G. O. P. HOPEFULS WIN IN FIRST, SECOND, FIFTH AND SIXTH WARDS

Republicans will take control of City Council when the Governing Body reorganizes in January

President Jimmy Carter helped to drag the local Democratic Party to defeat Tuesday night, as the Old Party faithful captured seats in two wards previously held by Democrats.

In the First Ward a Democratic candidate, Lawrence C. Butler, won a very narrow victory over incumbent, James J. Fulkerson, 771 to 757. This ward has traditionally been represented by Democrats, with a few exceptions.

In the Second Ward, incumbent Councilman John C. Marsh won a narrow victory over Democrat, James J. Fulkerson, 771 to 757. This ward has traditionally been represented by Democrats, with a few exceptions.

In the Third and Fourth wards, the Democrats were winners. The First Councilman Max Shield won 1,984 to 1,903, a surprisingly close vote considering Councilman Shield has been very active in the ward.

In the Fourth Ward, the Democratic incumbent, Harvey Williams, defeated Republican challenger, Herbert J. Doolittle, 1,027 to 927. In the race for the House of Representatives, the Republican incumbent, James J. Fulkerson, defeated Democrat, Ralph Froehlich, 1,514 to 456.

The big local winner in Tuesday's election was State Representative James J. Fulkerson, who carried the First Ward by a narrow margin of 17 votes. Fulkerson, a former councilman, won 1,514 to 456, Councilman Fulkerson was mentioned by several local politicians as a possible candidate for mayor at the City Hall election center Tuesday night, as the ward of voters for some time in the past.

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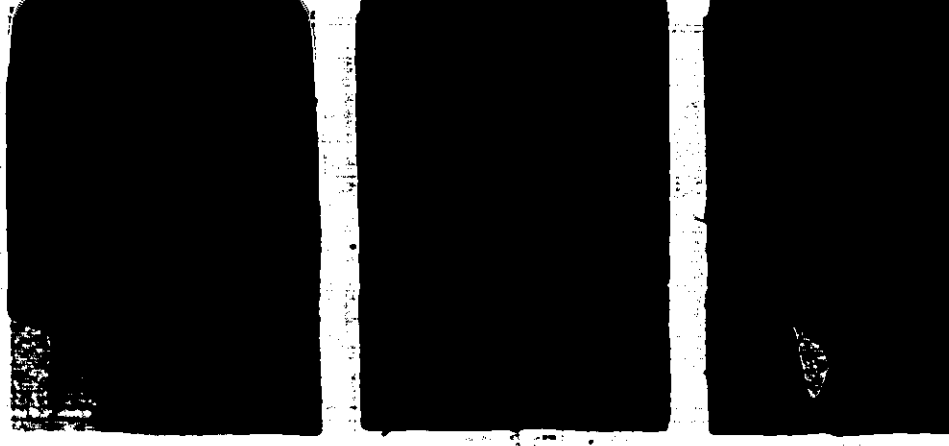

In the Fifth Ward, incumbent Councilman Arthur L. Barker, 745 to 703. The ward has generally been Republican and was returning to its normal voting pattern.

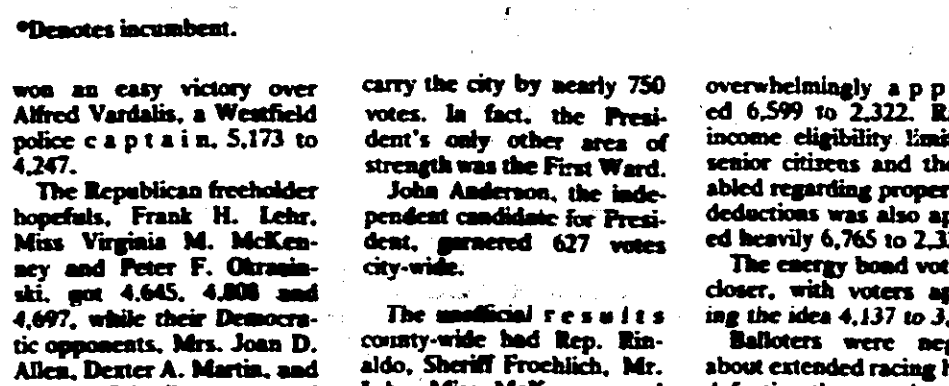
In the Sixth Ward, incumbent Councilman Walter L. Pina, 845 to 703. The ward has generally been Republican and was returning to its normal voting pattern.

