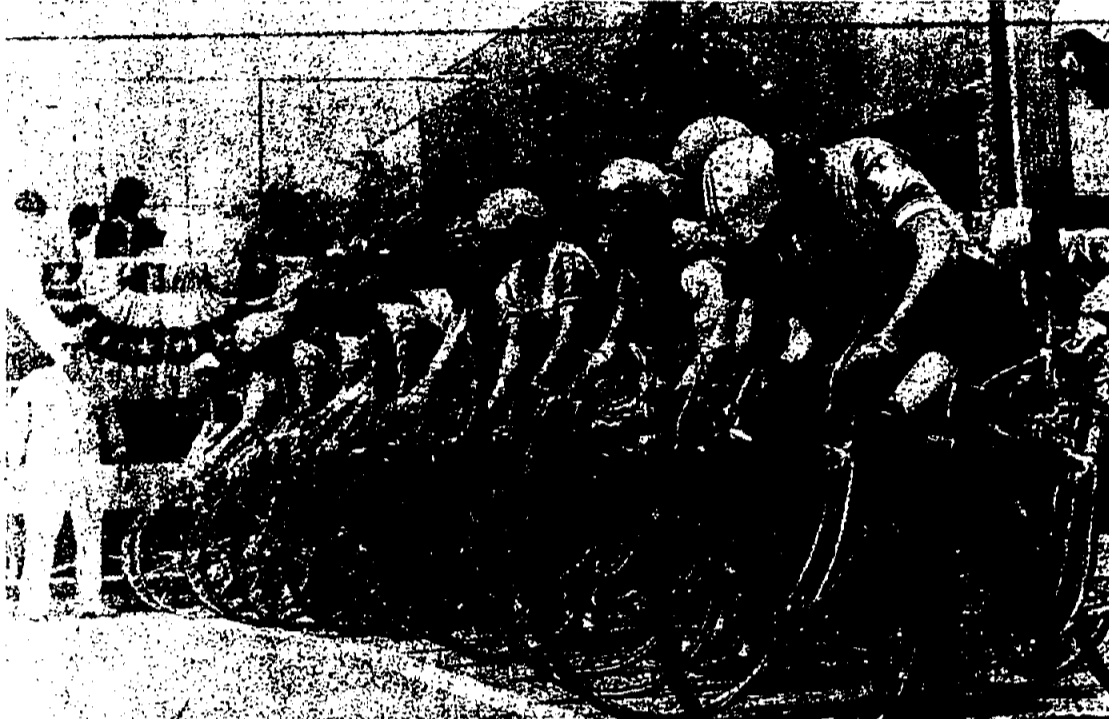
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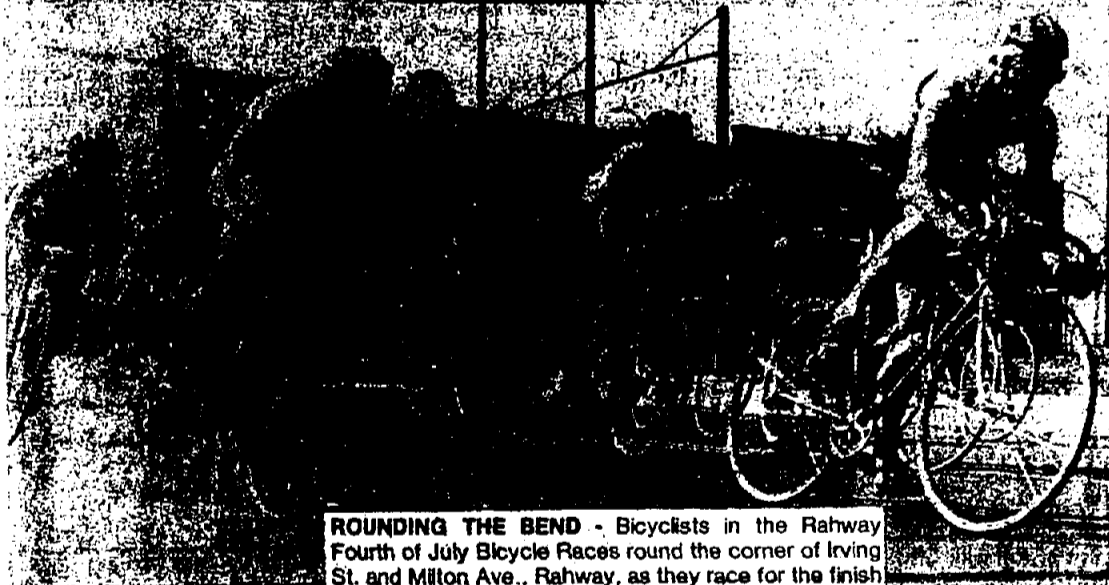

