Formal backing given to theater preservation

The group seeking to acquire the Old Rahway Theatre to make it into a county cultural center, Rahway Landmarks, Inc., June 16 was given the unanimous support of City Council.

It was pointed out in the resolution the theater was constructed in 1928 as a silent-film and vaudevillepresentation house, and has excellent acoustics, approximately 1,500 seats, a fly loft, a rehearsal hall, dressing rooms, a pipe organ and a large stage.

The councilman pointed out the non-profit corporation has started a fundraising drive to acquire the city entertainment facility from its current owner and to begin renovation.

better for exercise Exercising in the heat of the summer becomes more difficult. The procedure by which the body cools itself is adversely affected by the air temperature. The blood carries the oxygen required by the body. During exercise, the demand for oxygen increases, and the circulation system responds by increasing the blood flow. However, when it is hot, part of the blood supply is diverted from the working muscles to the skin to cool the body. This blood flow to the skin can drastically reduce the supply of oxygen to the muscle. Since less oxygen can be delivered, less total

Evaporation is the major cooling factor for the body. As perspiration occurs, the skin is cooled when the perspiration evaporates. Fitness participants can adjust to the heat through a process called acclimation. This is a gradual adjustment of the body to the increased temperature. 





Federal grants help keep cities viable

Federal grants totaling more than \$30 million have been awarded to Union County municipalities over the past 18 months for a variety of public-service projects ing a base on balls, and was numerous international have also captured the Mid that have served to stabilize the employment situation in These funds are being used for flood-control work,

economic revitalization, community development, historic preservation and public-housing rehabilitation. More than a dozen Union County communities have shared in the grants that range from \$45,000 to more than \$20 million. One of the major programs receiving federal funding s the Elizabeth River flood-control project, which has

been in progress since 1967, and is now nearing completion. Earlier this year contracts worth \$24 million were awarded for work on the final phase, involving construction of a 1.5-mile-long U-shaped concrete channel from Rte. No. 1 to Trotters La., Elizabeth. The federal share of this portion is about \$20 million, bringing to more than \$75 million the amount of federal money received for the five-mile-long project. It is scheduled for completion in

It is noteworthy the White House and the House Public Works Committee have responded positively to every request I have made for flood-control money for the district.

The Reagan Administration also honored my re quest for \$3.8 million to begin the rehabilitation of Elizabeth's six public-housing developments. The grant covers the costs of the first phase of the proposed rehabilitation program to be completed over a period of several years at an estimated cost in excess of \$14.4

The initial \$3.8 million is being used for architectural and engineering studies, the revamping of the electrical systems and the installation of smoke detectors in the city's three senior citizen and three low income housing

Last summer the Dept. of Housing and Urban Development approved a \$5,583,000 communitydevelopment block grant for Union County and 12 municipalities. The money is being used for public ser vices and residential rehabilitation, and to improve streets, recreation and other public facilities.

The municipalities awarded grants and the amoun each received are: Cranford, \$384,538; Fanwood, \$90,000; Garwood, \$156,000; Kenilworth, \$30,000; Plainfield, \$1,251,200; and Rahway, \$721,313 Also. Roselle, \$216,591; Roselle Park. \$98,000: Scotch Plains, \$270,000; Springfield, \$93,000; Summit \$350,000, and Westfield, \$311,900 Another \$568,000 went to county

These block grants are intended to underwrite the development of viable urban communities through the provision of decent housing and a suitable living environ ment and expanding economic opportunities, principally or persons of low and moderate income.

Under another federal program, Union Township was awarded a \$917,000 grant for housing rehabilitation. community programs, historic preservation, and to im prove public services and facilities. These funds were received with the assistance of my office, as was the I-million grant shared by Rahway and Plainfield for nousing rehabilitation.

These funds have helped to create jobs in the district o upgrade and expand public facilities, and to help improve the quality of life for thousands of citizens.
