



Live Christmas trees can have a longer life span and prolonged attractiveness if people know how to care for them, according to Thomas Ombrello, assistant professor of biology at Union College and an expert on gardening. Manager of the College's greenhouse, Prof. Ombrello was also responsible for the recently-established arboretum on the college's 50-acre campus. "Whether it is facship-cut or balled and builapped, the natural beauty and aroma of a Christmas tree in the home can be appreciated by everyone," he said. Cut trees have been a traditional favorite, and many will be sold this year in spite of the numerous artificial types available, he noted. "If you are planning to buy a cut tree, there are a few things to look for while shopping to insure your tree will last through the holiday season," the professor added. When selecting a tree, the consumer should give each one a good shake and carefully run his fingers down the length of a branch. If needles fall, the tree has dried out and will drop its needles rapidy once it gets indoors. Also, he said, be sure to kok at the cut end of the tree. A fresh, healthy tree should have a gummy sap oozing from it. Bet Combrellow the should prove to getick with the old reliable

Prot. Ombrello advised buyers to stick with the old reliable firs, pines and spruces. Unusual types, like hemlock, do not hold their needles well after being cut.
"Before you set your tree up indoors, make a fresh cut in the trunk, removing about an inch or so from the end to allow for better water absorption through the cut surface." he advised. "It is essential to keep the cut end of the tree submerged in water while it is indoors to keep the needles fresh and green."
Small bailed and burlapped evergreen trees are becoming more popular each year for use as decorated Christmas trees indoors," the expert explained.
"They cost more than the average cut tree, but they can be planted outdoors to become part of the landscape," the Union College professor said. "While some people purchase this type because they believe forests are being destroyed to provide cut trees, almost all Christmas trees, whether cut or balled and burlapped, are grown on Christmas tree farms and are handled like other agricultural commodities. The

trees are a renewable resource and their use as decorations in the home poses little threat to our country's forest." There are a few points to keep in mind if you purchase a living tree and if you want it to survive. Prof. Ombrello pointed out. He suggested an enclosed porch or an unheated garage. Once the tree is outdoors again, it should be planted, watered and staked as soon as possible in a hole prepared earlier when the soil was not yet frozen. "Planting a Christmas tree each year," the gardenning expert concluded, "can become a family project, whose results can be seen for generations to come."

### Utilities, state to audit

### energy use in homes

In a joint effort, the New Jersey Dept. of Energy, New Jersey's gas and electric utility companies and the New Jersey Fuel MerchantsAsen. will provide low-cost energy audits for the state's homeowners beginning this month. This new service, called the New Jersey Home Energy Savings Program. will provide homeowner/occupants of one-to-four-family dwelkings with comprehensive information on conservation options and financing for home energy immovements.

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This audit service will include on-site structural inspection of the dwellings. Audits will be performed by utility personnel at a \$15 charge. Combustion-efficiency tests of oil-fired furnaces will be provided by fuel-oil service personnel for a \$10 fee. Home audits will be provided free of charge for residents eligible for the Lifeline Credit Program. Lifeline is designed to absorb some of the costs of home heating for the elderly, the disabled and the blind, with a state-funded \$100 utility credit.

The New Jersey Home Energy Savings Program has been conceived to secure maximum citizen participation," explained Energy Commissioner Joel R. Jacobson. This program will supply information and instruction that can reduce some residents' fuel bills as much as 50%, while reducing New Jersey's overall consumption of energy," he added. added. The one-hour audits will instruct homeowners on what modifications they can make, especially small modifications that cost less than \$100, such as weatherstripping and

that cost less than \$100, such as weatherstripping and culting. The program will be announced through inserts in all residential electric utility bills initially over the next three months. If the public response is favorable, this period may be extended. Electric customers will be asked to contact their electric gustomers will be directed to contact their gas company, while oil heating homeowners will be referred to the NDDE's toll-free Energy Information Line (800) 492-4242. To monitor and evaluate the quality and success of the program, the NJDOE will receive monthly summaries from each utility and from the Energy Information Line. Additionally, the NJDOE will re-examine randomly some of the on-site inspections performed by each utily. 

### **Death of Toma's son** led to his crusading

Although "the man of 1,000 faces" was told by superiors he was a discredit to the department and an embarrassment, he replied his arrests were snowballing and his conviction rate was near perfect. As a pollceman, when he used disguises. Clark's David form never fired a gun because, he said, "I'd rather sneak in without hurting anyone. With my disguises I can get in an arrest someone before he knows what's happening. I don't give him enough time to get rid of the evidence." The Clarkite said he once spent six weeks disguised as a janitor, painter and repairman. This resulted in the arrest of 14 persons from Newark. East Orange and Jersey City, breaking an \$18-million-a-year lottery operation, considered "the largest lottery ring in New Jersey history." Tragedy, however, hit the area resident at the age of 30. One Sunday he had dislodged a piece of charcoal from a three-year-old black boy's mouth. After Mr. Toma applied mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, the boy was rushed to a Newark hospital and doctors credited the coliceman with saving his life. However, as he was sitting in his patrol car, the dispatcher's voice cut in sharply, about 45 minutes after the charcoal incident. Although "the man of 1,000 faces" was told by supe

He was told to get home because something was wrong with his five-year-old son, David Toma. The boy was gasping for breath and choking on a piece of meat. The policeman began shaking his son and patting his back violently in hopes of jarring the meat loose. The same ambulance which had rushed the Newark boy to the hospital sped David there. It was too late, however, and, dispite several minutes of feverish work by doctors, the boy died. Heartick, the man who was to become an area hero, unsheathed his police pistol and was stopped short of suicide by fellow policement at the scene. The grief from his son's death finally led to his popping up to 100 ranquilizers a day to ease the pain. Fellow police officers poked fin at him and told him to see a psychiatrist, but he received the courage to beat his addiction from the words of his mother, "Be strong. Have your desire overcome your fear." An attempt to write a book about his police life and battles with addiction gradually led to the television series, "Toma," and later to "Baretta." After "Toma" ended its television run he began speaking out to teenagers about drug addition all around the country. In spite of an arthrits-riddled body and a herniated disc in his lower spine, he still continues his crusade against drugs and alcohel.
