Also re-elected were: Lucille Masciale of Scotch Plains, first vice chairman; and William Parnino of Linden, treasurer.

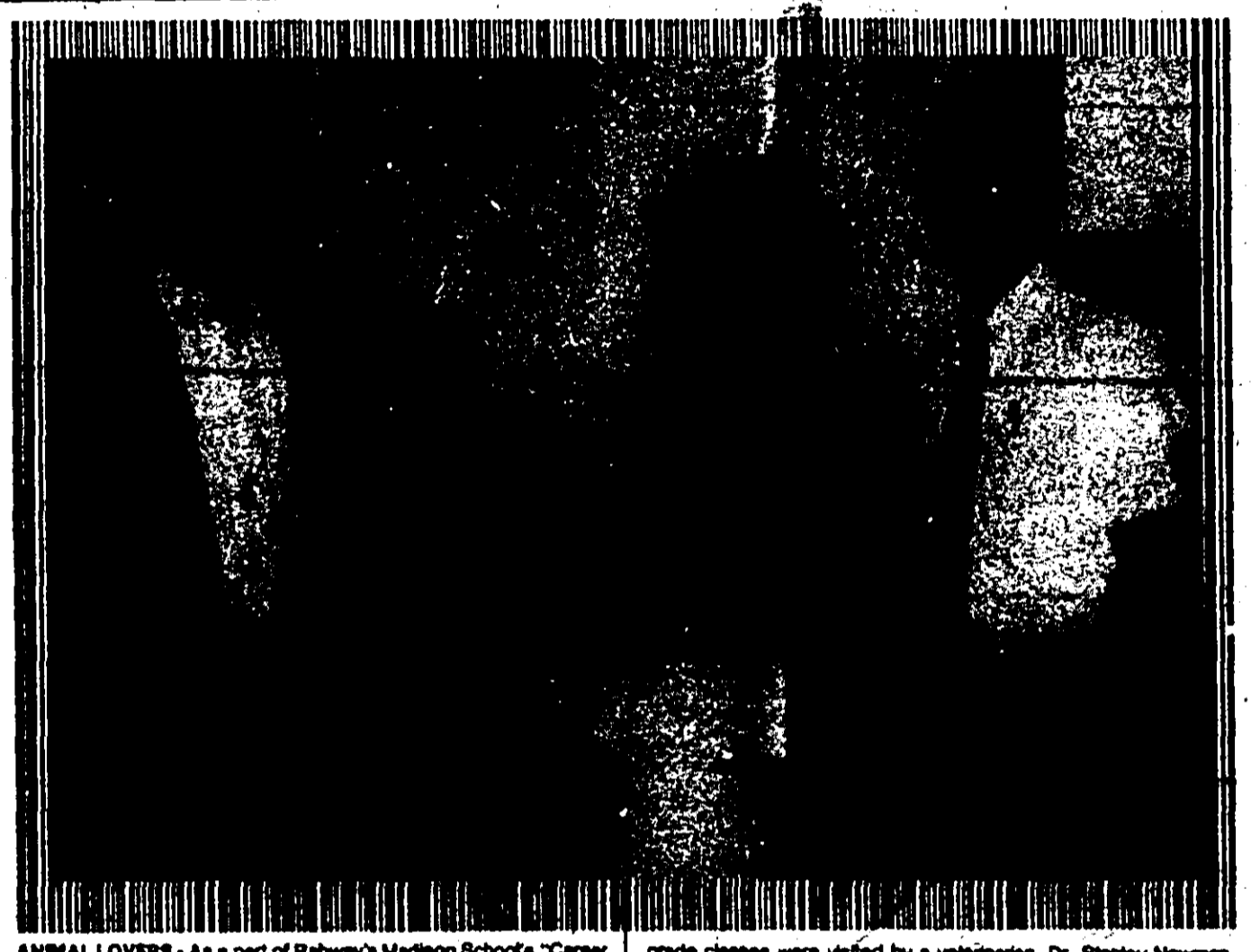
City police warn against fireworks

## Council introduces garage-sale limit

An ordinance regulating garage sales in Rahway was introduced at the June 8 session of City Council.

If the measure is adopted after the public hearing, scheduled for Monday, July 13, a resident wishing to conduct a garage, attic, lawn, estate, porch or yard or flea market sale or estate auction will be required to obtain a permit from the city zoning officer for a fee of \$2.

The law would not apply to the casual sale of an automobile by the owner or occupant of a residence or the casual sale of three or less items of tangible personal property by the owner or occupant of a residence.

A corporation, partnership or other entity would also be encompassed in the definition of those permitted to conduct a sale. However, any charitable, religious or non-profit organizations would be exempt from the measure.

It would prohibit signs advertising the sale, except those provided by the city.

Signs could not be posted sooner than two days prior to the date of the sale and would have to be removed at the end of the last day of the sale.