Hospital zone change awaits resident input

Amid one of the longest City Council meetings in the memory of the editors of The Rahway News-Record, the Rahway Governing body on Monday adjourned to Monday, Aug. 9, the first reading of an ordinance which would have amended the official zoning map of the city to allow for the expansion of the hospital zone around the area of the Rahway Hospital to include the entire block bounded by Madison and Jefferson Aves., Trussler Pl. and Stone St.

Replying to Councilwoman Rinaldi, Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh said at no time has the hospital ever been denied a variance it has requested anyway, and the hospital administrators shouldn't have to be "dragged down here every time they want a piece of property okayed" to do something with.

Although the Second Ward councilman agreed the hospital should have planned more carefully for its expanding needs in the past, he added turning the request down would result in the hospital not being able to plan for the future.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin pointed out the hospital doesn't always get variances it has requested, but in one instance in the past when it was turned down the variance was granted through the courts.

Although both Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer and Third Ward Councilman Max Shield agreed the residents on the south side of Trussler Pl. who would be most affected by the proposed parking expansion, should be given an opportunity to be heard on the matter, Mayor Martin replied they could be given that opportunity at the public hearing, which probably would have been held on Aug. 9 after the second reading had not the measure been postponed.

Ex-executive director sees good 'Y' future

Although the Rahway Young Men's Christian Assn. recently entered into a contractual agreement for the Greater Eastern Union County YMCA management staff to take over the running of the city facility for at least six months, the former executive director of the Rahway "Y" predicts expanded services from the management change.

According to Donald R. Keen, who resigned July 1 from his position as the chief executive officer at the city facility, he personally had planned the administration-sharing concept which eventually led to the elimination of his own position and that of his former program director, Thomas Ziga.

Mr. Keen told The Rahway News-Record although last year's fatal fire in the city YMCA's former dormitory added a financial strain, the facility was in fiscal trouble before that because it was not large enough to support two administrative staff positions.

He added, however, membership income has greatly increased in the last six months, and with the six-month contract under which Kathy Dunn, the general director of the county facility, and her staff devoting the better part of their time revamping the city setup there may even be a complete health and fitness center in the facility's near future.

The boards of directors of both YMCAs hammered out the terms of a contract last week under which, after six months, both boards will evaluate the matter, and decide whether or not to recontract.

The former executive director, although not holding a position at present, is searching for another situation.

He said Mr. Ziga, who is an expert in cardio-vascular fitness and was the city "Y's" program director for about a year and a half, is now employed in a similar capacity at the West Side YMCA in New York City.

Mr. Ziga came to Rahway from New York City, where he had held a similar post before.

Mr. Keen, who took the city post about seven years ago, was formerly an executive director of a "Y" facility in Western Maryland. He is a graduate of the College of Western Ohio and the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary in addition to being a member of the Elizabeth Presbytery and an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church.

Before becoming active in YMCA affairs, Mr. Keen was a minister in different congregations for about 10 years, he told The Rahway News-Record.

