### Senate proposes bill for cost officient laws

New Jersey's 18-year-old fiscal-note law is in the process New Jersey's 15-year-old inscal-note inw is in the process of being replaced by a new measure of a Senate bill as amended and passed by the Senate is subsequently emoted, reports a New Jersey Taspayers Asan, spokesman. A fiscal note, often described as a price tag, gives legislators and the public the estimated financial impact in dollars of a proposed bill for a stated period of one, two or three vert

iegulators and the public the estimated maachai supper in dollars of a proposed bill for a stated period of one, two or three years. The intent is for a note to be requested of the department or agency affected whenever a bill contains provisions which would either increase or decrease levels of speending or revenues of the state, or of a county, municipality, special district or school district. The present fiscal-note law, enacted in 1962, has not been particularly effective. A special study for the Legislature's Joint Appropriations Committee by the staff of the Division of Budget and Program Review examined the time response to fiscal-note requests by agencies. Of 609 note requests in the 1978-1979 legislative session oup to September of last year, over 400, 59%, had not been completed. Half of the completed notes took eight weeks or less, but the remaining half took eight or more weeks. A similar analysis in 1973 on a larger number of bills showed a much better time response. However, 28% of the notes were never completed. The analysis of chapter laws for which a fiscal note had been requested over a four-year period revealed 27 of 74 were enacted without a note ever being submitted, and only 20 had a note when first world on in the house of origin. While the law sets forth the procedure to be followed by the Enecutive Budget Office when a fiscal note is requested, the initiation of requests for fiscal notes was prescribed in the rules of each house. While early rules dia out make motes mandatory, subsequent rule changes required notes be remended by committee chairnes before measures in the lession abilite for a

mandatory, subsequent rule changes required notes be requested by committee chairmen before releasing bills for a vote and by the presiding officer of the house if the bill by passed committee consideration. by-passed committee consideration. Failure of the Legislature to comply with its rules is partly to blane for the limited success of the fiscal note law. Executive delay, failure in preparation and poor estimating Executive delay, failure in preparation and poor estimating are other reasons. Past shortcomings were considered in drafting the new bill, which would impose a specific timetable for each step in the note process, with the total maximum elapsed time for receipt of note request by the static hadget efficient to return of the completed note to the Legislature fixed at 30 days. An emergency request would reduce the timetable to 10 days.


