

County officials send more aid on flood work

On Sept. 14 Rahway City Council President Max Shield met with Frank C. Labadie, superintendent of bridges for Union County, with Arnold A. Florio, director of engineering for Union County, Frank T. Kocum, Rahway city engineer and Robert L. Farr, assistant superintendent of public works for Rahway at the culvert located on St. George Ave. between Sun Moore and the Galaxie Clinic and adjacent streets, with vegetation blocking the culvert.

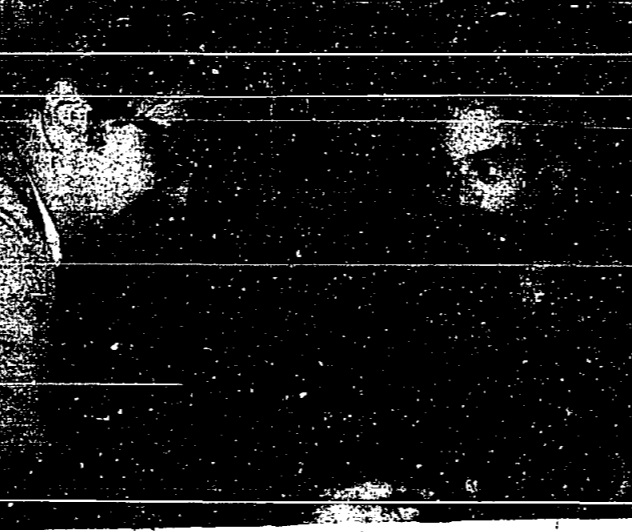
The county brought in a giant clam digger operated by cable. With this piece of equipment they were able to dig out the culvert and dig out all the vegetation and debris which had accumulated. The county also brought in its own truck on which all the vegetation and debris was loaded and removed.

Mr. Labadie and Mr. Florio also inspected the Orchard St. Brook between Madison Ave. and Jefferson Ave. It was found the clam digger, if used in the channel would do more harm than good. It might also collapse the bank causing blockage. Mr. Labadie promised to come in with a bulldozer, which is considerably smaller than the clam digger, and dig out the culvert and will enter the brook and clear the culvert.

After completing the work at the culvert, Councilman Shield and Mr. Farr inspected the culvert on Bramhall Rd. at the dividing line between Rahway and Woodbridge. They found the culvert which passes under the road is half in Rahway and half in Woodbridge. This culvert has been constantly clogging the culvert, they found Woodbridge has neglected to do the same. As a result, blockages are caused by debris which accumulates on the Woodbridge side.

In order to clear this situation, Mr. Kocum that day contacted Eugene DeLorenzo, director of public works for Woodbridge, and advised him of the situation, and made a note on the books by the culvert, pending a hazard to the people of Rahway, and requested Woodbridge's cooperation in removing it. Mr. DeLorenzo promised he would give his prompt attention to the matter and remove the debris.

Councilman Shield stated when the county can come back with their equipment they will continue their work.
