The New Jersey Institute of Technology, located in Newark, was established in 1910 as the successor to Newark Technical School, which was founded in 1881 and was called Newark College of Engineering until 1975 when it received its present was.

A seven-number Board of Trustees is appointed by the governor to set the regulations for the administration of the college, and both the governor and the mayor of Newark serve as ex-officto members.

The institute is unique in the state because it originated as a city, rather than a state, institution. The governatorial appointment of its trustees does not require Senate confirmation. Its educational services are purchased by the state under the terms of an annual contract and

Chamber of Commerce will get \$100,000 for city revamp

A minimum of \$100,000 has been allocated to Rahway by the Union County Economic Development Corp. to revitalize businessaes throughout the city.

Robert B. Markey, the president of the Rahway Chamber of Commerce, made the disclosure Jan. 8 at a meeting in the King's Row Restaurant on Main St., Rahway.

Mr. Markey said he received a letter from Roger DiNiscia, executive director of the corporation, which stated the money would be available from federal Small Business Administration improvement funds through the chamber.

"During the next few weeks," the chamber president said, "we will come up with a plan of action. The corporation is concerned with a renewal of business interest in Rahway."

He added the local organizaton is expected to fundel the money to businesses in the community.

The Chamber president explained the \$100,000 would be doled out as a combination grant and loan. A recipient, he said, would receive 10% as a grent with the remainder as a loon over 25 years at interest slightly below the marker rate.

"It will be up to the Chamber to establish the criteria," he said, "where the money would be used and by whom." However, the corporation would be handling all the paper work, he added.

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

New security will be backed by mortgages

City Federal Savings and Loan Assn., the state's largest savings and loan, is about to become the first SaL in the country to Issue a new type of short-term, mortgage-backed security aimed atproviding additional funds for new lending.

Approval for the new device, termed a mortgage-backed nuce, came Jan. 4 from the Federal flome Loan Bank Board in Washington, D.C., and City Federal was given authority to Issue up to \$60 million of the short-term notes.

Gilbert G. Roessner, City Federal's chairman, said he was "very pleased with the bank board's action, it will mean greater flexibility for City Federal and ultimately for all savings and loan associations to generate new money."

The notes are very similar to short-term commercial paper, except the notes are acutally backed by mortgage loans in City Federal's portfolio," Mr. Roessner said.

Under the ruling, the notes would have a minimum denomination of \$100,000 and would mature anywhere fromfive to 270 days and are expected to be sold through the First Boston Corp. to institutional investors.


Summit income gains 24% over 12 months

An official of the Summit Bancorporation of Summit reported record earning for the 12-month period ended Dec. 31 of last year. Thomas D. Sayles, Jr., chalrman and president, stated income before securities trensactions increased 24% to \$3,654,000 over the previous year's \$2,937,000. This was the third record year in a row. Higher loan volume and improved yields were the major contributing factors to this performance, which on an adjusted per share basis represents \$3,33 versus \$2.69. Earnings for the fourth quarter were \$933,000 versus \$354,000 for the comparable period in 1977, and increase of 9%.

Mr. Sayles noted total resources increased 18% to \$388,600,000 and deposits rose to \$319,900,000. He commented deposit growth averaged 7% for the year, somewhat lower than that experienced in 1977.



to 7th highest in U. S.

New Jersey's total state and local per capita tax burden rose \$138 in fiscal 1977 to \$931, moving the state's ranking from 10th to seventh highest among all states, reports a spokesman for the New Jersey Taxpayers Assn.

Alaska ranked first with a total per capita tax burden of \$2,296, principally derived from taxes on oil, gas or pipeline properties, followed by New York, California, Massachusetts, Wyoming and Hawail ahead of New Jersey, according to data recently released by the U.S. Burean of the Census.

The large increase in the Garden State's total per capita tax burden can be attributed mainly to initial imposition that year of the personal income tax which is dedicated to various property tax relief programs. However, the impact of these programs is not reflected in New Jersey's per capita property tax burden of \$468 in fiscal 1977 because the Census reporting method used 1976 local property tax data in the calculation.

That was the calendar year before the income tax. Therefore the property tax is shown as increasing \$22 per capita from the previous year, while this state's rank dropped from second to third behind Alaska and Massachusetts. In fiscal 1977, New Jersey property taxes accounted for just over 50% of total tax revenue, down from 56% the previous year. Nationally, property taxes averaged 36% of the state and local per capita tax burden of \$813.

Taxes per \$1,000 personal income are considered by some analysts to be a more meaningful measure of state tax burden. Because New Jersey is a high per capita income state, ranking third nationally in 1977, its ranking in tax burdén related to state personal income is significantly lower than on a per person basis. The Garden State's total tax burden per \$1,000 personal come is significantly lower than on a per person basis. 

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

Meanwhile, our taxpayer-financed federal government spends more money on advertising than does American Telephone & Telegraph — some \$200 million per year. And Washington expends as much as \$500 million annually for film-making. This includes projects like the \$125,000 motion picture which has been compiletely lost, with no one on record as ever having seen it. Which may be just as well, come to think of it, since federal films are so bad one representative of a tele-

Which may be just as well, come to think of it, since federal films are so bad one representative of a television station said, given a choice between broadcasting a government-produced program and color-bar tests, he would run the color bars.

With "Big Brother," waste and lavish disbursement of our herd-eerned money is an unfortunate commonplace. Take the federally-funded National Institute of Building Sciences, which has exactly 11 employes. The top five officials of this agency earn between \$47,000 and \$75,000, with the head of the institute being paid as much, as the vice president of the United States and the chief justice of the United States and more than our duly-elected congressmen, who are far from underpaid. A drunken sailor is squandering his own money, but our government's year-round spending spree is financed by you, me and our neighbors.