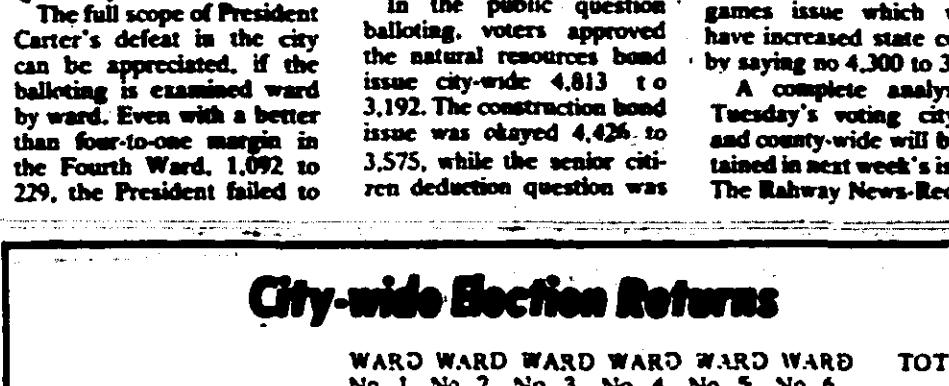

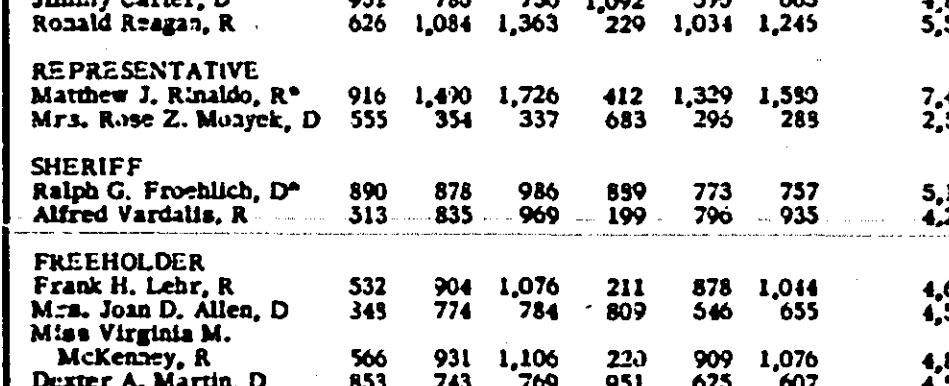

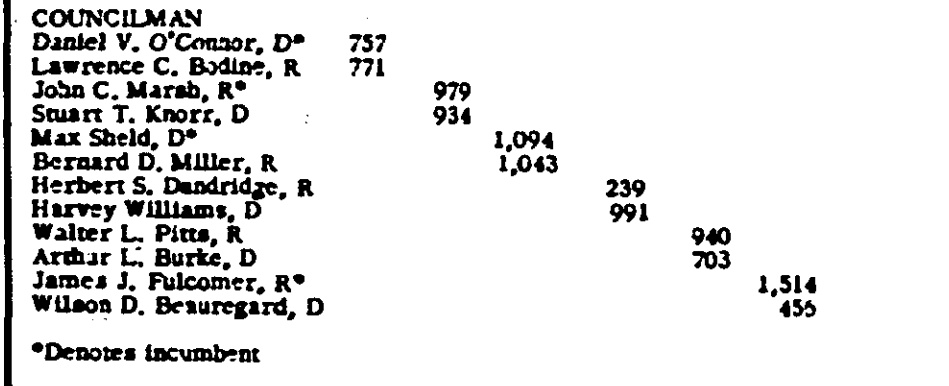

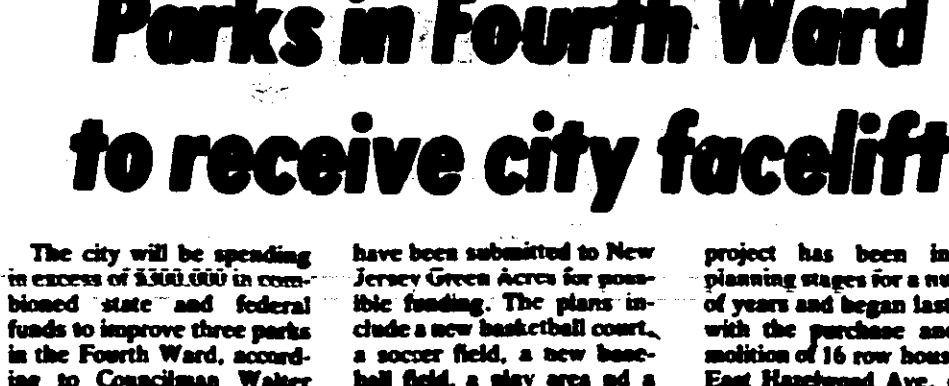

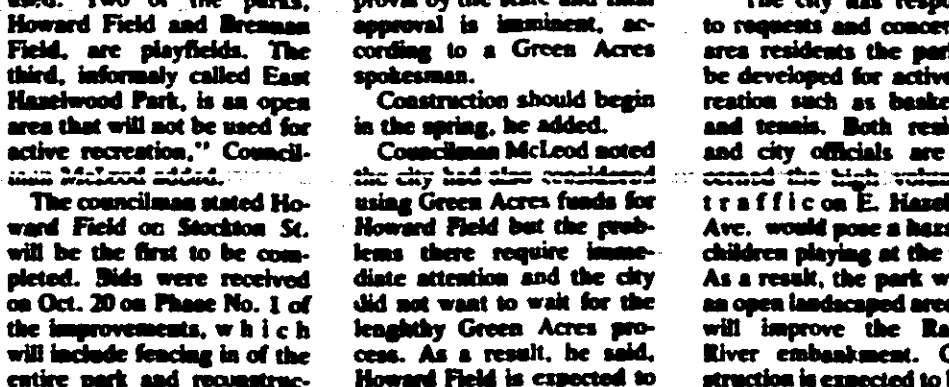

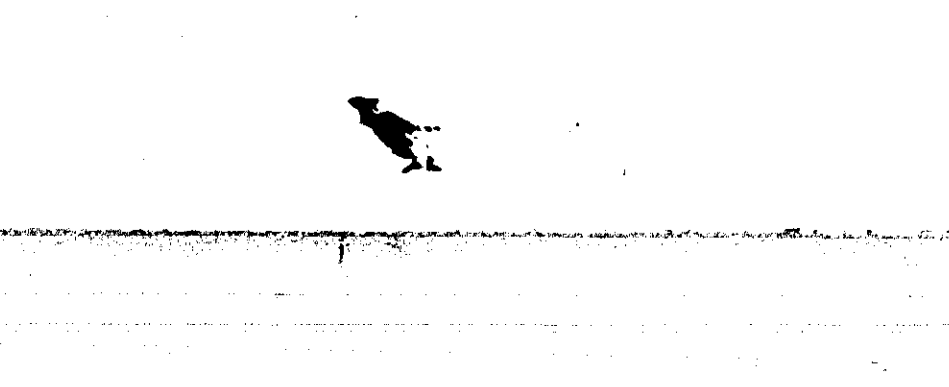

City students improve testing over two years

City Board of Education announced Oct. 28 announced students had been an average 10% better on the 1958 New Jersey Mathematics State Skills test than two years ago.

Students in grades three, six and nine improved scores on the average, thus in 1958. The scores on the mathematics in grade 11 were an equal to 1956, but better than last year's.

A report on the city's results in both the state test and the lower Test of Basic Skills, a national test, was presented to the Board Oct. 28.

The director of student personnel services, William B. Henschler, delivered the statistics, which were noticeably higher than those achieved in the past five years.

The purpose of the tests is to measure the adequacy of skills being taught in the classrooms, to identify weaknesses, and to evaluate what steps can be taken to modify or correct the student's learning.

For the first time since 1952, the average score of all students in the city was 64.7, compared with 63.7 in 1956. On a national level, students in all grades improved scores in mathematics, science and social studies.

These gains were linked to "readiness" testing in lower grades, the school principal said.

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City residents oppose waste-recovery plant

A small group of Rahway citizens living near the site of a proposed recovery plant in Linden County, N. J., are opposing the plan. They fear the plant will cause noise, odor, and traffic problems.

The plant is located near the intersection of Linden County Road No. 1 and Linden County Road No. 2. The plant would process waste materials from the city.

The citizens are concerned about the impact of the plant on the surrounding residential area. They believe the plant will lower property values and cause environmental damage.

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Parks in Fourth Ward to receive city facelift

The city will be spending a record \$100,000 in combined state and federal funds to improve three parks in the Fourth Ward, according to Councilman Walter McLeod.

The city money will be used. Two of the parks, Howard Field and Berman Field, are playfields. The third, informally called East Haverwood Park, is an open area that will be used for active recreation.

The councilman stated Howard Field on Berman St. will be the first to be completed. This field was received on Oct. 20 on Phase No. 1 of the Emergency Green Acres program. As a result, he said, the field is expected to be completed this fall.

The East Haverwood Park have been submitted to the New Jersey Green Acres for possible funding. The plan includes a new baseball court, a soccer field, a new tennis court, a play area and a walking area.

