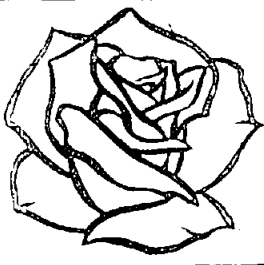

Lab rates highly

Whether it be standard laboratory testing or more sophisticated diagnostic testing such as radioimmunoassay, immunoelectrophoresis and isoenzyme determinations, the Rahway Hospital laboratory is more than prepared -- and qualified -- to handle it.

Sometimes people are a little surprised when they come in here," commented Albert Marshall, chief medical technologist, when comparing this facility to units of similar-sized hospitals.

In a quickly public and patients alike just see physicians and nurses when in a hospital, but the "logistical team" is huge and a vital part of it are the medical technologists. Backed by equipment in the half-million dollar range, they process a test caseload which exceeded 270,000 in 1975.

As an example of up-to-date ways and means, the Rahway Hospital laboratory utilizes radioactive materials in testing the thyroid and liver diseases. Good equipment streamlines an operation, allowing for more effective utilization of personnel. Rahway Hospital is committed to such a program to provide the best possible care for its patients and the community at large.

In the future it is hoped the laboratory will acquire an automatic gamma counter and updated model of the scintillation counter to cope with the growth of inpatient and outpatient demand for diagnostic services.

Still it comes down to people and the technologists are all registered with the American Society of the College of Pathology, having completed college courses either for a bachelor of science degree or an associate degree. In the laboratory great emphasis is placed on quality control so the results produced by the laboratory will be maintained at already high levels.

Last year the laboratory requested a review for, and received, accreditation from the Commission on Laboratory Inspection and Accreditation. An appropriate certificate designating the two-year approval was presented to doctor Bernard Pelton, pathologist and director of laboratories.

Rahway Hospital is aware the federal government is moving towards standard certification for hospital laboratories and so the laboratory staff continues to strive for excellence. Although many patients and the general public are unaware of it, the laboratory is an integral part of their total medical care.

Kiray elected head of county principals unit

Leslie N. Kiray of Clark, director of the Union County Vocational Center, was elected president of the Union County Association of Secondary School Principals, the first time the head of a vocational school was elected to that position in the county.

According to Mr. Kiray, the association serves an important planning role in high school education in the county. "Among other objectives," says Mr. Kiray, "we try to establish priorities by matching student interests and career goals."

Mr. Kiray has served for two years as treasurer of the association, which he joined in 1967. He is also a member of the New Jersey Vocational Principals Association, the National Council of Local Administrators and several other organizations.

High-sounding scheme like Genocide Treaty really great danger

"A rose by any other name would smell as sweet." Which is to say that mere verbiage cannot change facts. When internationalists come up with high-sounding schemes, like the proposed Genocide Treaty, it is well to remember this simple truth.

"Genocide" is defined by the dictionary as "the use of calculated, systematic means to bring about the extermination of a racial, cultural or political group." However, far from being a blanket condemnation of group murder, this document ignores extermination of political groups, like the infamous political purge in the Soviet Union and Red China, wherein millions of human beings have been liquidated. It was on the Soviet Union's persistence that "political-murders" were excluded when an international genocide treaty was being considered by the United Nations in 1948.

Ironically, the treaty does stretch the meaning of genocide to include mental or physical injury to a racial or religious group or even one individual in it.

Under former presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, the proposed treaty was left to languish where it deserved to be in the United States senate foreign relations committee, but under former presidents Richard M. Nixon and president Gerald Ford it has been reactivated. Now non-worlders believe used Americans are preoccupied with bicentennial celebrations and the presidential contest. They are reportedly planning to bring the Genocide Treaty to the floor for a vote on ratification when Congress is in session.

Under the constitution a treaty may be ratified by two-thirds of the senators "present and voting." Thus with perhaps only three senators on the floor (a common occurrence) and only two voting to ratify, with the third showing (also a common occurrence), the highly dangerous Genocide Treaty might be ratified by the United States of America.

Aside from the fact of its being a hoax and not making all mass murder an international crime, what is wrong with this treaty?

Just this: If accused of genocide our own government and each American citizen would be deprived of the protections guaranteed by the United States Constitution. These protections include the right to a fair trial, the right to be tried before a jury, the right to a counsel of his own choosing, the prohibition against hearsay evidence and so on.

A government, a group or an individual accused of genocide would be tried before an international court lacking even a codified system of statutes, whose proceedings would be a far cry from those established by Anglo-American jurisprudence. Moreover, the accused would be tried before foreign judges, unable and unwilling fully to comprehend United States customs, traditions and motivations.

If the ratification which now dominates the United Nations were to assume judicial robes and preside over an international court, what possible hope could there be for justice?

Let us start a real fight would be for the revolutionaries in this country desirous of harassing a particular group, or perhaps the United States government itself. Revolutionaries, like the rest of us, are of various races and cultures, but let one policeman in the strict performance of his duty shoot and kill one revolutionary in the government, a crime and the communists and other American-haters would raise a hue and cry about genocide.