During the summer months when teenagers have an extra amount of free time on their hands, parents should be made aware of some things to look for, which may indicate drug abuse: -Decrease in motivation. -Change in personality and emotional expression. -Changing patterns of behavior. -Withdrawal from companionship. -Decrease in performance both physical and academic. -Poor personal hygiene and grooming. -Inability to coordinate and/or associate with only one group of persons. -Muscular twitching or tremor of hands. -Heavy swearing and bad breath (amphetamine abuse). -Nervous, highly talkative and overactive (amphetamine). -A person's language, which may indicate drug use. -Episodes of stupor and incoherent speech may indicate acute intoxication from any number of substances. -Needle marks on arms and legs; reddish or brown long-sleeved sweaters, even in summer, to keep warm and hide scars. -Impaired judgment (barbiturate). -Muscular twitching or tremor of hands. -Heavy swearing and bad breath (amphetamine abuse).

Banasiak team backs nursing beds

Union County Republican freeholders, Blanche Banasiak of Elizabeth, Robert Miller of Berkeley Heights and Bernard G. 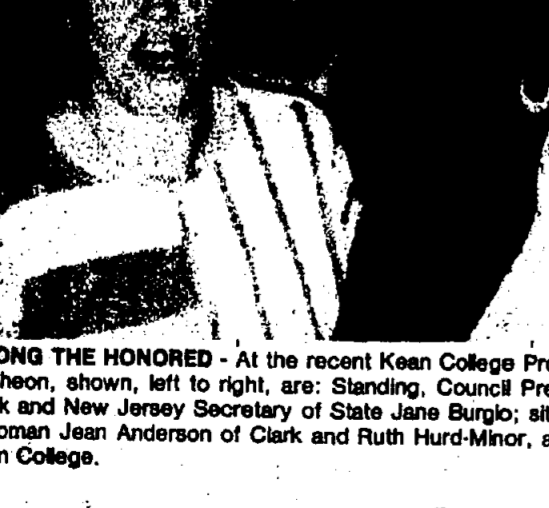

