



Board on women

receives praise Women and female children of all ages in Union County have benefited from the Advisory Board on the Status of Women, which was organized by the Board of Chosen Freeholders in December, 1974, so they might be made more aware of the needs and requirements of the

women under their jurisdiction. For high school girls the board sponsored, in January, 1980, a seminar on Apprenticeship Training in Non-Traditional Jobs with the hope young girls, once made aware of opportunities available to them, will be more aggressive in seeking them out.

For all women the implementation and adoption of a unty affirmative action plan was the main project of the Logal Research Committee. Working with the county manager and affirmative action officer every attempt was made to ensure the policy as stated in Article No. 28 of the code was inserted in the plan.



Congress' rejection of the Federal Trade Commission's proposed rule for regulating the sale of used cars has come under fire as being a vote against the consume The battle over the rule, which was overwhelmingly defeated in both the Senate and the House, was billed in the press as one between consumers and used car dealers.

The issue, however, was whether Congress should veto a proposed rule from the Federal Trade Commission. which would have prohibited used car dealers from misrepresenting the mechanical condition of cars they offer for sale, required dealers to make available to potential buyers any information about warranties on used cars, and required dealers to inform consumers of any specific defects in a used car the dealer was aware of.

While I supported these requirements, I voted against the trade commission rule because of serious flaws that could have increased the price of a used car by as speaker was Dr. Patricia much as \$400. My objection was to the ambiguous language in the rule regarding pre-sale inspections. One section was construed to mandate a dealer inspection while another clearly stated no inspection was required.

Because of this conflict of terms, dealers would have been uncertain about their legal obligations, and consumers would have been unclear as to their rights. In the end, both consumers and dealers would have been fighting in the courts over interpreting the rule.

To be safe from a possible \$10,000 fine, most dealers, who are small businessmen and not lawyers, would have feit compelled to have their vehicles inspected whenever they had the slightest clue to a possible defect but didn't know which of the 52 defects listed in the rule was involv-

For example, if a car leaned noticeably to one side, it would not have been sufficient for the dealer to point that out to the customer. He would have had to determine why the car was leaning. This would have entailed an inspection that would have added to the price of the used

for economical transportation, and can ill afford to pay a | signed letters to the editor | The regional district was few hundred dollars extra for an inspection that may not be needed, and is not wanted. This could force them into the private, unregulated market where they would have no protection, and would be more open to unscrupulous practices.

I favor protecting the American consumer in the marketplace and taking appropriate action against cheats who would attempt to victimize used car buyers. But Congress can not effectively serve that purpose by supporting a poorly-drafted rule that would have tended to benalize those who are seeking to protect by boosting their costs.

I have introduced a bill, HR 5321, which incorporates all of the features of the defeated rule except for the conflicting provisions regarding inspections. Among the consumer safeguards in the bill are:

-Disclosure of any warranty offered, including the percentage of total repair costs to be paid by the seller. -Listing of the 14 major systems of an automobile and disclosure of any defects. -Provision of a suggestion purchasers ask the seller i



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

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