There would be a limit of four signs for each sale and the name of the person conducting the sale as well as the address, date and time of the sale would have to be included.

A maximum of three sales would be allowed per year on any residential property unless the property had undergone a complete change of occupancy.

The sale would be confined to the hours between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. from October 1 to April 31, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. from May to September, and the maximum length of each sale would be three days.

No merchandise would be permitted to be displayed within 10 feet of the curbline adjacent to the property.

Those who violate the ordinance would be subject to a minimum fine of \$5 and a maximum fine of \$500 at the discretion of the judge for each day during which any violation of the ordinance was found to exist.

Enforcement of the ordinance would be in the hands of the Rahway Police Dept., and the zoning officer would be required to report any violations to the department within three days of their occurrence.

## Council approves fire officer unit

The five deputy chiefs in the Rahway Fire Dept. were recognized as members of the Rahway Superior Fire Officers Assn. in a resolution adopted by City Council unanimously on June 8.

According to city business administrator, Joseph M. Harnett, the association has been in existence for about a year and a half, and the deputies had been represented by the Rahway Local of the Firemen's Mutual Benevolent Assn. before that.

The FMBA represents all other city firemen. Postponed until the Governing Body's Monday, July 13, session was a resolution authorizing an agreement with Charles Bransel of Westfield to be

the attorney for the Council.

Council members needed time to review the measure. A traffic ordinance which would have restricted parking on the west side of Winfield St. between Union St. and Grand Ave. was defeated unanimously.

The councilmen also adopted on second reading an ordinance restricting parking at the City Hall and Police Headquarters parking lot.

Under the measure, officials and employees of the city may park at all times when they are performing official city business.

It also sets a two-hour limit on parking for those conducting business with the city.

However, it allows parking beyond the limit if the Police Dept. is notified.

Also adopted was an ordinance calling for entrance to the City Hall parking lot to be made south from E. Milton Ave. into the lot.

A resolution requesting information on the City Hall and Police Headquarters was introduced by Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer, but it was postponed until the July 13 session, with Councilman Fulcomer voting against postponement, and First Ward Councilman Lawrence C. Bodine and Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh abstaining.

The appointment of Donald R. Anderson of 1146 Kline Pl. as a member of the Rahway Parking Authority for a term ending on December 31, 1983 was approved unanimously by the councilmen.

### 'Fun' of fireworks can end in tragedy

Editor's Note: The following article was submitted to The Rahway News Record by Kenneth R. Raetz, executive director of communications for the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Every Fourth of July children ask the same old questions and parents grapple for some new answers and reasons why fireworks are off limits to youngsters.

"You're spoiling our fun. What harm can a firecracker do anyway?"

"When you were a kid, you did everything you wanted. Why can't I have fireworks? Why can't I have what you had?"

Before surrendering to their pleas, you might want to explore some evidence of why fireworks can be dangerous.

It was May, 1976, in a New Jersey high school, a prankster had tossed an illegal firework into a glass cabinet in a corridor. Seconds later, two teenage girls passed within three feet of the cabinet, as the device exploded. One girl died when glass cut her jugular vein.

Having fun was the reason two boys gave for setting off a firecracker in a tree stump in Walnut Creek, Calif., in June, 1979. When firemen finally put their hoses away, two persons were hospitalized and three homes gutted. Damage was put at \$330,000.

In the aftermath of new year's celebrations in January of last year, some children on the island of Kauai, Hawaii, gathered bottles of firecrackers and put them in a small glass bottle. One lit the powder. A three-year-old girl died and six youngsters were hospitalized for injuries from the explosion.

On the preceding day of explosions, last July 4, an 18-year-old Bremen, Ind. man died from a fireworks accident, a four-year-old East St. Louis, Ill. boy was killed when a roman candle misfired in a home fireworks celebration and on the preceding day of explosions, last July 4, an 18-year-old Bremen, Ind. man died when a mortar shell exploded.

Many thousands of fireworks displays on Independence Day are successful except for the festive holiday spirit that bustles in air.

Cities, towns and villages across the nation stage displays because residents are less inclined to set off their own fireworks, often having their fill of the

public celebration.

American risk life and limb every year in an effort to create their own explosive devices.

On July 3, 1979, three persons died when homemade fireworks exploded in the basement of a West Philadelphia, Pa., home; three explosions ripped through the structure. A few days later, a 16-year-old Texas youth died when his homemade firecracker exploded.

What is being done to combat these fireworks-related injuries and deaths?

Working cooperatively, agencies at the local, state and federal level are enforcing prevailing laws governing the sale of illegal fireworks and stopping up to millions of dollars of fireworks exported to the U. S. or manufactured domestically by unlicensed firms.

Some states have closed their borders to fireworks of any kind. Fifteen states have banned everything except the caps used in toy caps, and 14 states have caps and sparklers, but prohibit everything else. The remaining 21 states have differing laws, but they essentially ban all fireworks except those which meet the requirements of the federal government.

