## Budget-cut controversy launches another debate

A report submitted to the press and to the Rahway City Council by the Business Administrator, Joseph M. Hartnett, containing proposals for cutting the city's budget below the state-imposed "CAP" limit, drew the Governing Body into a heated debate with administration officials on Monday night.

Had been higher than Mayor Daniel L. Martin took office, Rahway's had "skyrocketed" past the budgets of both Westfield and Cranford.

He added he had offered to sit down with the administration the night the budget referendum had failed in the city to ask for recommendations for the budget cuts from the administration, and the city shouldn't put off action on the budget until the last minute and then say it didn't have the money to pay employees.

Accusing Councilman Marsh of political grandstanding, Mayor Martin said the Second Ward representative's charges were groundless since the budget was the Council's budget, and the majority of Council had voted to hold

the referendum to ask residents if the city should go over the "CAP" limits. Mayor Martin added, "It is up to the Council to make the recommendations. It is your budget, but we can live with it. We have proposed a meeting for April 15 to discuss what can be done about the budget. What has the Council done since the referendum was defeated?"

Councilman James J. Fulcomer of the Sixth Ward, after whom Mr. Hartnett's plan was named, objected to the non-professional manner in which the name of a councilman was put on a plan he never advocated.

He added, "Three councilmen put together a suggested cut of \$200,000. In a newsletter I sent out it was pointed out the \$200,000 cut, even if annualized

would finally amount to \$300,000—not \$2 million as the business administrator's proposal stated. Not one dime of that would have come from elimination of street lights, no firefighters would have to be cut, and not one dime would have to come from the sewer authority account, as Mr. Hartnett suggested."

Mr. Hartnett replied, "Now that the budget requires careful consideration, Council says it is the mayor's budget. Before the referendum the plan for the cuts was put together without the city administration's input, other than the fact several concerned councilmen talked to the administration about it. Several staff meetings were held, and the department heads were given the reasons for our proposals. I apologize if a few facts were

## City Hall dedication set; Special edition in works

Rahway's Dedicated Committee has set Saturday, June 26, as the official date for dedication of the new City Hall and Police Headquarters, reports Mayor Daniel L. Martin.

The dedication will consist of a week-long celebration, including a parade, tours, concerts, exhibitions and a community cocktail party and dance. Mayor Martin declared.

