

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Body glue won't stick to government red tape

"Of all sad words of tongue or pen the saddest are these, 'k misht have been.' " How aptly these words apply to body give, which was invented in the 1950's. When applied as a fine mist, body give will stop bleeding from open wounds and give human tissues together.

Used extensively in Vietnam, where it saved handreds of lives, this process offered great promise as a cure for internal bleeding, sicers and strokes. After trying for 25 years to win approval from the United States Food and Drug Administration for body glue, the companies involved have finally abandoned hope. So, instead of being made available to physicians & life-saving purposes, it is now being marketed in discount stores as a general-purpose bousehold gine. This is only one example of a major problem in our country, due to the foot-dragging of the FDA. It should recognize nothing will ever be altogether safe for everybody. Even the "miracle drugs" like autibiotics have unpleasant and occasionally-fatal side effects for some individuals. But the FDA appears scared of its own shadow, at least when it comes to making affirmative pronouncements. When

it came to condemning sactherine and crasherries on very flimsy evidence, it never hesitated. Prom 1973 to 1977, there were 339 drug discoveries voctdwide, of which 74 were made in the United States. All but if were put to use in other actions before they were even approved here.



True jobless reports could increase jobs

Many economists and statisticians who have studied the methods of calculating the nation's jobless rate claim it is inflated by as much as 2%. The bloated unemployment figures are making the economy worse by stimulating government borrowing and spending, and triggering a number of federal outitlement programs such as food stamps, job training, economic assistance and public-works projects whose cost is in the

This is in addition to the billions in unemployment payments to workers who either are only part-time employes or report they are interested in working only in order to qualify for welfare benefits. The National Commission on Unemployment Statistics made a study of the method of gathering information on unemployment and reported the cost of federal programs related to joblessness increased from less than \$1 billion a vear in 1970 to over \$10 billion last year. It also found a 1% drop in the unemployment rate can save at least another \$5.5 billion in direct unemployment The method of calculating unemployment has not kept up with the changes in the work force and welfare laws that now require welfare recipients to register for work, whether or not



The Joint Economic Committee of Congress estimated nearly 25% of all those classified as unemployed are really rested in obtaining part-time jobs that average about 20 Remedying this inflation in unemployment statistics might save as much as \$10 billion annually without reducing memployment benefits to those out of work and seeking

New Jersey already owes the federal government \$625 nillion to cover its borrowing to pay unemployment benefits. more accurate method of reporting unemployment would telp to reduce this debt that is borne by employers and uployes and is discouraging new jobs in the state. One proposal that deserves serious consideration is Congress is to require the Bureau of Labor Statistics to ollect and report job vacancies during the same time period By deducting the number of job openings from the nemployment figures, it would obtain a more accurate rate of unemployment. Adjustments would be allowed for certain seasonal fluctuations, such as summer jobs at resorts. The need for job-vacancy data as related to the semployment rate is underscored by the large number of op-wanted ads appearing in cities with high unemploynest. Accurate employment information would help those

really seeking work and aid labor-market specialists in veloping job-training programs that fit the needs of the I will ask the new secretary of labor to develop the reidelines for this proposal so it may be offered to Congress

as part of a new economic recovery strategy.



Pie-in-sky accords flatten in job market

Anyone who has been looking for a job or considering a job

change recently has probably seen advertisements from firms which have been described as "employment-consulting firms," "career-commoffing centers," "job-search consultsats." or the like. These flows are not licented private employment agencies Only private employment agencies which are Hornsed by the lyision of Consumer Affairs may engage in the business of providing actual job-placement services in New Jersey.

The basic protection provided to the public is the consumer is not liable for any fee unless he is actually placed in a job. This basic rate does not apply, however, to the to-called employment-consulting firms. These firms do not place their clients in specific jobs. They provide counseiling to job seekers and services to assist in finding jobs. They have been the source of complaints by consumers across the country. Slick promotional techniques are used to sell their services, often at incredibly exorbitant prices, and often people sign contracts not fully realizing how little they will receive in return for their money. Problems usually arise when consumers realize what they have purchased in no way assures they will secure

employment.

Despite all the nestly-packaged promotional materials presented by these firms, consumers usually find they receive acthing more than lists of business or corporations in their particular field, advice on personal appearance and interviewing techniques and tips on resume writing. All of this is svallable in local libraries for free. Anyone who is considering the use of an employmentcounselling firm should first read everything is the contract offered by the firm. It is crucial the contract precisely reflect the consumer's understanding of what the firm has agreed to do. Many problems arise when consumers claim the oral promises made by the firm's representatives went beyond what was contained in the contract. Consumers should inquire about the training, experience and background of the "counsellors" employed by the firms to assist their customers. Consumers should also inquire about the success of previous customers in finding jobs.

PRODUCT-SAFETY NOTES: During the pest year more than 23,000,000 products were recalled as a result of actions taken by the United States Consumer Product Safety These included some 600,000 liquid-propens gas water heaters which could have posed an explosion hazard, 400,000 indoor gymnastic houses whose designed posed a risk of injury to children, 115,000 snowmobiles which contained otential defects and 40,000 garden sprayers whose conisters could repture under pressure. In addition, Commission action resulted in recalls of hair dryers containing asbestos. A total of 49 firms took such action, affecting some 22 million products. Again we find the Rahway mayor praising his administra-tion and management of the city inspite of the well-known record of he and his business administrator.

He states 253 property owners sold their homes at higher over the country. My guess is the Rahway sales were not for profit but because of high taxes. The mayor takes pride in the fact property values in Rahway have gone up 16%, while in the other Union County municipalities they have risen only 11%, which proves the Rahway taxpayers are paying 5% more in taxes to Union County and to the state than do the other communities -surely no cause for bragging. Two years ago, during the height of the discussion of the additional cost to the texpayers for the new City Hal construction, the mayor stated it would cost an additional \$22

per year on a property assessed at \$40,000, the business ministrator stated it would cost \$23 and the auditor, in a notarized statement, said it would cost \$24 per year on a property assessed at \$40,000. All this was based on a job cost However, a few weeks ago the business administrator ssued a statement it would cost \$23 on an assessed property of \$30,000, which is 25% below the other examples cited, and

the cost of the project is not \$3 million but closer to \$5 million, or about 66% higher than first proposed. The bid and the interest on the bonds will be more like 7%, not 6%. They have wasted \$60,000 on research on solar heat, which not the job of a municipality. They have wasted about \$30,000 on legal fees to defeat the people in their petition for ferendum. They have spent \$1,750,000 above the bids on the City Hall project without the benefit of bidding. They are holding on to the former Elizabethtown Gas Co. property which costs \$119,000, and are losing about \$20,000 annually on taxes and interest.