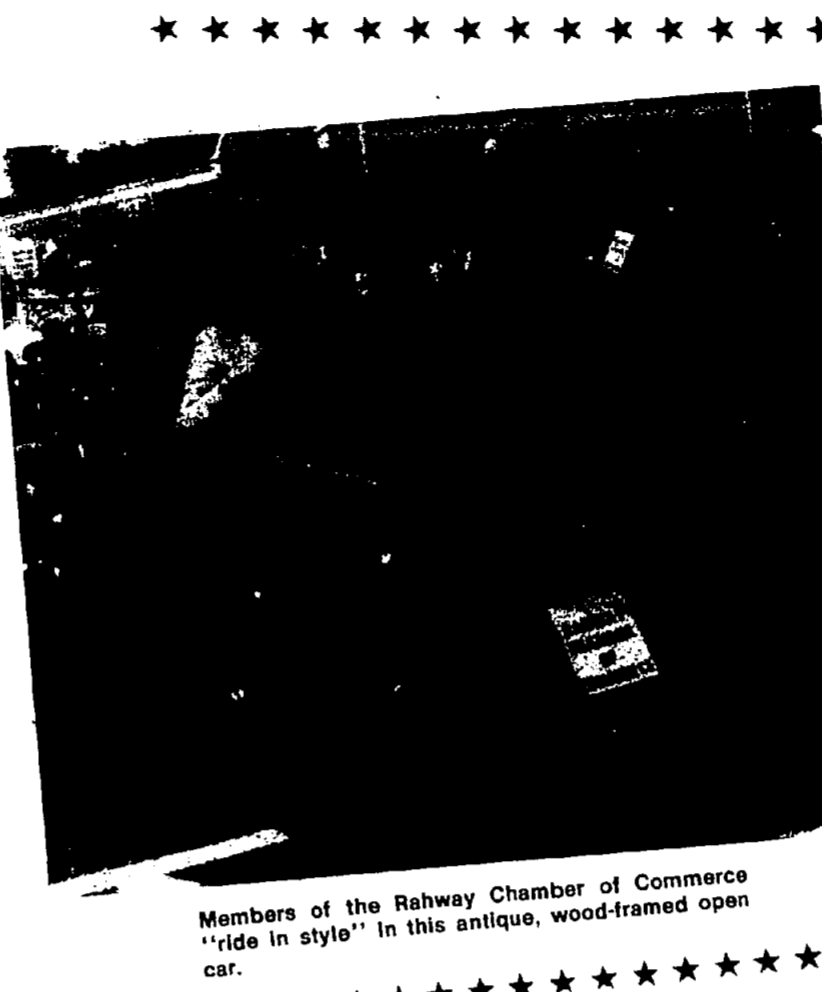
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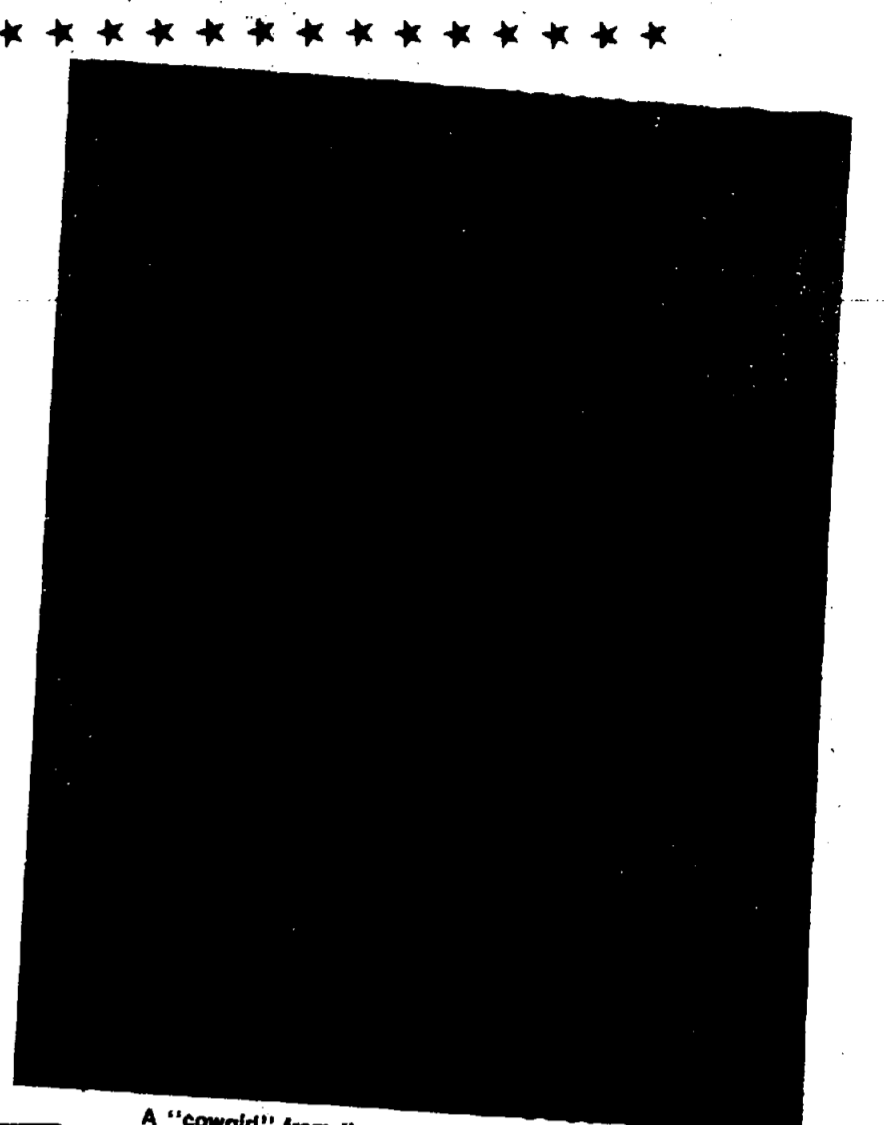

