

For those who think botanists live exciting, even vegetative, lives, consider the adventures of Rutger's University's John H. Crow in the Alaska Pacific wetlands.

He's been treed by an Alaskan brown bear, which is a giant version of the grizzly.

He's been a passenger on a plane that caught fire and aboard another that got totally lost in the forgenism failed. He had to jump to safety from a boat that trent down in the icry, gaicier-fed water of Alaska's Copper River Delta and was forced to pull a shift Il miles in a riverbed and trudge another 22 miles to civilization when the besh pilet who was supposed to pick him up forgot completely about him. Then there were the somewhat-more-typical days be spent on and off since 1965, going about the business of his research: Patiently recording the vegetation of the marshes and deltas along Alaska's Pacific coast and analyzing the food habits of the martine organisms those wellands support.

His work has formed a documented picture of life in this relatively-unnouched region. It is a picture that has already helped sway decisions on how the wellands should be used.

"I don't want to say 'no' to all development. From my research, we can also tell how and when to say 'yea," says Dr. Crow.

An associate professor of botany at the state university's Newark College of Arrs and Sciences, Dr., Crow has plousered in collecting data along Alaska's Pacific coast from Juneau to Anchorage.

expanding world population, the professor emphasizes, "then these wetland habitats have got to be protected, I mean really protected."

"That docan't mean we can't use the wetlands or we can't develop allongside of them, but it does mean to the country of them and the food habits of marine life played a part in saving Alaska's fertile Kachemak Bay from oil drilling, Kachemak Bay may be one of the riches in northern bays in the world in its upplies of crabs, shrimp and braives.

The drilling, for what Dr. Crow calls a "rather limited supply of oil," was to have taken place right in the middle of a big king-crab breeding area. But the proposal met tremendous opposition from another business operation, commercial fishermen.

The drilling was called off as a result of the professor's studies, complementary work by other scientists, research and recommendations by the Alaska Dept of Fish and Game, and what Dr. Crow terms a maturing ecological windom on the part of the state of Alaska. The final blow was an accident that occurred in moving the drilling rig from its parting place.

Dr. Crow also did before-and-after studies on Port Valdez, the terminus of the Alaska oli pipeline. Under a grant from the United States Dept. of the linearior in 1970, be collected baseline data from the area, resuring to Valdez in 1974 and 1975 after the pipeline was under construction. He found the construction companies "mostly did a good job, better than you di think it you saw the amount of earth fibry moved. But that's not to say they didn't do a fair amount of damage."

"Largely, he added, because "they just didn't know what they were doing when it came to wetlands."

Although his work in Alaska has had an impart on public-policy declaions, Dr. Crow points out much of it has been been the fairly routine treaerch of botanists and ecologists everywhere: Selecting study plots of vegetation and recording the names of plants, sheir rate of growth, their flowering and other characteristics."

During World Ward II the United States kept nearly half a million Nari prisaners of war in more than 500 Prisoner of War camps across the nation. Since our nation had few precendents by which to form policy, and virtually me experience in handing asso-English-speaking captives, it is 'remarkable how well we did. Yes, it is heart-warming to read about this success story in a new hook by Arnold Krammer, "Nazi Prisoners of War in America." Before writing it, the andoor intertwiewed many former German prisoners of war as well as their American captors. He learned the German prisoners were treated so humanely at the end of the war many of them wanted to remain over here. By making the prospect or surrender leas odings in the German websymmeth, it is quite possible this humane treatment may have shortened the war in Europe and hastened the arrival of Victory in Europe Day.

Those days, now 30 in 35 years in the past, are recalled as "wonderful years" and "the experience of their lives" by former POW's, many of whom are now prospectous German humanesment.

The General Convention was taken seriously by our nation, POW camps here were constructed to the same standards as American camps and the German prisoners received a chet as good as that enjoyed by American troops at home.
