
If you feel all of a sudden you are being deluged with talk about the family, you are absolutely right. Naive clergymen have boarded the bandwagon, although many neglect to mention the family was ordained by God or he estate of holy matrimony is sanctified for the benefit of offspring as much as for the consenting couple.

A selevision station recently featured a slogan, "Families are for life," an admirable sentiment. The station coupled this with a shot of a woman with two children who, as a "single parent," proclaimed, "Double the trouble but twice or to bolster the morale of widows with children, the piece certainly suggested the traditional concept of the family with a father, a mother, children and perhaps grandparents or maiden aunts was totally passe.

The hoop-la about the family emanated from the White House Conference on Families, underwritten by the taxpayers after being called by President Jimmy Carter has served, however, as a front for promoting pre-ordained conclusions which will be costly not only in taxes but in the transfer of control of the family to Big Papa and Big Mama in The conference sponsored state conferences in which every dirty trick conceivable was used to keep traditional mothers from being elected delegates. They culminated this past summer in three national conferences in Baltimore. disacconis and Los Angeles which, predictably, promote

extremism and immorality even as did the International Women's Year Conference in Houston in 1977. The same "alternate lifestyle" and "women's liberation" groups which dictated the 25 resolutions passed in Houston ere at it again. Do you recall how they came out strong for federally funded abortions, the Equal Rights Assendment lesbian privileges and massive federal child care? Now they want increased federal power to force the rest of the United States to accept their cock-eyed way of losking at life, love and family. Among the legislative demands expected to issue from the national could are: Federally-funded-and-controlled development centers for pre-school childrien, socialized medicine for all children and, by extension, for all families, how-to-do-it courses in normal and abnormal sexual activities, such as has already been mandated in New Jersey by the State Board of Education, instruction for children on how to avoid or terminate pregnancies without letting their parents know, federal control of all wages under the present of "equal pay for equal work" and federally-financed facilities for abused wives, where they can be indoctrinated The pleimate grade of the "alternate life-style" advocates re believed to be: Elevation of unmarried parents and lesbines to the same social status as true families, morriage licenses for homosexuals, raising of homosexuality to the status of a "civil right," with a tie-in to "affirmative action,"

denial to the courst of the right to consider moral factors in awarding child custody and removal of the moral stigma from killing the unborn. Of course, any conference on families should be dominated not by noctal radicals but by those who are experts on families, that is, those who have intact families as that word as traditionally been defined. But the National Organization of Women last year defined a family as "two or more people who share resources, share responsibilities for decisions. share values and goals, and have commitments to one another over time, regardless of blood, legal ties, adoption or marriage." 


ghostwriters hired by government agencies to prepare Congressional reports. Nobady knows for sure the size and scope of the government ghostwriting business, but it is estimated to be in the tens of millions of dollars. A General Accounting Office survey has revealed much of the work appears to be in violation of policy, and the reports are frequently pawned off on an unsuspecting Congress as the work of the agencies.

A GAO check of seven federal agencies disclosed four out of 10 Congressionally mandated reports were prepared for the agencies by outside consultants. It is estimated they paid a total of \$17 million for ghostwritten work during the 1977-1979 facal years. This is just a fraction of the \$2 billion GAO estimates is spent each year by the government for

consultants and federal agencies, the GAO made some interesting revelations:
--Fifty-four percent of the contracts studied were awarded in the last 90 days of the fiscal year. As an example of this type of abuse, GAO reported one Office of Education contract or \$96,700 was awarded to fund an unsolicited proposal. Agency officials admitted parts of the study would not have my relevance to the agency's mission, but stated the money was granted primarily because a surplus of funds existed at -Of the 60 completed contracts reviewed by GAO, 20 of value to the agencies. In defending the practice of hiring ghostwriters, agency pokesmen explained that they turned to outside consultants ecause they either did not have the time or the expertise to at the requested documents together. While there were instances when outside expertise was ecessary to assist in the preparation of highly specialized reports, there are indications the agencies routinely hired consultants as a means of circumventing personnal ceilings imposed by the Office of Management and Budget.

Evenmore disconcerting is the frequent failure on the part of the agencies to reveal or adequately disclose the reports were pared by outside consultants. Because these reports have potential to influence the direction of government, e consultants' roles should be fully disclosed in the reports. l am arging the Office of Management and Budget to crack down on agencies using outside ghostwriters to produce reports that should be prepared by the respective staffs of