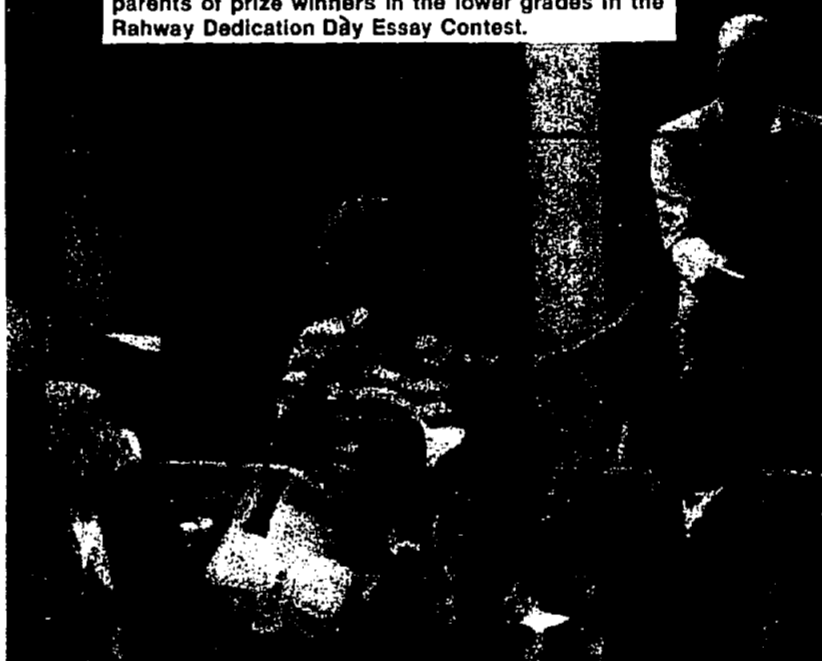

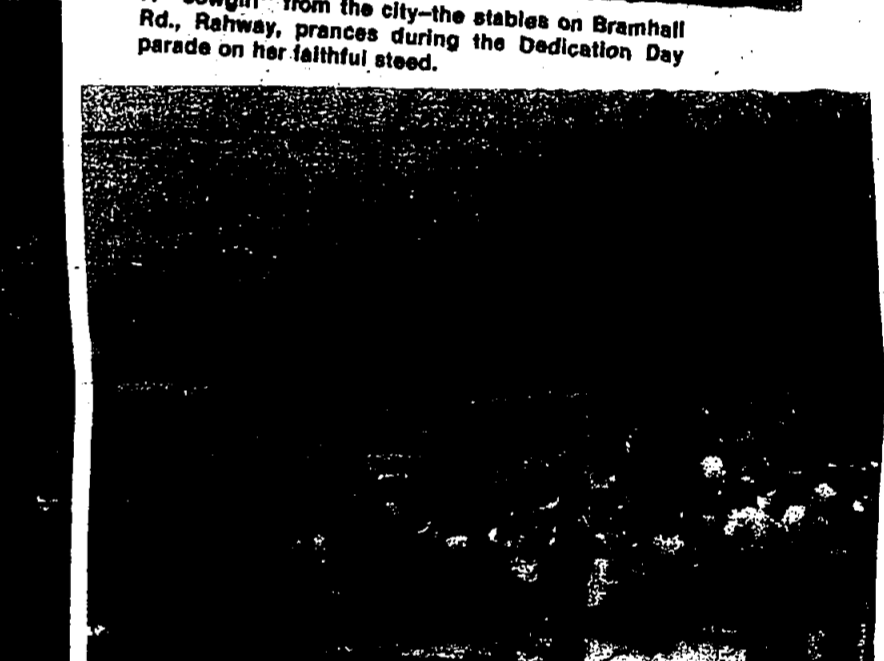

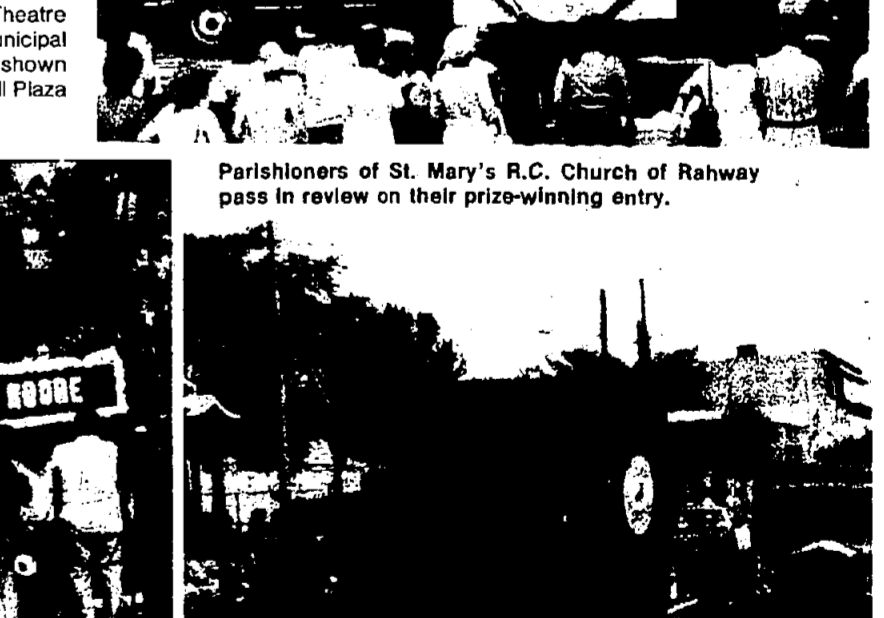

