

# Board of Education contemplates extending summer school to those in 11th grade

Eleventh-grade students in Rahway may have the opportunity to participate in summer school this year.

The Board of Education March 21 approved a motion to submit an application to the state that would allow summer learning for 12th graders as well as interested 11th-grade students, provided all of the juniors would be accommodated, at no additional cost to the Board.

The school body had revealed during a prior caucus meeting \$4,000 had been allocated in the budget for the secondary summer school.

According to Frank Brunette, superintendent of schools, last year 35 12th-grade students took part in summer school with approximately six students per class. The school superintendent said summer classes were necessary primarily for required subjects such as physical education and English.

Upon the recommendation of Rahway High School principal, Roy Valentine, Mr. Brunette suggested the extension of summer school to the 11th grade if possible. He said Mr. Valentine believed it would be an economy move.

Some Board members disputed in which grades summer school should be instituted.

Ronald Matusaitis, who said he was totally against the idea of summer school, and voted so, claimed, "This year, it will be the 11th grade and then it will be the 10th grade."

He likened summer school to a crutch, and said he believed those who utilized it should pay for it themselves and not have the taxpayers pay for it. Matusaitis was concerned about students not putting their all into their work during the year if summer school was available.

Mrs. Bette Jacobs, board vice president, disagreed, saying the school body should not let students wait

until they are ready to be graduated before completing a course.

She said, "I don't believe students will slough off during the school year."

"We really don't know what our needs are for the 11th grade," she added.

The school superintendent interjected, "Students don't relish going to summer school." He said he believed smaller summer school classes may achieve passing grades for the students.

In other action, the Board:

Approved a motion to transfer a resource-room teacher at Roosevelt School, Mrs. Margaret Beute, to a half-time position as a resource-room teacher at Roosevelt School and a half-time position as a resource-room teacher at the high school.

Approved the appointment of Reginald Bellamy as a para-professional in the Student Personnel Services Dept.'s special education

program for a 10-month position, five and one-half hours per day at \$30 per day.

Okayed a motion to change the salary of Mrs. Ellen Kearney, because she had received additional college credits.

Approved the 1983-1984 school calendar. Students will begin school Tuesday, Sept. 6, 1983, and finish Monday, June 18, 1984 for a total of 182 school days.

Authorized a motion to apply for a grant, and operate if received, a new pre-school handicapped programs, for materials and supplies in the amount of \$2,600 for the 1983-1984 school year, fully-federally funded.

Approved a motion to award the high school band uniform bid to E. S. Collins Uniform Co. of Union, to supply a total of 110 complete band and up-front squad uniforms in the amount of \$10,185 per the low bid of Feb. 24.

The Rahway Taxpayers Assn. opposed the \$5,990,000 bond referendum the Rahway Board of Education asked the Rahway voters and taxpayers to approve at the Special Election authorized by the Board, and held on Feb. 22.

The bond issue went down to defeat. Board president, Louis Rizzo, and Superintendent of the Rahway schools, Frank Brunette, claimed the \$5,990,000 program was urgently needed to over-

come the state of disrepair of the Rahway High School building.

Prior to the Special Election the taxpayers association, in a press release, gave valid reasons, facts and figures disproving the claim the program embraces many urgent and critical items.

Although the Board put Rahway taxpayers to the unnecessary expense of a Special Election on Feb. 22, and the voters defeated the bond referendum, the school body has the audacity to not abide by the decision of the voters and taxpayers of Rahway, and will place the same \$5,990,000 bond referendum on the ballot, along with the \$8,049,794 1983-84 school budget, to be voted upon at the Tues-

day, April 12, 1983, regular School Election.

If perchance the bond referendum is passed, it will cancel the decision made by the voters at the Feb. 22 Special Election. Board president, Rizzo, claims the margin by which the bond referendum was defeated was too small to let stand and the voters were confused as to when they were to vote on the issue.

If the bond referendum had passed by as little as only one vote, I am sure the Board of Education would have let it stand. It would not be putting it on the April 12 regular School Election ballot for the voters to have another chance at it.

The School Board set the stage for the Feb. 22 special election, not the taxpayers and voters of Rahway. They lost their game and immediately cried foul.

Not too many years ago the law was the yearly school budget had to be defeated twice before it was binding. That law was changed so now the voters need only vote a school budget down once.

What the School Board is trying to do now with the bond referendum is require the voters turn it down twice. The members hope the voters who opposed the bond issue will be caught off guard, thinking turning it down at the Feb. 22 Special Election was final.

Mr. Rizzo still claims the \$5,990,000 extravagant renovation program is critically needed. A picture of Mr. Rizzo appeared in the Feb. 17 edition of The Rahway News-Record, captioned, "showing Mr. Rizzo

pointing to a crack in the paint of a wall of the auditorium."

It is this supposed to highlight one of the crises that exist? Items included in the renovation program are in the amount of \$76,000 for sidewalk replacement and \$55,000 for landscaping. Are these items considered vital by the members of the School Board?