With the Genocide Treaty ratified by the senate and operative, the law enforcement officials, his superiors and everyone else even remotely associated with him would be liable to prosecution before an international tribunal in a foreign land, with minimal chances of receiving any kind of lenient celebration is generating extremist plans among revolutionary groups. People should therefore be particularly concerned about possible participation of the Genocide Treaty, and should be flooding Washington, D.C. with telephone calls, telegrams and letters of protest against it. The worst possible thing for the world's sake is to let a sovereign nation be hijacked by a "great boy" into an international struggle.

George Lewis gets promotion

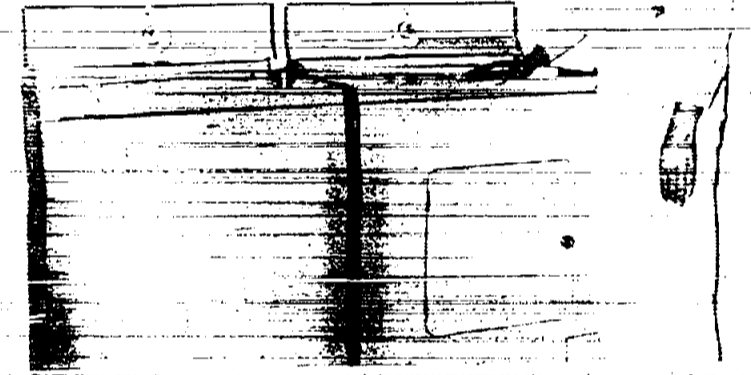

The couple went on a wedding trip to Hawaii. They will reside at 708 Riverside Court, Scotch Plains.

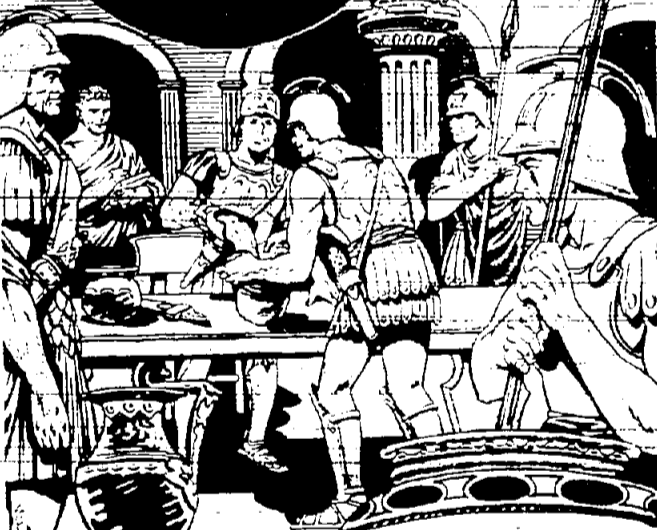

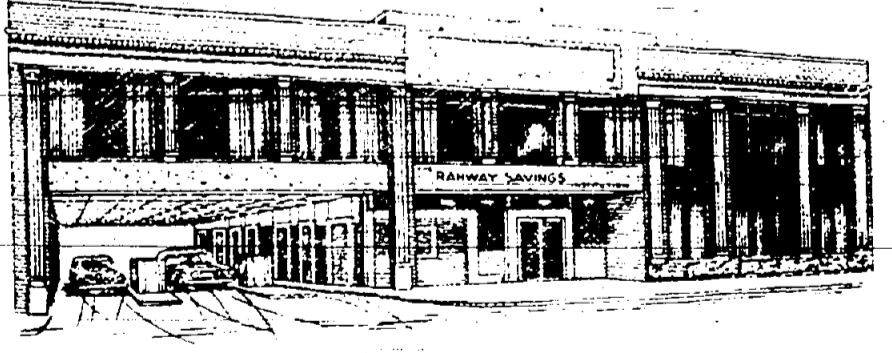

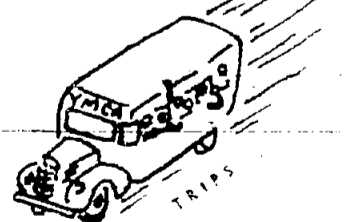

Crusaders eliminated from NJSIAA tourney

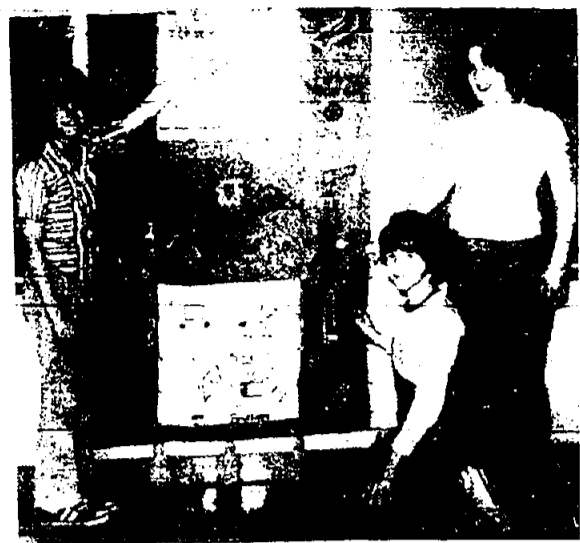
The Clark Crusaders were eliminated from the seventh State interscholastic baseball tournament by Parsippany 4-3 at Nolan field.
