Computers to aid in building skills

Rahway public schools will open for all students on Wednesday, Sept. 1, reports Frank D. Brunette, superintendent for the city school district.

A total of about 3,670 pupils are expected for the 1981-1982 school year, with approximately 990 in the senior high school, 845 in the junior high school, 1,730 in the elementary schools and 100 pre-schoolers.

One of the newest programs, to be launched for the upcoming school year in the elementary schools, is Project C. A. R. E. for Computer-Assisted Reinforced Education.

According to Mr. Brunette, school staff members spent this past summer compiling computer data and a test analysis of the skills and needs of all students in the Rahway public schools, including a breakdown of the strengths and difficulties of each student.

The object of the project will be to group students so teachers can give more help to those who need to develop strengths in different areas of study.

He added the computer readouts will also supply complete lists of all materials available in each building to teach and develop study skills.

Another new program will be the utilization of basic skills resource teachers to assist teachers in enhancing the basic educational skills of each student.

A new dimension of Rahway's Gifted Student Program recently developed through creative writing through creative writing specialist and community resource persons coming to the schools to demonstrate their professional and avocational pursuits.

A booklet of original writings devised by the students participating in the program will be developed, and will be entitled, "Caper."

Dr. Orkin attacks college budget cut

A re-allocation of \$360,000 from the budget of Union College to Union County Technical Institute by the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders "has ramifications of serious consequence," Dr. Saul Orkin, president of the college, said recently.

Such a cut of \$360,000 cannot fail to jeopardize programs that are already in place for the academic year about to begin," Dr. Orkin said. "Students already registered may find themselves unable to pursue their course-of-studies as planned, and the college may be unable to carry out its contractual agreement, as stated in the catalog, with the student."

The freeholders on Aug. 13 voted to accept a recommendation of the Union County Co-ordinating Agency for Higher Education they transfer \$360,000 from the budget of Union College to the technical institute, over the objections of the college.

The recommendation of the coordinating agency is seriously flawed, since it is based on misunderstanding and incorrect conclusions," Dr. Orkin said. "It would be a mistake, I believe, to create a deficit of \$360,000 in the college budget in order to eradicate a \$360,000 deficit in the technical institute budget. That would be robbing Peter to pay Paul."

He added there seems to be a lack of appreciation for the necessity to keep Union College financially viable.

"The college requested and the coordinating agency approved a sum of \$2,296,414 in county aid for 1981," the college president reported. "The county appropriated \$1,696,182—a \$600,232 reduction. Now the agency recommends and the county supports a further budget cut of

\$200,000 in the present academic year," the president of Union College said.

"Even with strong cooperation and the good will of both institutions, the agency proposal could not be accomplished effectively under present circumstances. The college had previously advised the agency such a redistribution of responsibility, if attempted, required financial support-technical institute officials concurred but the agency ignored the advice."

