## City Council elections in all six wards could sway control of Governing Body away from Democrats

The control of City Council will be determined by Saturday's election in Tuesday's General Election.

Democrats now hold a 5-3 edge on the Governing Body, including two of the three councilmembers at large, set up for election in the six ward race.

Democratic incumbents are running in only the First and Third Wards, with the remainder of the candidates seeking ward Council seats for the first time.

Republican incumbents are running in the Second and Sixth Wards. By taking over these two wards and the seat at large, they could attain a 3-4 majority.

The candidates and their backgrounds are listed below.

**First Ward Democratic incumbent, Daniel V. O'Connor**, a retired shipyard and contract supervisor, is seeking his second term. He is opposed by Lawrence J. Scheraga, a retired shipyard worker and chairman of the fundraising committee for the American Cancer Society in Rahway.

**Second Ward Republican incumbent, John C. Mark**, who was elected in 1976, is completing his 14th year as his ward's representative.

He served seven years as a union president before assuming his present position, and was vice president of the Fourth Ward Civic Association and a member of the run for the Governing Body in 1976. He is a member of the City Council and City Council President Patrick J. Conroy. The Republican nominee for that office is supervisor Crawford, Walter L. Pitts, Mr. Pitts is a veteran of the Navy amphibious force and a decorated member of the U.S. Coast Guard.

**Third Ward incumbent, Walter L. Pitts**, is a member of the U.S. Coast Guard and a charter member of the Winfield Ambulance and Fire Aid Squad. He is the delegate to the New Jersey State Safety Council. Mr. Pitts has been an employee of the Linden Motor Freight Co. in Linden for 22 years.

**Fourth Ward Republican incumbent, James J. Falomera**, is a former chairman of the Union County Health Advisory Council and president of the Rahway Local Club. He is a political science and history teacher at Elizabeth High School. Councilman Falomera was the recipient of the "Outstanding Young Man in America" award in 1968. He is a member of the American Legion and the Elks Club.

**Fifth Ward incumbent, Lawrence C. Butler**, is a retired shipyard worker and chairman of the fundraising committee for the American Cancer Society in Rahway. He is opposed by Bernard D. **Sixth Ward Republican incumbent, James J. Falomera**, is a former chairman of the Union County Health Advisory Council and president of the Rahway Local Club. 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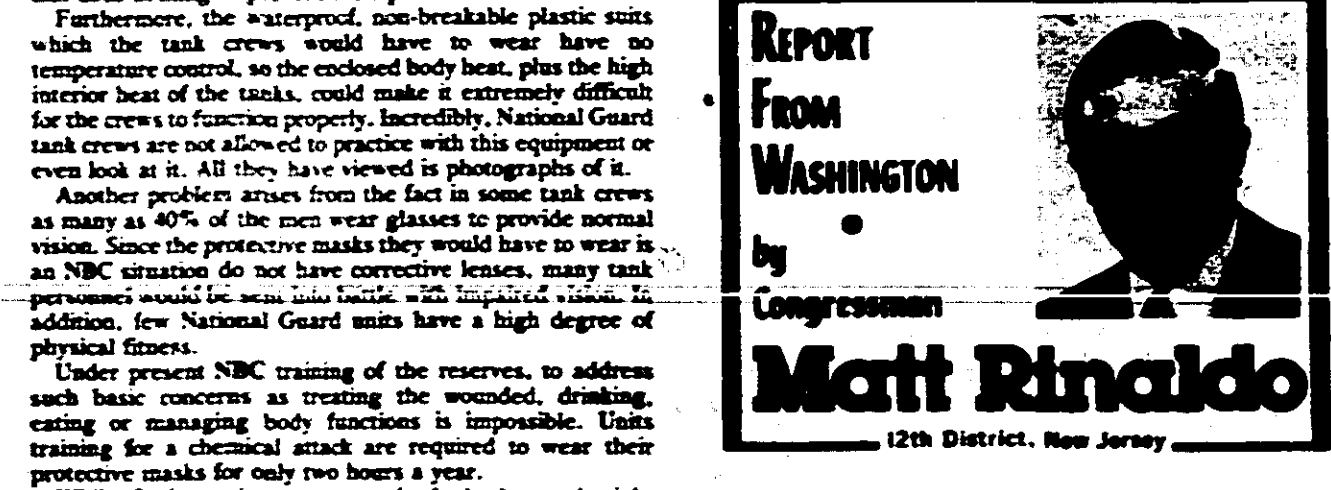

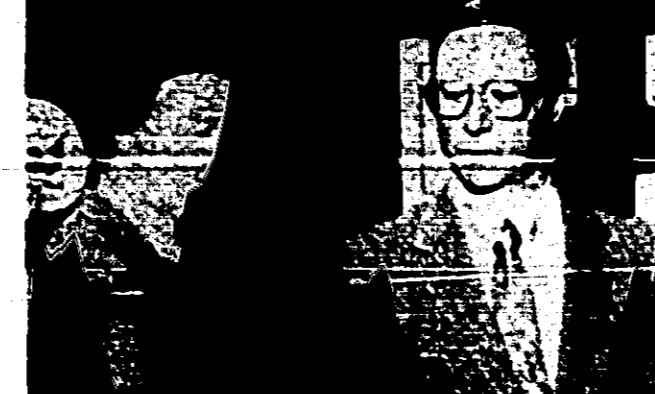

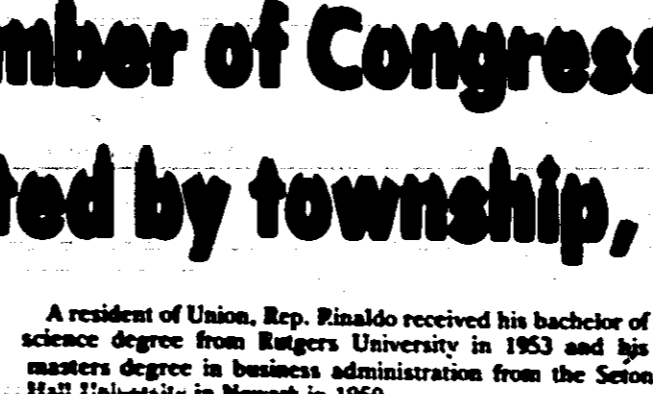
