

## High School renovation loses again; incumbents, Mrs. Benes win easily

City voters once again turned down a proposed \$5,990,000 bond-issue referendum for renovations to Rahway High School, during Tuesday's School Board Election.

The referendum had originally been defeated by residents by approximately 215 votes during a Special

Election Feb. 22. This time, with the larger voter turnout during a regular School Board Election, the voters rejected the proposal by a 588-vote margin.

The greatest opposition to the bond issue was felt in the Sixth Ward, Third and Fourth Districts.

Overall, First Ward sup-

port for the bond issue, which surfaced during the Feb. 22 election, was also felt during Tuesday's Election. District No. 3 and District No. 4 in the First Ward approved the question 37-36.

The majority of the proposed \$6 million renovation bond issue was targeted for the replacement of the high

school's heating system and the refurbishing of the Physical Education Dept.

Supporters of the bond issue pointed to the deterioration of the high school and considered the renovation project essential. Opponents of the proposed said items such as sidewalk replacement and landscaping were not crucial areas. They were critical of the Board for requesting the taxpayers to support the expenditure in one lump sum as well as for

asking for the voters' approval a second time after its initial defeat.

According to the superintendent of schools, Frank D. Brunette, the bond proposal will be "put on the table." The fate of the bond issue will be determined by the Board, he said, and the school body will have to look at priorities.

The school official said, "Certainly, the people have made their needs known." He said he would like to know what those specific

needs are.

City voters also defeated the School Board budget by an approximate 650-vote margin. The \$7,995,224 current expense portion of the budget was defeated 1,259 to 605, while the \$54,000 capital-outlay portion was voted down 1,267 to 586.

The school budget rejection followed the city's trend of tab defeats, with 18 of the last 21 school budgets being turned down.

Opposition to the budget

was strongly felt in the Sixth Ward, Districts No. 3 and 4.

The City Council and the Board of Education will meet later this month to determine ways to reduce the school budget.

The three declared candidates vying for the three available slots, Elizabeth Jacobs, Eileen Benes and Bernard D. Miller, were elected to three-year terms.

The successful candidates received 1,062, 1,042 and 1,167 votes, respectively.

Mrs. Jacobs and Mr. Miller are incumbents, while Mrs. Benes is a newcomer to the Board.

Mrs. Jacobs is the current vice president of the school body. She won the right to serve out the remainder of an unexpired term in 1981 as a write-in candidate in an election in which there were no declared candidates for the unexpired term.

Mr. Miller was appointed to the school body in October to fill the unexpired term of Victor Kurylak.

The only known write-in candidate prior to the election was Kenneth Secor. He garnered 104 write-in ballots.

The total number of ballots cast was 2,111. According to board attorney, Leo Kahn, approximately 15% of the registered voters turned out for the School Board Election.

## Petitioners: Methadone clinic not welcome in our community

Rahway Fourth Ward Councilman Harvey Williams, acting as spokesman for the Rahway Anti-Methadone Clinic Petition Committee, announced today the committee has prepared a list of reasons why every

Rahway citizen and business should oppose the location of such a clinic in the community.

Councilman Williams also urged all residents to attend the state public hearing on this issue, which will

be held on Thursday, April 21, in Rahway City Hall at 7:30 p.m.

A New Jersey Dept. of Health spokesman announced the department is considering a building on Lawrence St. east of Rte. No. 1

as a possible site for relocation of the methadone clinic currently located in Elizabeth. It is holding the public hearing on the 21st to get community input on this possibility.

The list of reasons in opposition to the proposed clinic location as prepared by the petition committee is as follows:

—There is no evidence even one Rahway citizen is served by the clinic.

—It would create an unwarranted extra workload on the Rahway Police Dept.

—It would be located near a community center.

—It would be located near a residential area.

—It would be located only a few blocks from an elementary school and on the travel route of school children.

—It would be located adjacent to a commercial business with a heavy public traffic flow.

—No public transportation serves the proposed site.

—Rahway as a community can deal with any local drug-abuse problems, but should not be forced to

have 300 to 350 outside drug abusers commuting every day through residential and business areas.

—Any clinic should be located in the area of the people it serves and not forced into other areas.

