious to any school boy but can still escape a few supposedly "sophisticated" academicians. If there-is any pretending going on, it is on the part of those who inser all is well who insist all is well.

Secretary Kissinger maintains there is "no alternative" to his policies, although he himself can hold out no alternative to endless competition and irreconcilable ideological differences between the United States and the Soviet Union. Then let him tell us the kind of world he foresees 20 years in the future.

The secretary repeats his warnings to the soviets and Cuban's against further adventurism. Supposing next time around he can get congressional support for United States counteraction, let him tell us how, if present military trends continue, the United States will still possess the necessary power to act.

These are the kinds of fundamental questions which must be faced and answered in this bicentennial and presidential election year. The great debate overdue; by all means let us get on with it. ris long
