

Hospital runs health fair for students




A student-made recipe book will be presented to parents at the conclusion of the project, reports Frank R. Buglione, co-ordinator of federal and state projects.









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Tax Equalization Act fights inflation war

By E. Sidman Wachter The Tax Equalization Act proposed by Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas has a name which may be a mouthful Dole of Kaneas has a name which may be a mountful but a substance that is positively seductive.

The measure is intended to help insulate taxpayers from one serious impact of inferion. At present, when a taxpayer receives a pay boost, cost of living allowance or any other, he is automatically pushed into a higher income tax bracket, even though the additional dollars in his paycheck have the same, or less, buying power than the dollars he earned the previous year.

Sad to say, the supposed tax cut hill of the last Congress is having a negative impact of 80% of Americans, who are in fact saddled with a tax hike of nearly \$10 hillion. It is a victous circle. If purchasing power is to be maintained, income must be increased. But then taxpayers are propelled into higher tax brackets and have to pay higher tax percentages and thus higher taxes. It the inflation rate this year is 8% rather than double digit, as forecast, a family of four earning \$15,000 will have to earn an additional \$1,200 next year just to stay even. Yet, because of the added income in paper dollars, the move from one tax bracket to another will increase the tex hite, not by 8% but by 12%.

Understandably, Fedgov, which is itself creating inflation by its continued deficit spending, has thus a vested interest in stoking the firesoft inflation—larger revenues. For each increase of 1% in the inflation rate, it has been estimated the feds can expect to garner an additional \$1.5 billion in new tax receipts, as tax-payers coast into higher brackets.

The Joint Committee on Taxation of the Congress predicts in 1979 slone such "taxfiation" will increase the tax yield by some \$10 billion and in 1980 by another \$11.9 billion. These monies may be mere drops in the buckets of our hig-spending legislators and federall bireaucrats, but they unjustly penalize workers for the inflation for which they as voters may or may not he responsible. They may, or may not, have cast their votes for a hig spender.

Once enacted, the Tax Equalization Act would remain on the books for four years, and then Congress would review its operation and determine whether to continue the inflation principle for taxpayers.

Under this bill, were the inflation rate 8%, the personal exemption would increase from \$1,000 to \$1,000. Similar adjustments would be mandated throughout the personal income tax structures.

Fair is fair, and the proposal sounds eminently fair. Indexing of salaries is routine now in corporations where unions are aggressive. In simple justice, indexing of tax brackets should aim be made routine.



Enforcing limits aids saving gas, lives

The loss of more than 50,000 lives on the nation's highways last year represented the highest number of traffic deaths since 1974, thus signaling a reversal in the downward trend of automobile fatalities that resulted from the 53-mile-per-hour speed limit.

The president of Continental Trailways, Kevin J. Murphy, recently asked the federal government to require 53-mile-per-hour governors on all intervisite commercial vehicles. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is currently seeking public comment on the proposed rule.

It would have a two-fold effect: Saving lives and reducing gasoline consumption by an estimated 250,000 barrels a day. But there appears to be little public endusiasm for the governors that prevent a car or truck from going faster than 55.

Other steps may prove to be just as effective, including reductions in the gas allocation for states that refuse to enforce the speed limit and stronger penalties for speeding and drunken driving.

States in the west and southwest, where motorism commonly drive at 70 to 90 miles an bour in wide open country, recorded a 25% increase in automobile fatalities last year. Inonically, these states want their gas allocation increased in the event of rationing. I favor reducing the allocation to states that fail to adequately enforce the 55-mile-per-hour limit.

The condition of the nation's highway also contributes to the casualties on the roads. It is clear the nation's expensive highway system is deteriorating faster than it is being repaired. Funds for highway repairs and improvements have now increased fast enough to keep up with the expansion of the interstate highway system and the number of vehicles on the road, in short, our road system is taking a bad pounding.

Highway safety experts claim one out of every five hridges in the United States is unsafe. Used daily by millions of care, trucks and buses, these hridges imperil human life. They also present difficulties for industry and agriculture through weight limitations and increased transportation costs. More than 26,000 bridges need to be replaced or repaired.

Another sup that must be taken in the elimination of hazards. States have reported as much as 30% reduction in fatalities and a 20% decrease in injuries at locations where roadway hazards have been corrected.

Foundation for Safety cautioning high school graduates
about the perilous mixture of parties, alcohol and
automobiles.

the foundation's parent organization, Matthew J. Derham, citres the message to urge the current crop of
seniors to avoid Joining the ghost graduates, the 2,300
18-year-olds who annually die in automobile wrecks
and never make it to their commencements.

"Police investigations of these deaths clearly demonstrate the yearly rash of fatal accidents during the
June graduate period is, in many cases, triggered by
alcohol," asid Mr. Derham.

He added "the problem has become to serious for
all of us, of whatever age, to remain complacent. We
must make a determined effort to alert young drivers
to the danger and eliminate this needless waste of young
lives."


The foundation is already part of this effort with its

The semi-annual tour of Union County's historic Deserted Village will begin at 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 17. Charles Hoag, a village resident, will meet visitors at the Trailiside Nature and Science Center at Colco Ave, and New Providence Rd, Mountainside, and will guide the two-bour tour.

The Deserted Village is nestled between the first and second mountains of the Watchung range along the east branch of the Green Brook. Peter Willcox received a grant of 424 acres of this land in 1736 and built a dam across the brook and a lumber mill below it. During the Revolution and the War of 1812, the mill was converted into a powder plant for coarse powder used by artillery before it and the land was sold to David Feit in 1845. This was the beginning of Feitville.

Houses, dormitories, a school bouse, a general store, a church, a barn and a blacksmith shop were erected to provide workers in the new paper factory with all they could need.

Today, the Deserted Village shares its beauty and cottages with tenants and the Outdoor Education Center. It is part of the Watchung Reservation.