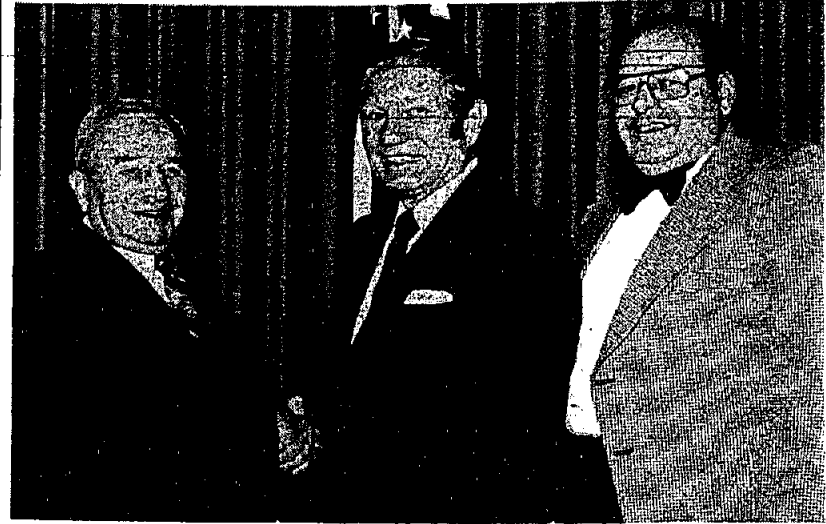

## Fulcomer attacks 'Big Lie' method

Rahway Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer today condemned the "Big Lie" technique of the "official propaganda minister" of the Daniel J. 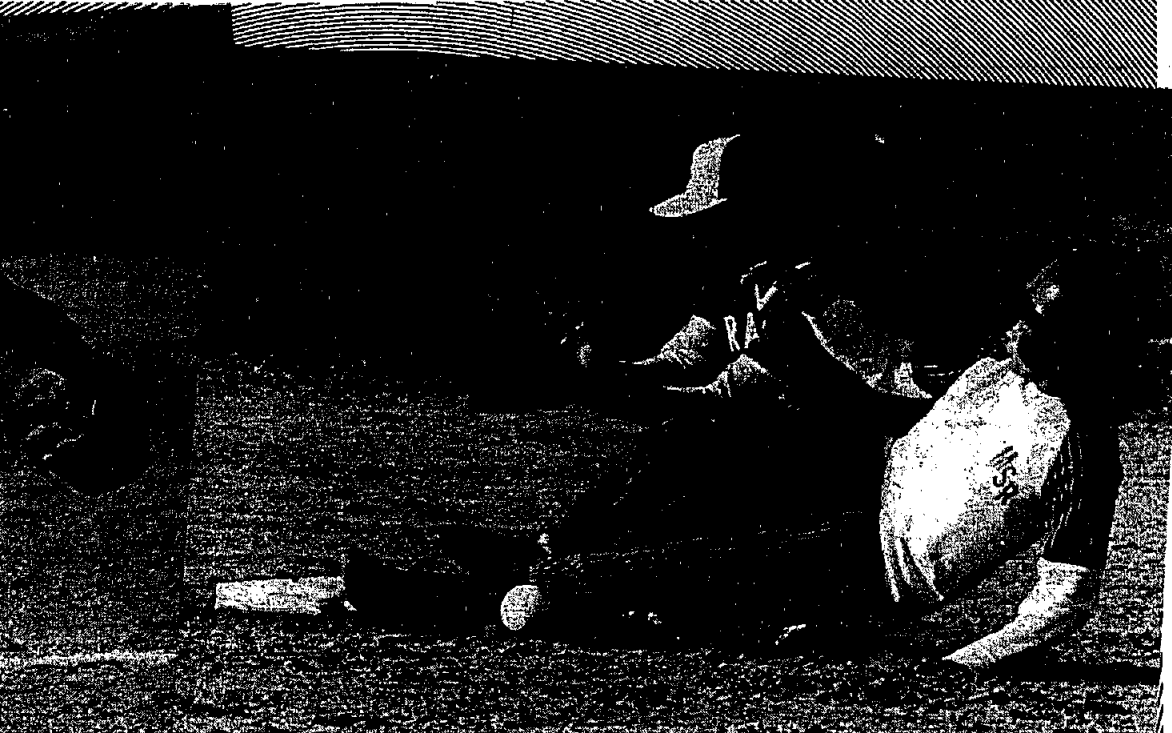

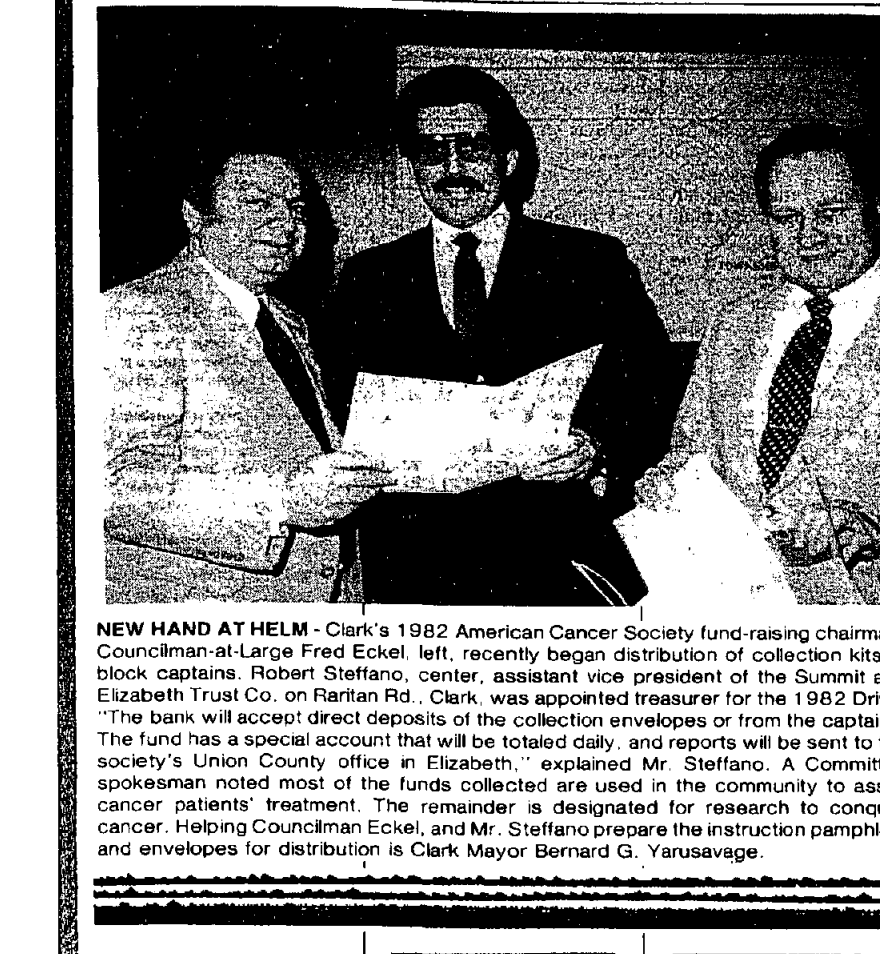

Golden Heritage and Life members of the Rahway Branch were honored at the April 12 meeting. They were presented with special awards.

