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**Rahway man and friends save name of naval ship**

Three ex-sailors from Union County, including a Rahway man, whose ship survived German U-Boats and Japanese airplanes in World War II have saved the name of their "tin-can" from joining the scrapheap of naval history.

With the help of representative Matthew J. Rinaldo a new navy destroyer will be named after the sunken U.S.S. Thorn on which the trio served for almost four years in World War II in the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

The former crewmen of the Thorn got the Republican lawmaker to persuade secretary of the navy J. William Middendorf to carry on the Thorn tradition by naming a newly-commissioned, missile-carrying destroyer after her. The vessel is scheduled to be launched sometime next year.

"It is the final victory of the old Thorn's crew," said William D. Young of Scotch Plains, when he heard the good news from the 12th district legislator.

Mr. Young, a former first lieutenant aboard the Thorn who teaches in Linden High School, said his ex-crewmates had been trying for five years to save the name of the U.S.S. Thorn before the contract representative Rinaldo.

Along with Michael Hudak of 131 Alton Street, Elizabeth, and Rudolph J. Gless of 239 A Union Street, Rahway, who were enlisted men aboard the Thorn, they wrote the congressman for Rahway and Clark asking his assistance.
