protection and road repairs. Federal assistance programs, including revenue sharing, have helped to absorb some of the costs of sists and local governments over the last several years. But with the faderal government running up huge budget deficits that contribute significantly to inflation and the loss of the dollar's value, prospects are dim federal vid will continue to increase. There are other ways, he sever, in which Congress can aid,

tate and local governments while reducing specding. Congress, for instance, can begin to take a closer look at the financial impact of federal legislation on local government. Clean air and water standards provide one example. Small cities and suburban communities have been forced to speed

millions of dollars to comply with environmental improve ments mandated by federal regulations. Welfare costs borne by state, county, and local governments are another. They have risen sharply as a result of expansion of Medicaid for the poor, programs for the handicapped, and a number of other federally initiated

health services. Public school expenditures have been going up, too, in order to meet standards ordered by the Dept. of Health,
