Board ponders new policy on evaluations

A revised policy on staff observation and evaluation was introduced by the Rahway Board of Education Sept. 15. Under the policy, final evaluations would be the responsibility of the principal, but would require collective input and deliberation with other administrative personnel. A schedule of observation sessions would be set up at the beginning of each school year and each teacher would be given written notice about those who would be tentatively scheduled to observe him.

Non-teaching staff members would be observed a minimum of once by the building administration and at least once by an appropriately-certified supervisor.

Tenured staff members would be observed a minimum of once during the school year.

All final evaluations for tenured staff members would be completed by April 30 and forwarded to the superintendent of schools by May 15.

All final evaluations of non-tenured staff members would be completed by March 20 and forwarded to the superintendent of schools by April 1.

- Increased the salaries of the following teachers to the following amounts for the coming more college credits: Frank Monahan, \$12,755; Mrs. Madeline Schmitt, \$12,755; and Mrs. Charles Wray, \$12,400.
- Transferred Mrs. Irene Rempersawski from being a Madison School elementary teacher to teaching Title No. 1 pre-school at Madison, effective Sept. 14 of this year, for the balance of the 1960-1961 school year at the annual salary of \$16,500.
- Added eight names to the 1960-1961 substitute teacher list.

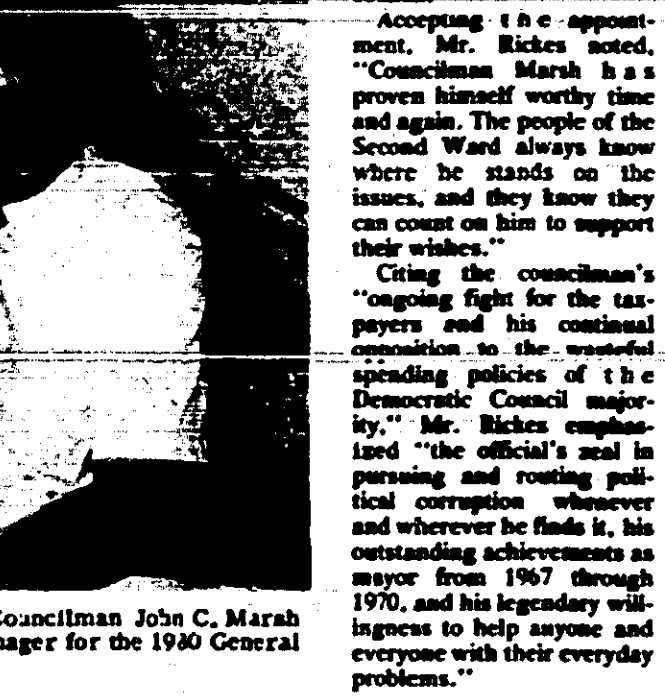

High school overhaul to undergo cost estimate

A study to determine whether a major overhaul of Rahway High School's physical plant will be necessary was authorized by the city Board of Education Sept. 15.

The only Board member to vote against authorizing the submission of a proposal of cost to do the study by Finner & Kim Architects was Louis G. Buch.

He said, although he had no objections to the work of Finner & Kim, architects should be obtained from other architects in order to encourage competition.

Building a 44 Classrooms, Committee Chairman Louis G. Buch, said, "The system has undertaken and thought they could do the best study for the least amount."