At the national level, three Washington agencies are committed to reducing injuries from fireworks accidents.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms in the U. S. Dept. of the Treasury has jurisdiction over the licensing of companies engaged in the production of explosives, including fireworks. Regulations cover all aspects of manufacture, security, personnel safety and storage.

The U. S. Dept. of Transportation regulates interstate transport of fireworks including packaging, marking, labeling and placarding.

The U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission regulates those fireworks that may be sold to consumers, including chemicals that may not be used, physical specifications, per-

formance requirements and labeling.

Consumer protection agencies dangerous fireworks became a federal responsibility in 1966 when Congress enacted the Child Protection Act. With that law, the so-called "blackboard" fireworks were declared illegal. Cherry bombs, M-80 salutes and the giant firecrackers containing more than two grams of explosive powder were banned.

In 1973, when the CPSC was established, fireworks safety became a priority. Three years later, fireworks safety was strengthened further.

Sparklers and/or matches only are allowed in Alabama, Colorado, Florida, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Utah, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Some states ban all Class "C" fireworks, including sparklers. These states are Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island, Vermont and West Virginia.

With the clampdown on fireworks, injuries from fireworks accidents at first declined significantly, but are now on the rise, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

During the last year before the 1976 law took effect there were about 11,000 injuries from fireworks. The figure declined to 8,200 in 1977 when the new regulation took effect, and to 8,100 in 1978, and to 8,424 last year.

Product abuse appears to be the most frequent cause for fireworks injuries.

CPSC's study in 1979 showed over 60% of the injuries from fireworks were due to product malfunction.

Furthermore, the malfunction fireworks are, for the most part, banned fireworks under the federal law. In those cases where malfunctioning legal fireworks were involved, the injuries were minor and did not often require hospitalization.

For Saturday, July 4, 1981, the federal law permits only the sale of Class "C" fireworks which contain no more than 50 milligrams of explosive powder. Some state laws are more stringent.

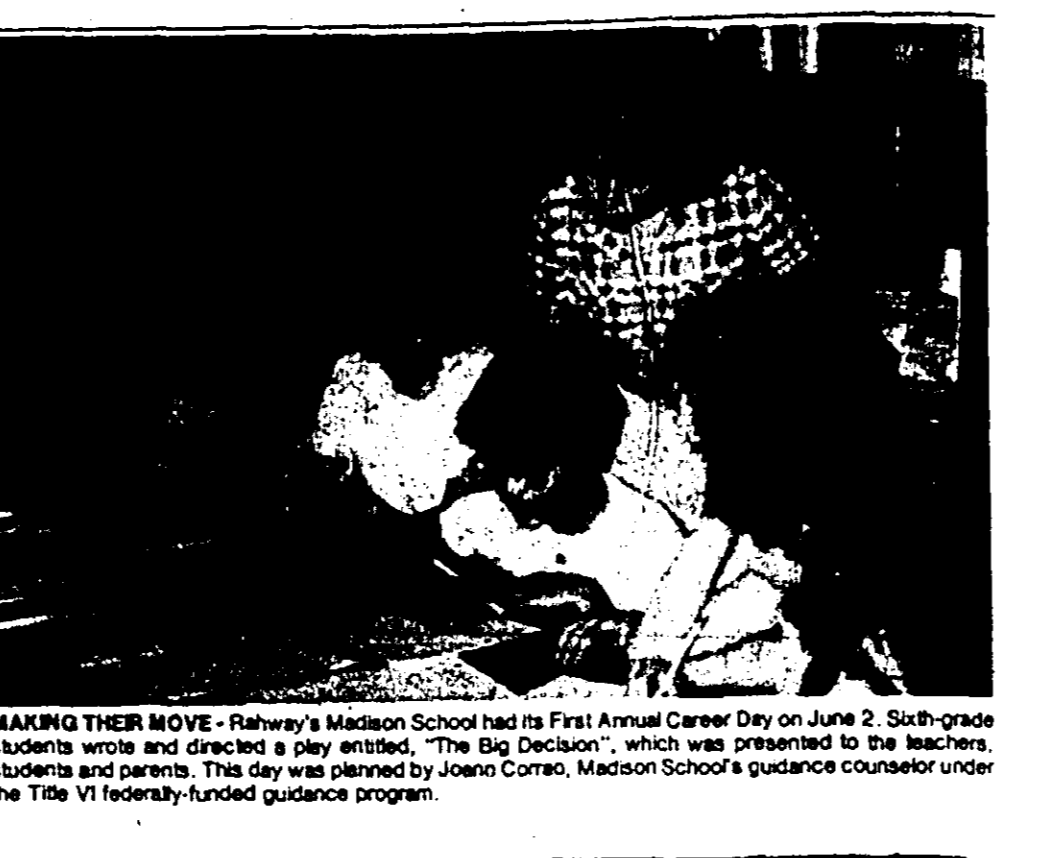
