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## American Legion launches drive for grid scoreboard

At a recent meeting of Rahway Post No. 5 of the American Legion, a committee was formed to raise money to replace the aging scoreboard at Veterans Memorial Field on Central Ave., Rahway.

Past Commander Paul Konic was appointed as the chairman. John A. Kuhlman was named as the co-chairman. Mr. Kuhlman is a teacher at Rahway Junior High School.

Other members serving on the committee are: Post

Comm. John Barton, past Legion Commanders, Gene O'Brien, James A. Crowell, Jerry DeParier and James R. Crowell, Sr., Vice Commander Steve Galbavy, Service Officer J. Travis Corey, and Sergeant-at-Arms, William Disney.

It was brought to the attention of post members the present scoreboard is approximately 20 years old, and is in a state of disrepair due to the difficulty in obtaining repair parts, soaring maintenance and repair

costs.

"These and other circumstances surrounding the scoreboard make its future use somewhat in doubt, if at all operational at scholastic athletic events, reports Mr. Konic.

"Post No. 5, composed of World Wars I and II, Korean and Vietnam veterans has traditionally been a strong supporter of the educational system and the youth of the community. Replacing the aging scoreboard would be a demonstration of continued

support," according to Mr. Kuhlman.

"The post has made an initial financial pledge to initiate the fund drive," Mr. Konic stated. "However, support of the entire community is needed. We have the support of the Rahway Board of Education and The Sideliners, but the support of the entire community is needed to make the project a success. By making the fund drive a community-wide effort, the Legion post is appealing to all citizens, industries,

businesses, fraternal service and other organizations to support the fund drive with their donations, and the \$4000 needed to procure and have the scoreboard erected for the opening home game on Saturday, Sept. 25, will be realized."

## More interest draws five Board vriers

In Rahway, where there was only a write-in contest for a two-year unexpired term last year, and the other three candidates ran unopposed, the Board of Education race shapes up to a five-way battle this year.

All three seats open on Tuesday, April 6, will be for full, three-year terms.

The former school body president, James Cadigan, who was re-elected to his second three-year term in

1979, has decided not to give the School Board position another shot.

The only two incumbents running are the president of the Board this year, Ronald C. Matusaitis of 1143 Stone St., and Louis R. Rizzo of 1065 Madison Ave.

Making his first run for the Board in 1978, Mr. Matusaitis was defeated that year, trailing his next highest opponent by only 14 votes to come in fifth. The following year he was

elected to his first three-year term.

Attempting to gain a total of 24 years on the school body, Mr. Rizzo was re-elected in 1979. He served a total of six years as the president of the body, and was the vice president for four terms.

Another oldtimer as far as Board politics goes is Mrs. Lillie Henderson of 421 E. Milton Ave.

She has run in three of the last four Board elections, coming in fourth the

last time she ran, in 1980.

A contender in the write-in campaign for last year's two-year term, Kevin Joseph Witke of 1741 Winfield St., is seeking his first three year term.

Last year, the two-year post was won by Mrs. Elizabeth Jacobs.

The fifth candidate to file for a full term was Erma J. Harmon of 322 Regina Ave.

## Catholics join in 'Rice Bowl'

Catholics across the United States are joining in the campaign against hunger by participating in family prayer and sacrifice, Operation Rice Bowl. The program began on Feb. 24, Ash Wednesday, in all parishes of the Archdiocese of Newark.  
Once a week during Lent, families share prayers and a simple, sacrificial meal. The savings from that meal are placed in a cardboard rice bowl. Each Sunday at Mass the savings are joined with those of other parish families.  
Of the total monies collected, 75% is sent to Catholic Relief Services to establish or continue overseas development pro-

grams. Each diocese is the recipient of 25% of the funds, which is used to assist local hunger programs.  
This year the money will be used by the Emergency Food Program of the archdiocese. Parishes have been asked to sponsor food drives during Lent to replenish food pantries, which are depleted after the long cold winter.  
Last year Operation Rice Bowl raised over \$13 million to help alleviate the root causes of hunger and poverty through Catholic Relief Services, the overseas relief and development agency of American Catholics, reports a church spokesman.

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

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
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**St. John's cheerers win county laurels**

Loss of appetite, dry mouth, sore tongue—all can affect the patient's desire to eat. The dietitian can suggest eating smaller meals, eating with other family members, varying the color and texture of foods to make them as appealing as possible, using a food processor or blender if the patient has difficulty swallowing. All of these strategies are discussed with the family.

"Food is the one last control," Mrs. Dedrick points out. "It often gives the family of the patient something to focus on. It is one way

Adopted an ordinance confirming the township's acceptance of work done by the county on the improvement of the Oak Ridge and Raritan Rd. intersections.

Passed on second reading an ordinance establishing the post of principal engineer. The present engineering aide is expected to move into the new post with no increase in salary.

Created a new clerk-typist position at a salary range of \$9,000 to \$11,000 in order to fill the job of a clerk-typist who retired recently.

Councilman Pozniak has expressed concern at two different Council meetings the employee proposed for the post may be a member of Council No. 8 of the municipal employees' union.

However, both Mayor Yarusavage and the Township Attorney Joseph Triarsi replied on Feb. 16 the employee's managerial status would preclude his membership in the union.
