

A timely reminder

power between the United States and foreign countries usually leave people wondering about their validity because of the obvious statistical barrier posed by the different money systems.

Now a respected international Journal, "To the Point," has published a meaningful comparison of eight major countries by showing the buying power of wage earners in different occupations expressed, not in money, but in the working time required to buy common consumer items.

The resulting chart is a blockbuster that provides new proof of the superiority of the American system in providing more material goods to more people than any nation in instery. It deserves close attention during this bicentennial year when some people are trying to hide the connection between private enterprise and America's greatness.

Compare, for example, the purchase of 22 pounds of sugar by a nurse. The American nurse combay the sugar with one hour of work, the English nurse with four hours, 17 minutes of work, the Japanese nurse with four hours, 50 minutes of work and the Polish nurse with six hours, 48 minutes of work. The Russian nurse must work lo hours to hav the same amount of sugar.

What if you are a skilled laborer trying to buy a pair of men's shoes? The American can buy them with six hours of work, the Japanese with 10 hours of work, the Englishman with 15 hours of work and the Frenchman with 16 hours of work. It takes the Russian laborer 45 hours, for an entire week of work, to buy one pair of

Also take the case of an engineer buying a man's suit. In America it takes him 12 hours of work, in England 20 hours of work, in Sweden 22 hours of work and in Japan 34 hours of work. The Russian engineer has to work 102 hours or about a full month in order to

buy a man's suit.
- What if you are a teacher and you want to buy an automobile? In the United States it takes you 2.5 months of work, in Japan 4.5 months of work and in England seven months of work. The Russian teacher must work one year and three months to earn enough to buy an auto-

mobile, and the Polish teacher must work four years. All these figures are based on average or middle rates. For example the skilled laborer's work time is calculated on the average for five skilled trades from welder to motor mechanic.

The statistics were compiled from a wide variety of the Grganization of Economic Development and Gooper-ation, the International Work Bureau, the Union de Ban-ques Suisses, the French-based Centre of Research and Documentation on Consumption and the Centre of Study

Anyone who wants to exchange our American economic system for the socialist failures in other countries had better prepare himself for an abrupt reduction in standard of living caused by having to work up to 16 times longer for ordinary consumer necessities.



Need for strength

United States defense budget authorizations recently approved in the house of representatives need to be viewed against the background of a steady and ominous build-up in the Soviet Union's military strength. Since 1964 the United States has annually reduced its military spending while the Soviet Union's military budget has spending white the soviet than a minitary budget has been rising by 3,1 a year. Since 1970 soviet military spending has annually exceeded that of America and it was 54,1 higher last year.

In the last decade the United States defense budget

has declined by some \$15 billion, with inflation taking an added toll. The 1976 defense budget was 9% below the 1964 level. The result of this trend is that the Soviet Union now leads America in a number of crucial military areas and will dominate in every military aspect by the mid-1980s unless the United States quickly de-cides it has no intention of becoming no. 2.

The soviet threat is rapidly growing. Since 1965 the Soviet Union has launched 800 new combat ships while America has built 300, in the past three years the soviets have produced 70; more factical aircraft, six times as many tanks, three times as many armored personnel carriers and nine times as many artillery pieces as the United States.

systems and multiple warhead missiles, this lead is being steadily reduced and by the 1980s could be reversed. Additionally the soviet navy has more than three times as many submarines as the United States, including 78 nuclear attack submarines compared with our 65. In air power too the soviets have surged ahead, with thousands of fighter aircraft and more than 50 swept-wing Backfire bombers in service. Meanwhile the United States continues to dicker over production of its B-1 bomber.

Yet some members of congress view the American defense budget as bloated and demand it be substantially cut, inaccurately assuming such funds would be diverted to social programs. The record shows that during the last decade social program payments to individuals and social program grants increased by 134% while defense spending fell 29%. If congress attempts to increase social expenditures at the same pace while limiting defense apending to a relatively fixed share of the budget, it would mean a devastating 50,, reduction

in defense appropriations.

While the United States talks of reducing tensions and military force, leaders of the 25th congress of the Soviet Union called this year for "strengthening of economic and military night so that the soviets could take the offensive in the international area." Soviet leaders are clearly determined never again to be embarrassed as they were during the Cuban missile crisis and are building a powerful infiltrary machine that can support their interventions and threats abroad

Only a strong United States, defenseposture can complet the constant soviet pushing and probing. While some critics of American defense spending complain of "overkill," the soviets clearly anticipate and plan for repeated nuclear attacks. This is confirmed by the extent of the soviet civil defense system which they assert can hold their fatalities in a nuclear exchange to no more than S; of their urban population

-or less than their World War II losses. —
The soviet air defense system features more than 5,000 radar units, some 3,000 fighter interceptor; and 13,000 surfact-to-air missiles in position and ready to be fired. Soviet plans to strike repeatedly is also shown in their development of "cold" missile silos -the kind that can be reloaded and used over and over

The way soviet military power is being shaped reflecto the blitzkrieg strategy of saviet military doctrine which states a path for the advance of the troops will be cleared by nuclear weapons." The doctrine also refers to a capability of soviet forces to operate in radiological, chemical and bacteriological environ-

I do not believe our defense posture andour approach
"Strategic Arms Limitation Talks" adequately take into account soviet attitudes. Our position and security is being weakened, I fear, by a psychology of detente which saps the will of American people to support adequate defense budgets, in short too much reliance is being placed on detente.

Soviet Marshall Grechke shows a more realistic attitude when he notes the Soviet Union does not rely on peace aspirations but on military might and cloud in international power politics. Not since war prepara-tions by Adolf Hitler in the 1930s has a major nation devoted such a high proportion of its peacetime resources to the production of weapons and the massing of a military might.

The ominous question is: Why? The answer for America is that a strong military defense is absolutely essential in order to avert a nuclear war due to soviet miscalculations about our will and ability to resist any threats to our security,

'Fedgov' takes capital needed for investments

The free enterprise system has brought the United States the highest standard of living and the greatest security of any nation in the world. If given a fair chance the private-sector can also find the answers to today's complicated problems and create the jobs needed for our seven million unemployed, or at least for those of them really willing to work. But this will be difficult, if not impossible, if the federal government meddles in its affairs and confiscates its capital lifeblood.

Figures compiled by the United States treasury show the United States government, plus state and local governments, are presently borrowing some 82% of the funds available in the securities market. These borrowers pay high interest, often tax-exempt, and appear at least to represent safety. Whereas in 1966, federal borrowing absorbed only 18.6% of the capital market, it now absorbs 72%.

Government is non-productive. When it corners more than four-fifths of the funds available for investment how can the private sector possibly expand to increase production and provide more jobs? As long as Uncle Sam, your friendly legislatures and your municipalities corner the money market, unemployment will "follow as the night the day."

But just wait until you hear the collectivists like Jimmy Carter and Jerry Brown screaming for "fedgov" to furnish employment through socialistic "makework." Will they ever admit that it is our past and present deficit spending by "fedgov" which has caused our riotous inflation?




