

Geyer takes 'American Independent' label in bid for 12th district seat

Paul M. Geyer of Rahway, candidate for the house of representatives from the 12th district, announced he has filed his candidacy under the "American Independent" label. Mr. Geyer said the label would emphasize his hope for America and his independent stand on many issues.

"Dissident Democrats and Republicans, true independents and members of the American Party and Libertarian Party constitute the support which rejects the false democracy of sell-out politics," he said, "and which will send me to Washington, D.C."

An individual who accepts 100% the doctrines of a particular party is either a party tool or an idiot who cannot think for himself, according to Mr. Geyer.

True independents consider the issue and the candidate and are not dictated to by pressure groups, influential endorsements or past party loyalty, he said, noting they are the "vanguard of the new breed of thinking voter and they will make the difference in November."

The Libertarian Party is a group which operates on the principles that mini-

mum government is best government, personal and economic freedom are vital and the only function of government is to protect rights, provide security and arbitrate disputes while remaining decentralized to avoid the unreasonable seizure of power. Mr. Geyer is a member of the national and state parties and says he is supported by members of the party.

The American Party, according to Mr. Geyer, advocates strong conservative and traditionalist views while extreme libertarian sentiments about the reduction of government power and influence in private lives, municipal affairs and corporate operations.

Mr. Geyer said he rejects the party literature of both groups and has formulated an independent philosophy which incorporates the "best" points of each with his own principles.

Democrats and Republicans, the hopeful states, represent the special interest power politics that have brought America to the brink of disaster.

He has no political vectors on his staff, he said, refuses large contributions, commends the opposition when they are right and refuses to get involved in smear tactics or personal attacks upon candidates but only addresses issues.

Attempted rape of girl 16 charge facing Rahway man

A case involving a 26-year-old city man on the charge of attempted rape of a 16-year-old city girl was held for the grand jury. The action came in last Thursday's Rahway municipal court session.

Gregory Smith, whose address was given as the city Young Men's Christian Association, 1564 Irving Street, was charged with attempted rape alleged to have occurred on March 29.

He was also charged with committing assault with intent to commit rape upon the same girl and with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

A case involving Smith on charges that on March 29 he was carrying a dangerous weapon, a .38 Smith & Wesson .38 Smith & Wesson revolver, was also held for the grand jury.

Maxine DuVal of 284 Lafayette Street, Rahway, 34, was fined \$50 for admitting assault and battery upon the 16-year-old niece of Joyce DuVal of the same address on March 26. She was fined for beating the girl with her fists.

Richard Murphy of 1564 Irving Street, Rahway, received two 30-day jail terms, to be served concurrently, and two suspended \$50 fines for giving a false statement to a police detective by causing a police alarm to be issued for the arrest of two alleged perpetrators of an alleged armed holdup and robbery.

The 23-year-old Murphy was also found guilty of interfering with the discharging of the duties of a

police officer. Both charges stemmed from a March 25 incident.
