that same distance on artificial legs. That can cause serious pain, perhaps even bleeding. A person wearing prosthetic legs is more susceptible to falling than an ablebodied person. Second, people with wheelchairs, walkers, leg braces







A majority of the respondents also indicated they vere no worse off this year than they were last year despite the slumping economy and rising unemployment Fifty percent said their economic circumstances were about the same a year ago, and 36% said they were better off. Only 14% said their financial circumstances ha hanged for the worse.

When asked to identify the most serious economic problem facing Americans today, they were closely divid ed over whether inflation, unemployment or high interest rates was the principal obstacle to an ecomomic recovery Of those responding, 36% singled out high interest rates

More than half the participants said the government should work to reduce unemployment by reducing federal spending, taxes and regulation, and by encouraging in creased private-sector investment with tax incentives. On ly 22% preferred attacking the unemployment problem brough the creation of short-term public service jobs On the revenue side of the government's ledger, the poll showed considerable interest in restructuring of the federal income tax system. Fifty-five percent of the respondents said they would like to see a switch to a tax system with the same flat percentage rate paid b
