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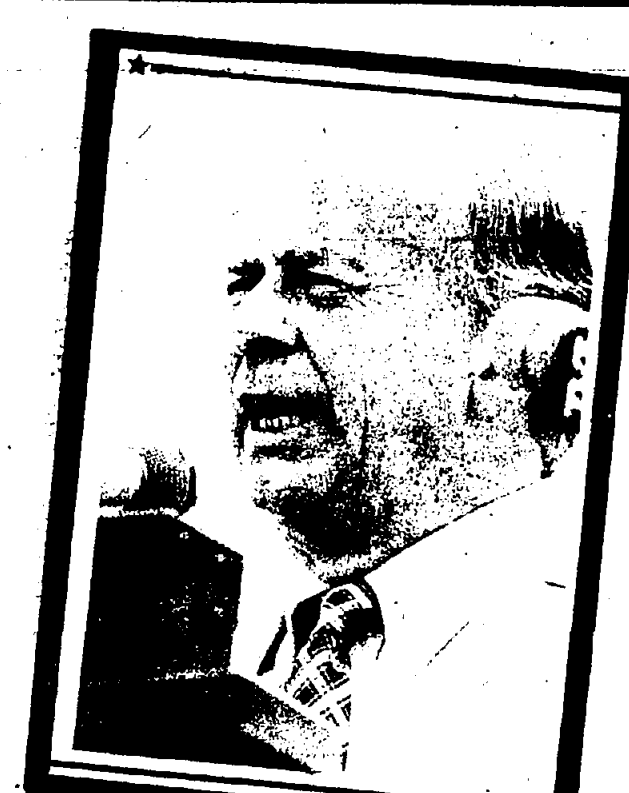

## Legislation signed merging institutions

Gov. Thomas H. Kean recently signed legislation creating a public community college in Union County by consolidating Union College in Cranford and the Union County Technical Institute in Scotch Plains.

Union College, which was founded in 1933 as a federal Emergency Relief Administration project, is an independent two-year institution. The Union County Technical Institute is the post-secondary operation of the Board of Education of the Union County Vocational Schools.

Under the legislation, the two institutions will be merged into a new entity, the Union County Community College. The new college will be located on the campus of the Union County Technical Institute in Scotch Plains. The law also provides for the State House were the bill's sponsors, Sen. Donald DiFrancesco of Scotch Plains, Sen. John T. Grepano of Linden and Sen. C. Louis Bassano of Union, and Union County's six assemblymen, who support the measure, Edward Gill of Union, and Bob Franks of Berkeley Heights and Maureen Ogden of Millburn. The bill is expected to pass within 30 days. In addition, the general supervision of the Union County Technical Institute will be transferred to the Board of Trustees of the new entity, and the institute's real and personal property will be transferred to the new entity. Primarily, these will be the Engineering Technology Building on the campus in Scotch Plains. The law also provides a debt of \$1.9 million of the Board of Education.

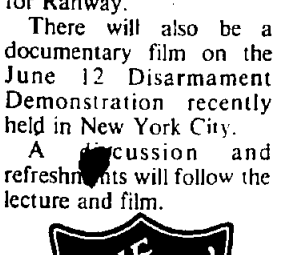
### Program on bomb set for July 12

### Merck Foundation gives Aspira boost

With \$10,000 recently donated by The Merck Co. Class size is limited to 12 couples.

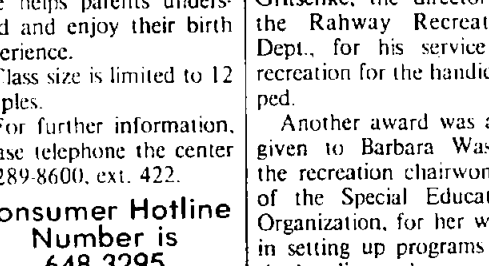

## Volunteers graduate Hospice course

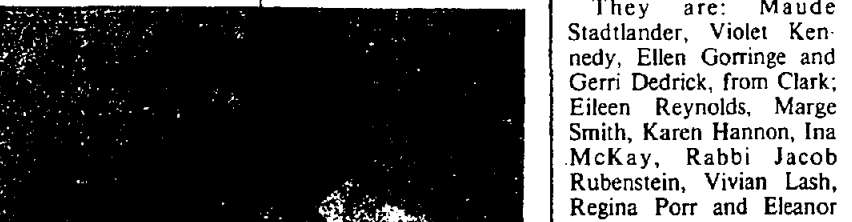

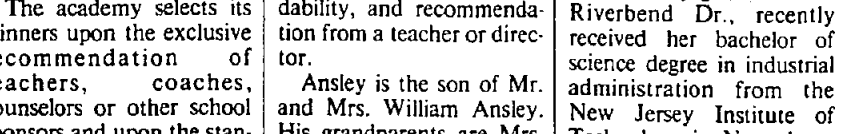

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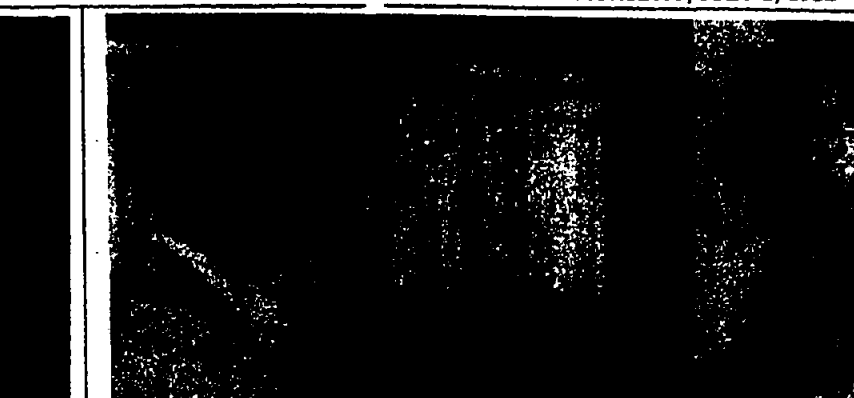

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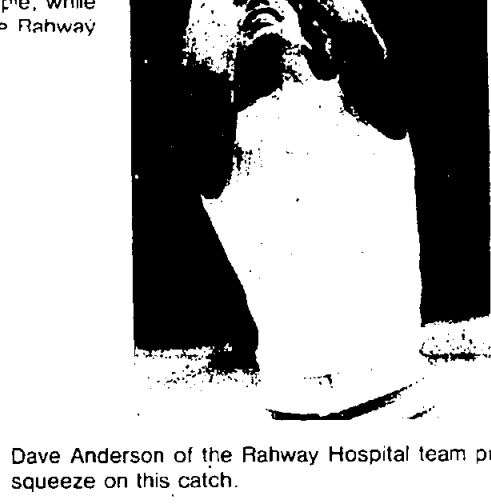