—Rahway is not unsympathetic to the people who use this service or to the merchants and residents of Elizabeth, but not sympathetic enough to force this burden on Rahway merchants and residents.

Members of City Council were asked recently to recommend to Mayor Daniel L. Martin the names of those they would like to see

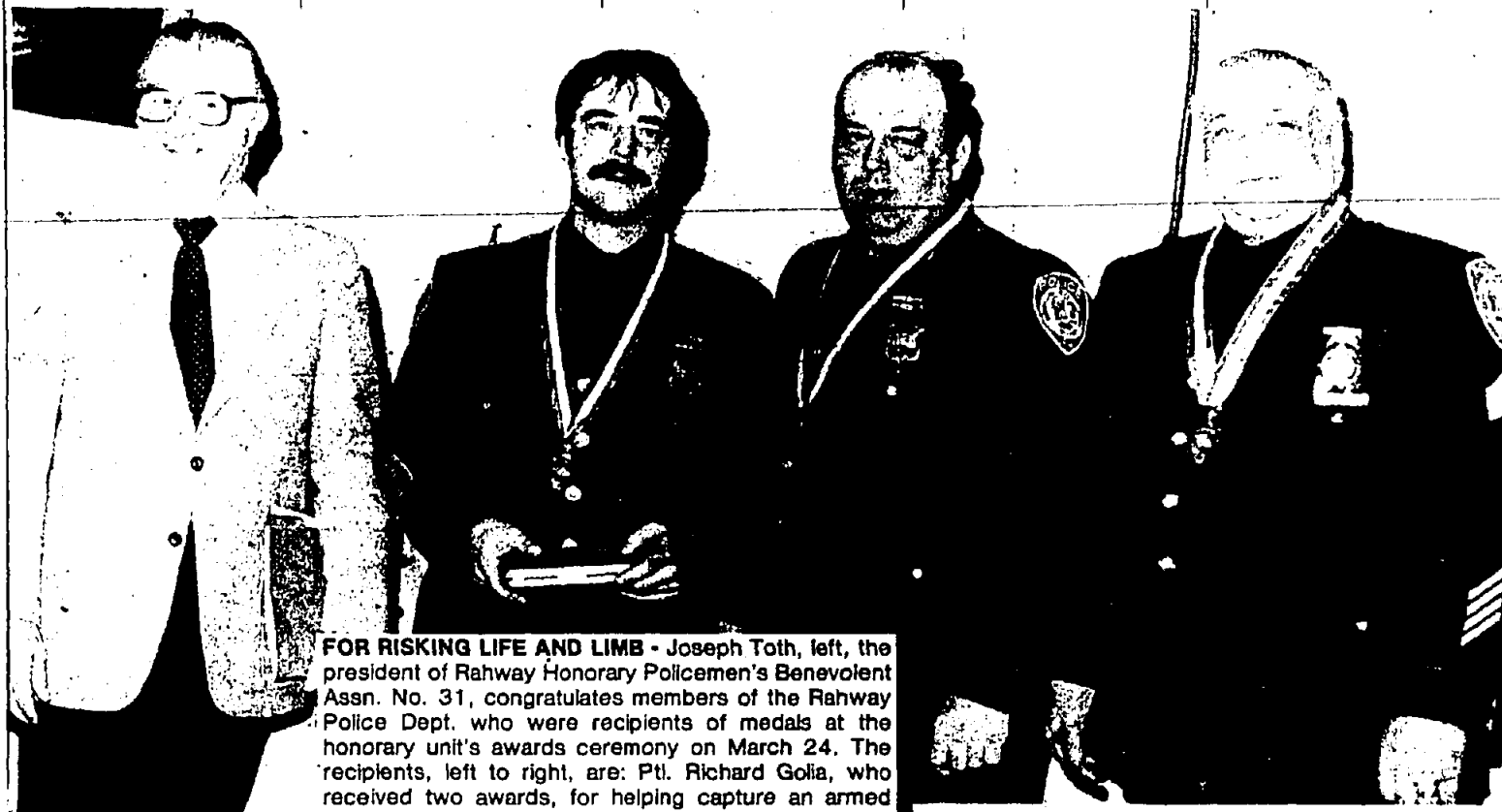
serve on the committee or if they themselves would like to serve, it was reported to The Rahway News-Record recently.