It was an escort alright -- but the Luftwaffe kind. They started attacking us head on -- 600 ME109 and FW 190's against 39 Fortresses. There were about 10 Ju-87's on the sidelines lobbing rockets with plane wire trailing to tangle our props. I had a single .50 callbre machine gun spring-suspended over the bombsight.

To start with, these accusations are either false or vacuous. It is not writ in the sky in letters of fire, nor graven on imperishable tablets of stone that your eccisions are the right ones. The issue in question is one on which reasonable men — and women — may reasonably disagree, and those who start from premises different from yours may be expected to arrive, through correct reasoning, at different conclusions, without being liable to charges of stupidity. In other words, we may be wrong, but we're not dumb.

The accusation of being anti-progressive is meaningless. There is no set future state toward which we are inevitably and unswervingly traveling and concerning which the only argument is how fast to get there. Your goal is a new City Hall, and your idea of progress is motion in that direction. Your opponents have different goals, and so their ideas of progress are inevitably different from yours. This is not being anti-progressive. It is being anti-Mayor-Martin's-idea-of-progress — a considerable difference and no basis for criticism.

The accusation of bad citizenship is absurd. It can be based only on one or both of two assumptions: One, your goal is obviously the right one, and this is apparent even to your opponents, who are moved solely by base clusively defined as submission to your own will. Both are false, and since there can be no other basis for the conclusion, it must also be false.

'Reggie' main speaker at Hot Stove Dinner

The outfielder for the world champion New York Yankees, Reggie Jackson, will head the list of guest speakers at the 43rd Annual Hot Stove League Dinner on Tuesday, Jan. 23, at 0:30 p.m. This event, sponsored by the Union County Baseball Assn. in cooperation with the County of Union, Dept. of Parks and Recreation, will be held at the Town and Campus Banquet Center in Union.

Jackson was born in Wyncote, Pa., the second youngest of seven children, and was a three-sport man at Cheltenham High School in Wyncote. After graduation he accepted a baseball scholarship to Arizona State University in Tempe, Ariz.

During his sophomore year, he hit .327 and set a school record with 15 homeruns. In 1966, at the end of his sophomore year, he was the Kansas City Athletics' No. 1 draft pick. After less than two years in the minor leagues, he was starting outfielder with the team now known as the Oakland A's.

The player spent eight years playing for Oakland under owner, Charles O. Finley. His best year with this team was 1973 when he batted .293 with 28 doubles, two triples, 32 homeruns, 117 runs batted in and 22 stolen bases. He was also named the Most Valuable Player in the American League, the World Series Most Valuable Player and Player of the Year by "Sporting News" magazine.

In 1976 he was traded to the Baltimore Orioles where he continued his consistant play and batted .277 with 27 doubles, two triples, 27 homeruns, 91 runs batted in Ad 28 stoler bases.

After the 1976 season the slugger was signed by the New York Yankees in the free agent draft. His first year produced a barting average of .286 with 39 doubles, two triples, 32 homeruns, and 110 runs batted in. Last year he batted .274 with 13 doubles, five triples, 27 homeruns and 97 runs batted in one series game and set a record of his own with five homeruns in the series.

saves hospital money In an effort to cut down on the amount of time needed to purchase vital supplies for patient care, Rahway Hospital has turned to a computerized purchasing system offored by the American Hospital Supply Corp. and its four divisions and has become the first hospital in the state to do so. To date, 11 others have taken advantage of the system.

Called the analytical systems automated purchasing or ASAP, the system cuts down the time element by 75%. According to Michael Marcon, director of general services at the hospital, "We've been using the system for the past eight months and the results have been great." introduced.

A limited number of tickets are available through the recreation division of the department at Acme and Canton Sts., Elizabeth. You can obtain these tickets, which cost \$15 between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at these for the past eight months and the results have been great."

The hospital is equipped with two small machines, an automated transmitter from AHSC and a printback terminal leased from the Bell Telephone System. To place an order, pre-punched cards are inserted into the transmitter which is hooked up with a central computer in Chicago via telephone.

The computer receives and interprets the order and forwards it to AHSC office in Edison. At the same time AHSC is receiving the order, the hospital is receiving a confirmation via the printback terminal.

As the budget season for local governmental units gets underway, a spokesman for the New Jersey Taxnavers Asan, said the group considers it important for citizens to be aware of their right to obtain information relating to budgets and other local government financial data.

For over 40 years New Jersey has had a system of state supervision of local government finances which requires each municipality and county to submit annually by a specific filing deadline, several uniform documents, including a budget, a financial statement, a debt statement and an audit. The agency responsible for such supervision is the Division of Local Government Services in the Dept. of Community Affairs.

Any document required by law is generally a public record and may be examined by any interested citizen in the agency in which it is filed. There are also date prescribed financial documents relating to school finance, most importantly, an annual budget and an audit.

Advertisement of the budget is required in advance of the scheduled date of the public hearing in each local government unit. The budget advertisement which appears in newspapers contains a summary of proposed spending and the previous year's expenditures in addition to certain required as well as discretionary information. Essential for budget preparation, as well as for informed analysis by any citizen or organization, are budget details on which the summary is based.

In recognizing the importance of such details, the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services has promulgated a regulation applicable to both municipal and county budgets which gives any citizen at any time after the budget is introduced and, in any event, at least one week before the date of the public hearing, the right to request the supporting budget details for purposes of study.

The citizen who is denied access to budget information materials should file a petition stating the facts with the Local Finance Board in the formation to take with him from the office, but the requ
