A symposium intended as a first step to avoid a solid waste disposal crisis in Union County and to explore the concept of Benserce Boovery attracted more than 50 government and industrial leaders recently. Assemblyman Robert Franks, who organised the symposium held at the Plainfield Public Library, said the moeting "created for thee first time a gracess of public input for the eachange of ideas on solid waste management."

Union Causty has a mandate from State Dept. of Environmental Protection commissioner, Mrs. Jerry F. English, to stop its dumping of solid waste at the Mandavalanda manitary landfill. Eight communities are directly affected. Assemblyman Franks said the alternatives are resource recovery or a long-term contract with landfill apartments in Middlesex County.

Among those attending were Stamley Pauls, representing Morek & Co., inc. of Rahway and Assemblyman William J. Maguire of Clork.



"It is working well elsewhere in the country and, despite the shart-sorm cast, might very well emerge as the best notation for our problems in our country."



The heavy tax burden is a major reason why I am pressing no strongly in Congress for substantial cuts in federal income tax. Important factors are that high tax rates are strangling economic growth, slowing production, pushing up prices and retarding savings and investments.

The most effective economic policy that Congress can follow is to cut federal spending by eliminating waste and inefficiency while also providing an across-the-board tax cut. Unfortunately, Congress has been resisting a tax cut and has not been as vigorous as it should be in cracking down on bereaucratic waste. Some budget cuts have been made, but the overall federal budget is higher than ever before.

I want Congress to terminate selected agencies and programs that have outlived their usefulness and to insist on more efficiency and economy in all government operations.

To aid the nation's economy, I am urging Congress to slash income tax rates by at least 10%. In addition, I am fighting for legislation I have introduced that would encourage savings by exempting more of the interest earned on small savings accounts from federal taxation.

I also have sponsored and an strongly pushing legislation to roll back scheduled Social Security tax increases that are expected to take an extra \$400 a year from the sverage wage earner. In addition, I have introduced a bill to prohibit the proposed taxation of Social Security benefits.

Combring tax cuts with a drive to climinate waste in government and with a real balanced budget is the kind of approach Congress must take if it is to be effective in the buttle against inflation.



It was suggested a course entitled "Science in the Field" be added to the program, but the suggestion was withdrawn after it was explained budget limitations make that impossible for inclusion this year.





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