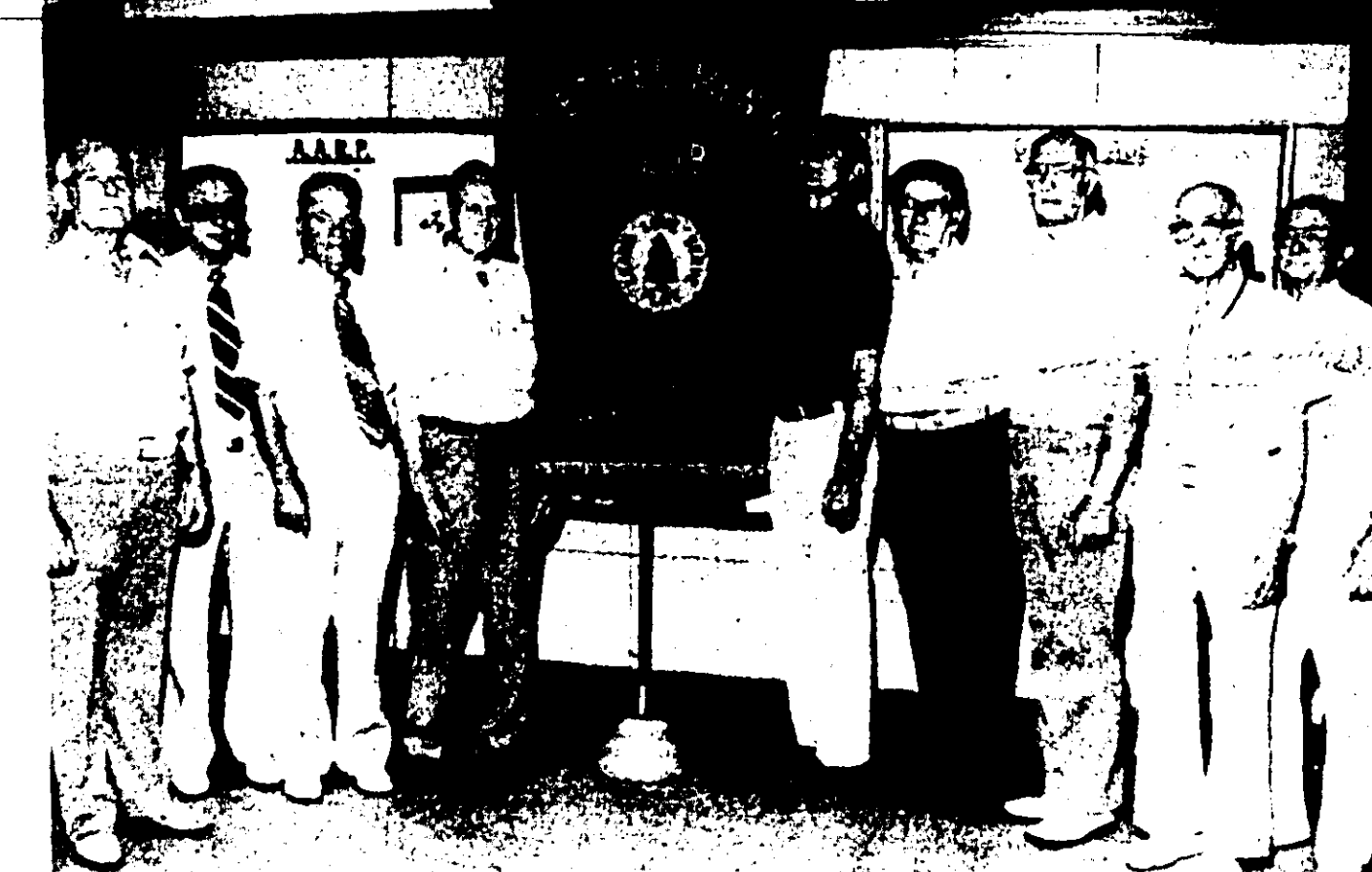

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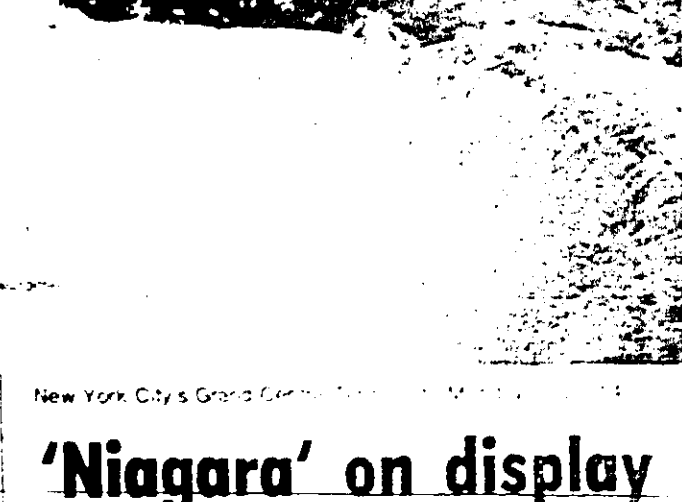