Most of the items included in the ambitious program should have been handled in the everyday housekeeping of the school building, and the rest should have been taken care of each year with the money earmarked for maintenance in each year's budget.

Roy Valentine, the principal of the high school, has made statements to the effect if the \$5,990,000 bond issue is not approved, permitting the extravagant renovation program to proceed, it will or might jeopardize the high school's accreditation.

This is just another attempt at scare tactics. In a recent press release by Superintendent of schools, Frank Brunette, he made a vain attempt to shame the voters into supporting and voting for the \$5,990,000 bond issue by stating to support and vote for the bond issue was an indication of belief in the public school system, and they would be supporting a noble cause.

He was thereby inferring any voter and taxpayer who does not support and vote for the bond issue does not believe in the public school system, and is not in favor of supporting noble causes.

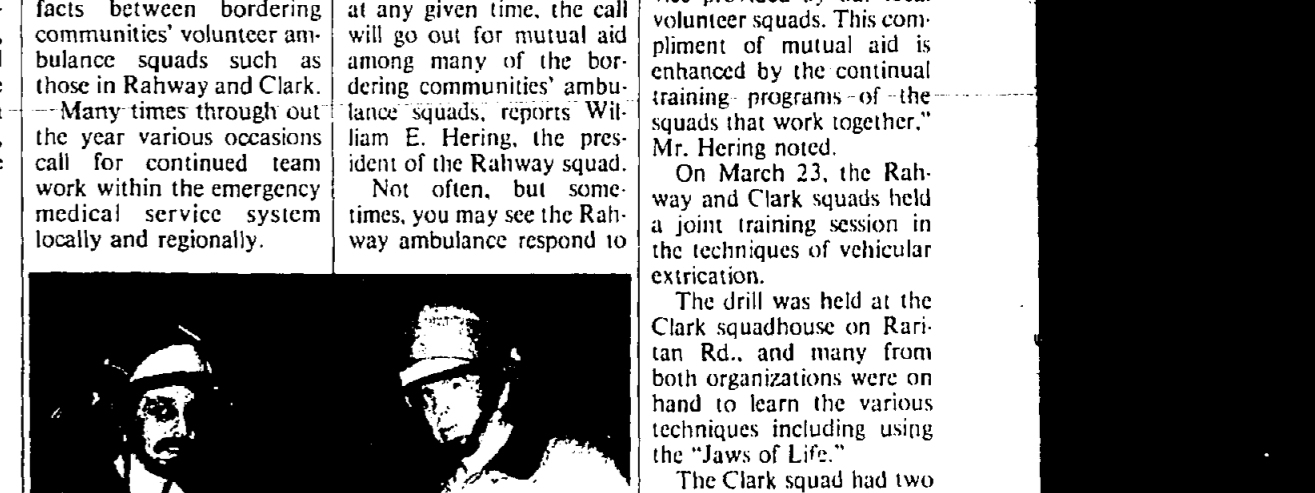

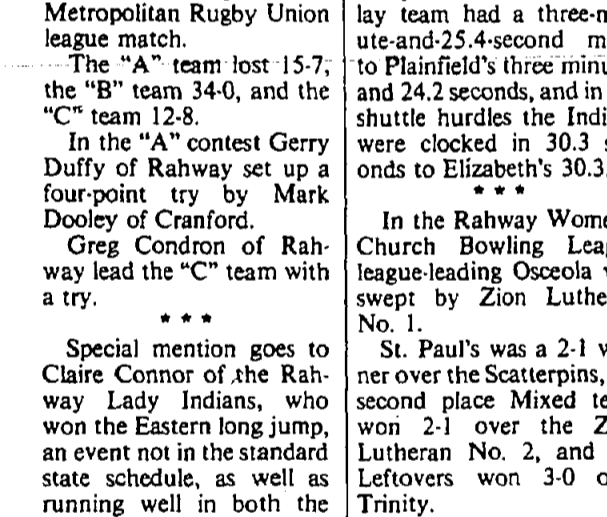

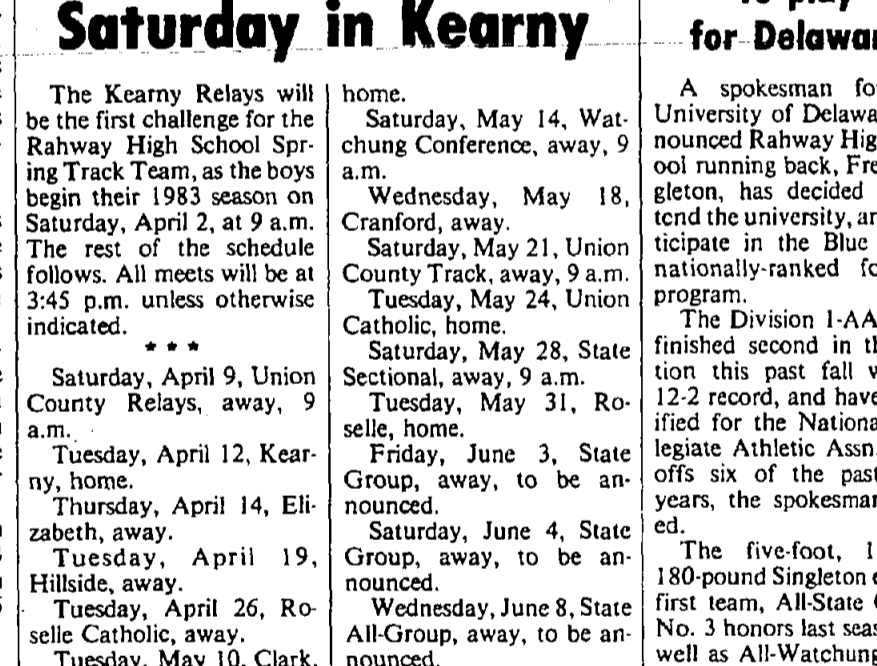

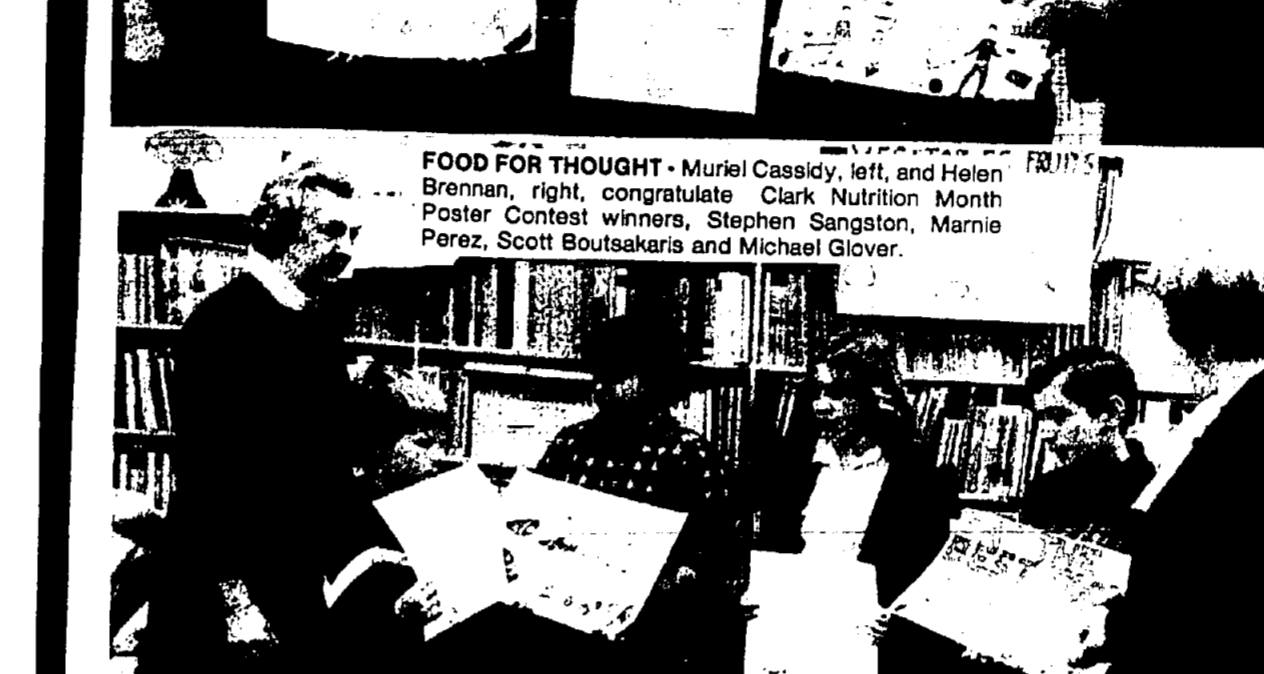

**Jobless aid may be subject to taxes**

Recipients of unemployment compensation during 1982 may be required to pay tax on a portion of the compensation if their total income for the year exceeded certain amounts.

Taxability of unemployment affects single people who had more than \$12,000 income, including unemployment, during 1982, and married couples who had more than \$18,000 income. If total income was less than these amounts, then no part of unemployment is taxable.

In explaining the unemployment taxability issue, an Internal Revenue Service spokesman noted regardless of the amount of unemployment received, those who file a tax return must report the amount.

Whether or not any unemployment is then included in taxable income depends upon a mathematical comparison between total income and the \$12,000 or \$18,000 base-income levels.

The IRS spokesman noted the amount of unemployment compensation that must be included in taxable income is the lesser of the amount received or one-half the amount by which total income (including unemployment income) exceeds the base amount of \$12,000 for single persons or \$18,000 for married couples.

Unemployment compensation has been subject to tax in prior years. The change, however, is before 1982 no part of unemployment income was taxable unless total income exceeded \$20,000 for single persons or \$25,000 for married couples.