The city has responded to requests and concerns of area residents the park will be developed for active recreation such as baseball, soccer, tennis, and walking. Both residents and city officials are concerned about the high cost of the park.

United Way sets \$13,500 as goal

A spokesman for the United Way of Rahway, which began its 1958-1959 fund-raising drive Oct. 23, announced its goal is \$13,500. This money will help support local human-care agencies that serve the citizens of Rahway, he added.

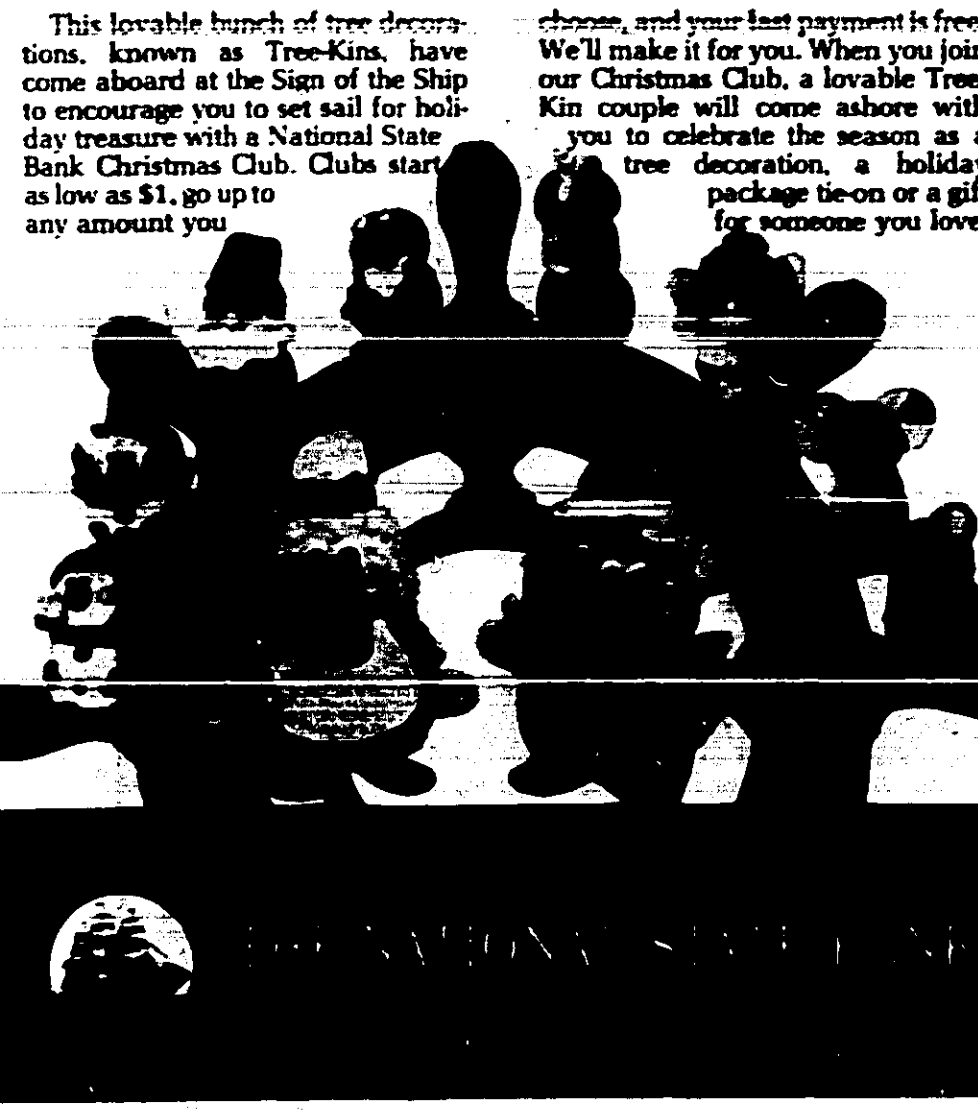

Big scissors needed on government octopus

Executive government regulation is stifling United States business activity and a growing consensus view of business leaders and consumers is that the government is doing too much. The House of Representatives has passed a bill to cut 10 percent of the federal budget, and the Senate is expected to pass a similar measure. This is a significant step towards reducing the size of the federal government and its impact on the economy.

When you take to the road, check the warranty, check for recalls and get a written estimate. The first thing to do is to check the dealer's obligation under a manufacturer's original or extended warranty to fix your car. The owner's manual is the best way to find out what your original warranty covers. In some cases, manufacturers will extend their warranties on cars that are found to have defects which show up after the normal warranty period.