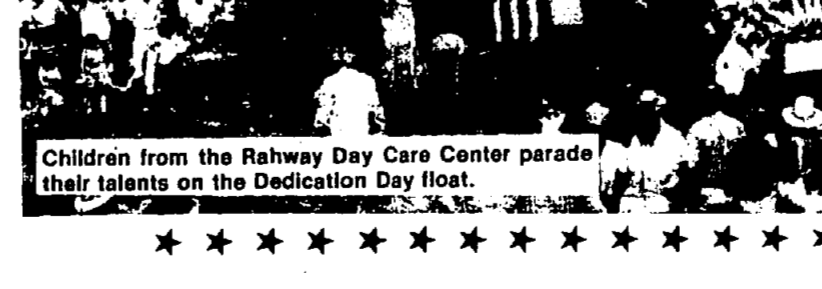

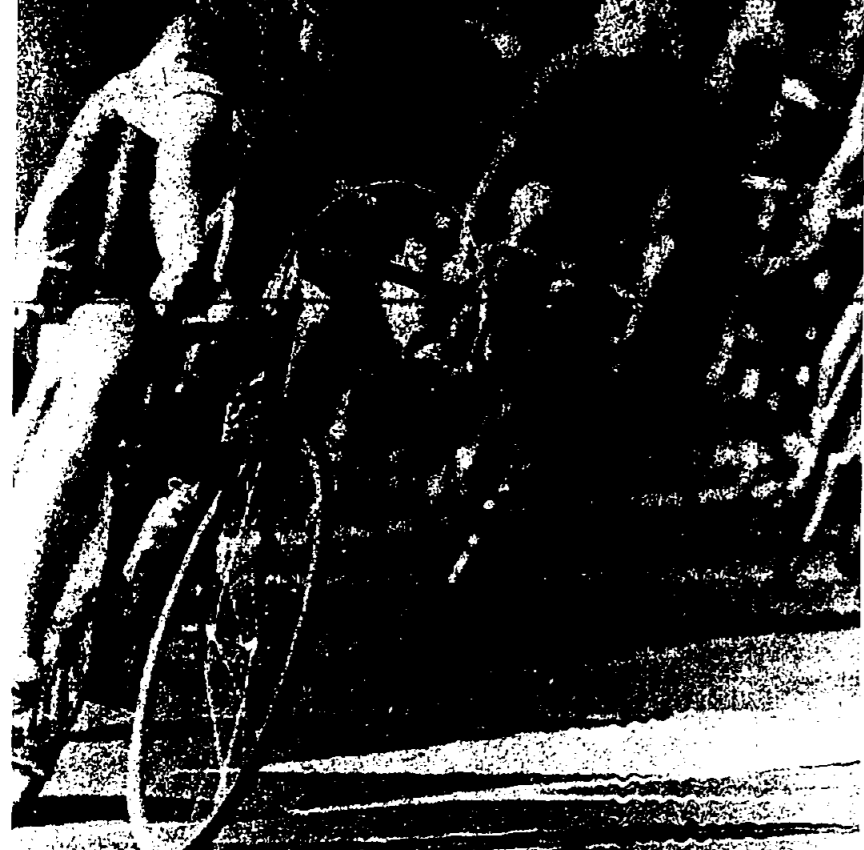

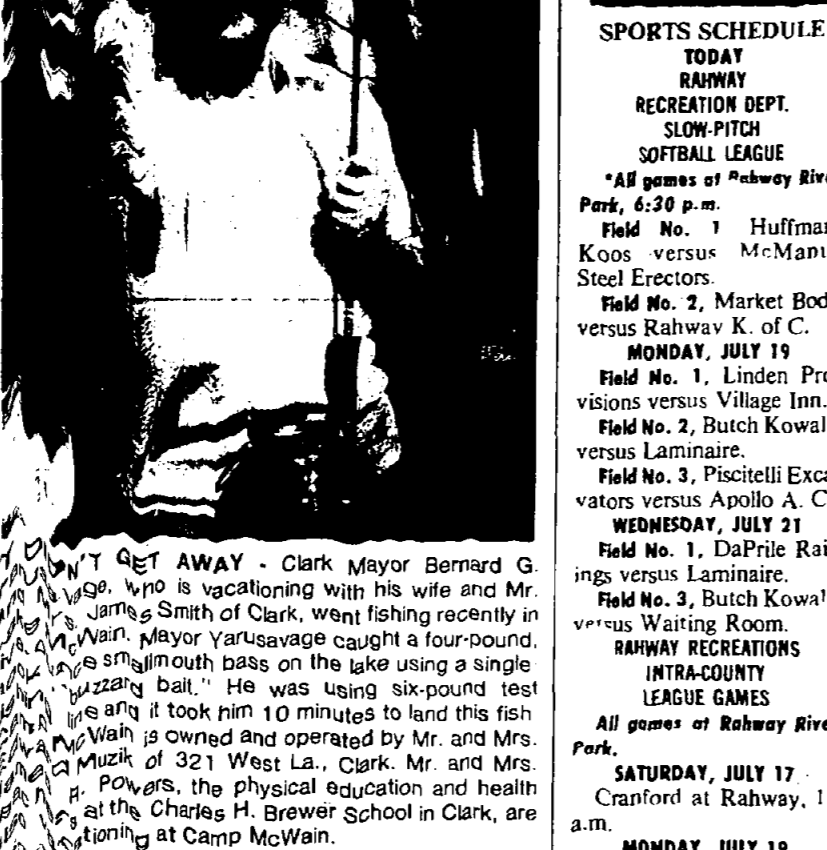

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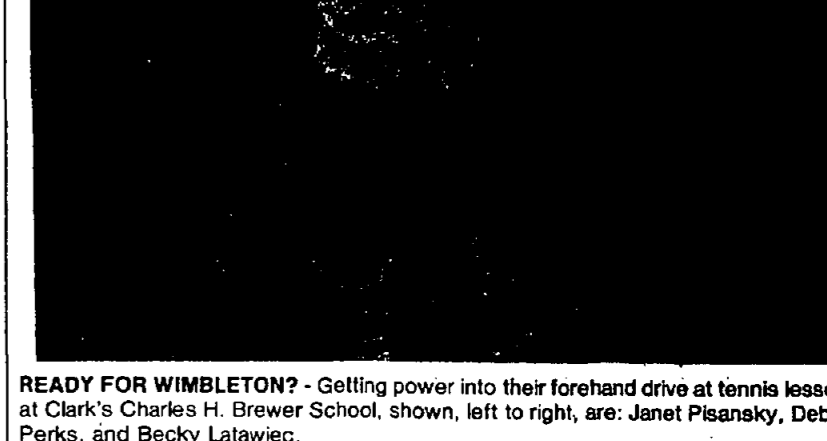
