Dec. 10 fire routs 20 city residents

About 20 residents in a three-story house in Rahway were last night killed in a fire that started about 11 a.m. Firefighters stayed at the scene until 9 p.m. and hoisted up the structure. Flames were seen to travel up the top floor of the house, flames said. Fire officials said the cause apparently was a divided late second apartment, with more rooms on the top floor.



There is a possibility there were fire code violations in the building," one fire official said, though no specific violations were noted in the fire report. Report from Washington

Federal reform needed to ease home buying

Inflation is tearing the American dream of home ownership apart. It is forcing many families, especially those who bought their first homes, to find themselves priced out of the housing market.

The soaring cost of residential property and skyrocketing mortgage interest rates combine to create this national problem.

In Union County the impact also is being felt through a slump in new home construction and a resulting loss of jobs and tax revenues.

The Federal Reserve Board of Metropolitan New Jersey estimates that 54 new home construction projects a year are being lost in the county. This means that less than 10% of the homes that were planned to be built in 1979 will be completed.

These rising home costs coupled with soaring interest rates have created a situation in which less than 10% of American families can now afford to buy a home of their own. For every percentage point increase in mortgage interest rates, economists estimate that 1.7 million families are priced out of the housing market.

Ten years ago people spending from 16 to 20% of their family income on housing. Today, many spend more than 33% on housing. Some are committed to housing costs that amount to 40 to 50% of their income.

Families selling one home and buying another have the advantage of a 10 to 15 percent advantage in the way they can finance their new purchase. They can take advantage of lower interest rates and higher interest rates involved in the purchase of a new home.

Such an advantage does not, however, extend to young couples and others wanting to buy their first home. Consequently, they are the hardest hit victims of the soaring cost of housing.

On the average, the cost of a new home has risen twice as fast as a young couple's income while the cost of buying an existing home has risen at a rate 1.5 times as fast as their income.

An additional factor is, since lenders have less money to loan, they prefer a larger down payment in order to spread out their financial risks. This has forced first-time home buyers to put down more than 10 percent of the purchase price.

There are several actions that could be taken at the federal level to make home purchase easier, and all of these options are available.

They include an expansion of the graduated-payment mortgage program to cover the first two years of home purchase and gradually increasing the amount of the mortgage over the life of the mortgage. This particular help to young families who are unable to meet high mortgage costs in the early years of their working lives.

Another proposal under review is the establishment of individual housing accounts. This form of government assistance would offer people incentives to save for their own payment on a home. It would allow first-time home buyers to accumulate equity by setting aside a specified amount that would not be counted as income for federal tax purposes. The federal government would be reimbursed when any home purchased through this program is re-sold.

Another proposal is the use of tax-exempt revenue bonds as a source of mortgage finance for low and middle-income families who are unable to purchase a home.

In addition, the federal government should reduce Federal Housing Administration and Veterans Administration mortgage programs to make them more responsive to rapid changes in the housing market.

FHA mortgage ceilings for single-family homes are often based on unreasonably low property valuations. As a result, FHA mortgage ceilings are often a formula reflecting the actual current market value of the property involved.

More frequent adjustment of FHA and VA mortgage interest rates to better reflect changes in the housing market also would help.

The most effective solution for the housing market problem is to bring inflation under control, but this must be done by cutting federal spending and without resorting to a wage-price, freeze-type money policy. Such a policy would lead to a deeper and more prolonged recession and a catastrophic drop in new home construction with the door being slammed on millions of potential first-time home buyers.

This audit service will include on-site structural inspection of the dwelling. Audits will be performed by utility personnel at a \$10 charge. Combustion-efficiency tests of oil-fired furnaces will be provided by fuel-oil service personnel at a \$10 fee.

Home audits will be provided free of charge for residents eligible for the Lifetime Credit Program. Lifespan is designed to absorb some of the cost of home heating for the elderly, the disabled and the blind, with a state-funded \$100 utility credit.

The New Jersey Home Energy Savings Program has been conceived to secure maximum citizen participation," explained Energy Commissioner Joel E. Jackson.

This program will supply information and instruction that reduce some residential fuel bills as much as 50%, while reducing New Jersey's overall consumption of energy," he added.

The one-hour audits will instruct homeowners on what modifications they can make, especially small modifications that cost less than \$100, such as weatherstripping and caulking.

The program will be announced through inserts in all residential electric utility bills initially over the next three months. The public response is favorable, this program will be expanded.

Homeowners will be asked to contact their electric utilities for information and requests for audits. Gas-heating customers will be directed to contact their gas company, while oil heating homeowners will be referred to the NJDEP's toll-free Energy Information Line (800-992-0212).

To monitor and evaluate the quality and success of the program, the NJDEP will receive monthly summaries from each utility and from the Energy Information Line. Additionally, the NJDEP will re-examine randomly some of the on-site inspections performed by each utility.

Each month after the audit audits have been performed, follow-up questionnaires will be sent to homeowners on a random basis. The NJDEP will analyze the program's results to the United States Dept. of Energy as New Jersey's portion of the Federal Residential Conservation Service Program.

"We hope to be able to demonstrate our program is just as effective as the federally-mandated program, but with costs that are substantially lower," said Commissioner Jackson.

Utilities, state to audit energy use in homes

In a joint effort, the New Jersey Dept. of Energy, New Jersey Gas and Electric Utility Companies and the New Jersey Fuel Merchants Assn. will provide low-cost energy audits for the state's homeowners beginning this month.

This new service, called the New Jersey Home Energy Savings Program, will provide homeowner/occupants one-to-four-family dwellings with comprehensive information on conservation options and financing for home energy improvements.

Seventy high schoolers get top honors

Rahway High School's honor roll list for the first marking period was announced last week.

Among sophomores, high honors, which requires an average of 92 or better in all major subjects with no less than 84, was achieved by 17 students or approximately 13.7% of the 400-member class.
