Discipline policy deals with handicapped pupils

By R. R. Faszczewski The first, revised draft of a proposed policy for dealing with student discipline in Rahway's secondary schools was introduced by the Board of Education at its meeting on July 19.

One of the sections of the student code of behavior, as it is called, deals with classified or handicaped students.

According to the proposal, classified students charged with unacceptable behavior specifically related to their handicap will be treated in accordance with

That is, prior to suspending a classified student for more than three days, the administrator involved would be required to immediately contact the Dept. of Student Personnel Ser-

vices, and receive and consider input from the depart ment before finalizing any decision concerning the stu

The department would be required to make a vote of the notification in the file of the student, and to follow up if the department or its director deemed it appropriate.

Suspension of classified students was a major issue before the school body a few months ago when several parents alleged the percentage of suspended classified students in city schools appeared to be unusually high.

In addition to the section on classified students, the proposed policy would also require students to have nall passes when leaving classes during a period, and ticipation of any student in volved in a serious offense during a school disorder in all extra-curricular activities for at least one year.

This provision would go into effect only at the recommendation of the school principal and after action by the Board.

Also included in the pro posal is a provision for demerits to be given to students who violate the code of behavior.

Any student who accumulates a total of three demerits would be suspended out of school for three school days. Any demerit on a stu-

dent's record longer than three months would not be counted into the threedemerit total which could lead to suspension



The New Jersey State Firemen's Mutual Benevolent Assn., an organization of 6,500 professional firefighters and professional firefighting experts of all ranks, is conducting a survey of numerous New Jersey municipalities o determine the effects of a reduction in firefighter manpower on the firefighters and citizens of these municipalities. The source of this data is fire department

records and documents. The Rahway Survey has been analyzed, and the resulting data clearly demonstrates the adverse impact of the reduction in Rahway firefighter manpower on the firefighters of your municipality.

You should be aware incidents of all in-service fire apparatus responding to or working at fire alarms-leaving no fire apparatus available to respond to other fire alarms are increasing in both frequency and duration. The association has respectfully urged the mayor and

City Council of Rahway to promptly increase the number of paid firefighters, and also join our efforts in pressing the New Jersey Legislature to provide some "CAP" relie for municipalities, and to include firefighters in the Safe and Clean Streets Act. We also urge you, the citizens of Rahway, to let your

voices be heard to the mayor and the members of the City Council. I assume you are interested in adequate fire protection, and if you're not, I offer you the following sugges--Be sure to invest in a smoke detector for every room

-Get yourself a ladder that will reach to the uppe most windows in your home or business in case someone has to be rescued.

-Buy a large-sized diameter garden hose, and keep it hooked up at all times in case of fire and a delayed esponse-by-your-fire-department.--



ing the needs of the state's senior citizens. While the 21 respondents were in general agreements as to the problems facing the elderly, they were divided over whether the elderly are better off today then they were five years ago. Fourteen offices said they felt the elderly's situation had improved, and seven said they felt it had grown worse.

However, those citing an improved situation did not agree on why that has been the case. They listed more awareness of elderly problems, Older Americans Act programs, tax deductions, general improvement of the middle class, increased special transportation, Social Security benefit increases and other developments. One said the improvement was due to the elderly themselves.

The seven offices replying the elderly were worse off all laid the blame to inflation. One respondent commented, "Inflation has taken its toll, particularly in the cost of housing, utilities and food. Necessities are increasingly difficult for older persons to obtain. Once their ousing costs are met there is very little left."

In ranking a list of 10 services in their importance to the elderly, the respondents placed transportation on top the list followed by health/outreach assistance, homemaker/chore assistance, housing, nutrition service. pharmaceutical-aid programs, taxpayer assistance, legal services, senior-center activities and weatherization. When asked to rate the effectiveness of

government's response to the elderly, the Area Agency on Aging Offices gave themselves high marks, followed by the State Division on Aging and the United States Administration on Aging. The U. S. Dept. of Labor was listed as either minimally effective or uneffective on twothirds of the returns. I was prompted to conduct the survey to obtain a close-up view of the Older Americans Act as it operates in

New Jersey. The act, which was extended last December for three more years, provides senior citizens with jobs and an array of services. Under the program last year, older people in New Papers set Jersey were provided about 93,000 units of transportation, 4,000 meals were served shut-ins, 1,000 seniors benefited from home-repair assistance and nearly five