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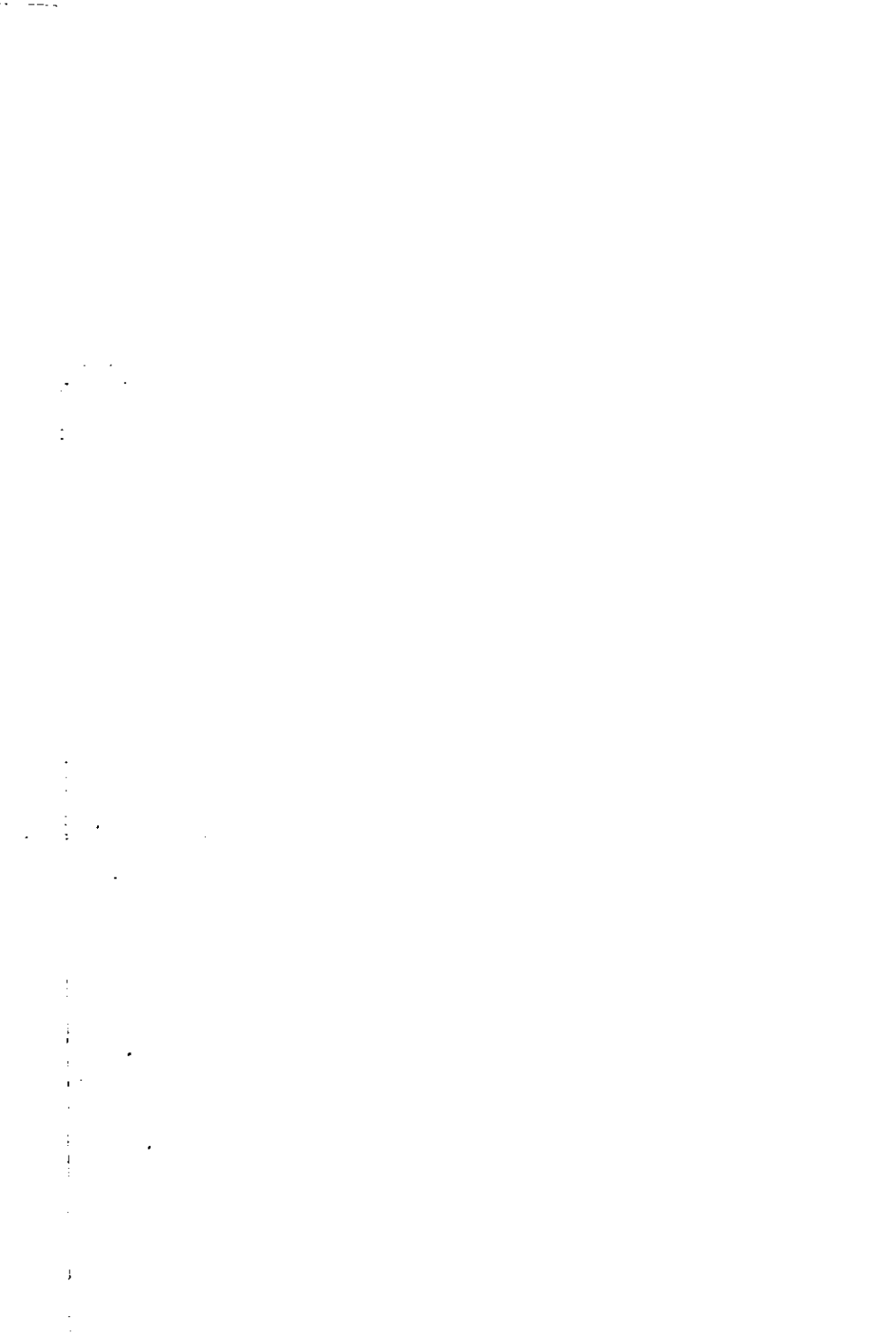