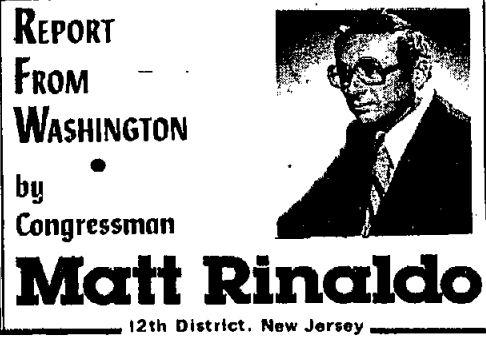

**Efficiency can cut deficit by billions**

Putting America back to work is one of the most compelling issues facing Congress.

More than 9.5 million Americans are out of work, including an estimated 291,000 New Jerseyans, and no appreciable drop in this figure is expected until later this year.

Contributing to this unacceptably high rate of unemployment are staggering interest rates and the mounting federal deficit. These three economic ills feed on each other. Record deficits are blamed for keeping interest rates at a high level, which in turn leads to more unemployment and drives deficits even higher.

One important thing that must be done to stimulate economic growth and create jobs is to reduce interest rates so business and industry can afford to borrow needed capital for investment and expansion.

Most economists agree interest rates would fall if Congress reduced the projected \$91.5 billion deficit for fiscal 1983. As long as we face deficits of this magnitude, it will be difficult to gain the confidence of the financial community, which is essential if the cost of borrowing money is to go down.

Federal spending could be sharply reduced by eliminating inefficient pork-barrel programs that are leavishly funded because they serve the political interests of a controlling coalition.

Cutting waste, fraud, and abuse also would save billions, along with closing tax loopholes that have allowed profitable companies to reduce their federal tax liabilities at the expense of the national economy.

Congress and the President could safely out the projected 1983 deficit by over \$60 billion without harming vital social services or impeding the nation's defense program. There are several measures that could be implemented to safely reduce spending, and close tax loopholes, without disturbing the individual income tax reductions approved last year for millions of Americans.

Here are some areas where savings could be achieved:

-Up to \$17 billion could be cut from the defense budget through improved management and procurement practices, and by curbing personnel level increases. This would not require reductions in major weapons systems that are vital to maintaining a strong defense. The savings could go higher in future years if the Soviet Union agrees to President Ronald Reagan's proposal to negotiate a reduction in nuclear weapons.

-\$12 billion in additional federal revenue could be obtained by eliminating the windfall-profits tax break Congress gave to oil producers in order to win Southern bloc votes to pass the income tax cuts.

-\$12.5 billion could be earned by postponing and dropping a number of water projects, most of which are in the western states.

-\$3.8 billion less could be spent for subsidies for irrigation and rural energy programs.

-\$4 billion in additional revenue could be had by repealing the corporate tax-leasing provision approved last year as part of the tax package.

-\$2 billion could be saved by cutting in half agriculture price subsidies for peanut, sugar and tobacco growers.

Revenues could be increased by several billion more by closing tax loopholes that have allowed wealthy speculators to avoid paying taxes on a vast array of un-

productive investments. Overall, these tax breaks take \$200 billion out of the Treasury.

The proposed cuts would make substantial inroads into the deficits without imposing any new taxes or cutting military growth below the President's proposed rate of 7%. This bold action would bolster the economy, keep inflation down, lower interest rates and lead to the creation of desperately-needed jobs.

Assuring steady employment for working men and women is not only the government's responsibility. But government must work with business, labor and the financial markets to create a climate in which the private economy can expand. That favorable climate-with reasonable interest rates, far-sighted economic development, job training, education programs, a consistent tax policy and control of the federal deficit is what I am working for in Congress.

vote at the library during regular library hours, reports Rahway City Clerk Francis R. Senkowsky.

In addition, Mr. Senkowsky reminded the residents on Monday, April 19, will be the last day for voters to change their party affiliation for the Tuesday, June 8, Primary Election.

**Volunteers sought for Hospice unit**

Rahway Hospital is seeking volunteers for the next Hospice training program. Hospice is a philosophy of care which helps terminally-ill patients and their families through the trying period of advanced illness and death with the emphasis on keeping the patient at home.

Utilizing the family as the principal unit of care, the program also involves an interdisciplinary team comprised of a physician, a nurse, a social worker, a clergyman, a dietician and a volunteer, who help the patient and family. The team seeks to provide support 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Volunteers help to keep

the home running smoothly, and are available to the family even after the death of the patient. They are always ready to listen. They spend hours doing errands, holding hands, picking up medication, feeding patients and just being there.

Volunteers at Rahway Hospital undergo a seven-week training course focusing on the family as the unit of care, cancer and treatment, death and dying, bereavement, communication and creative listening.

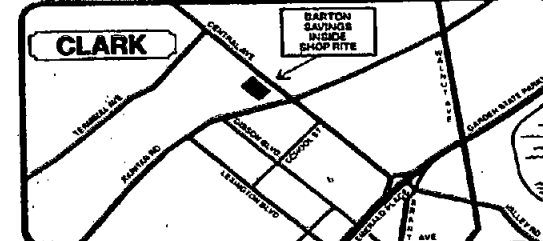