## 'Mystery Runner' asks city aid

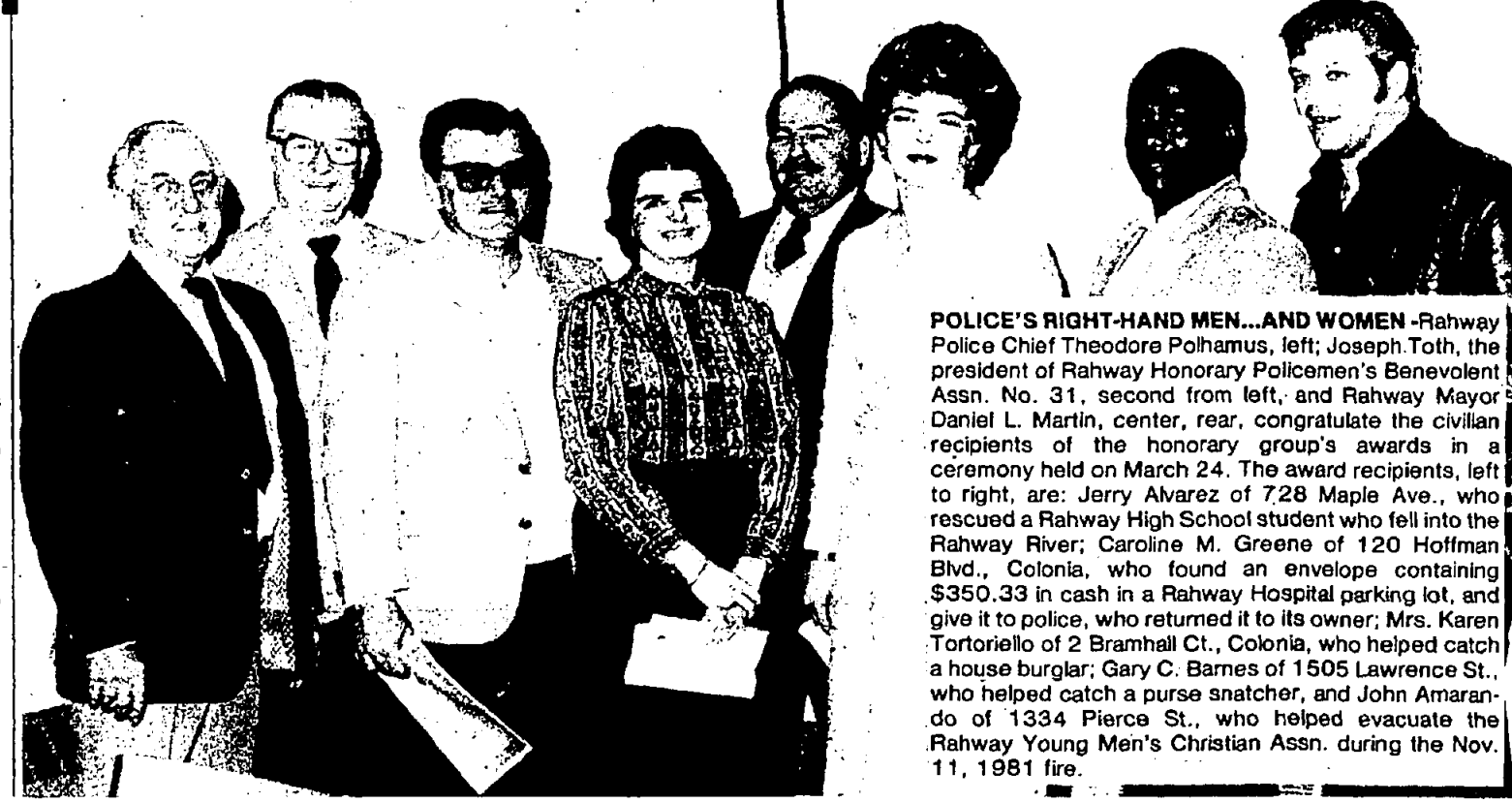

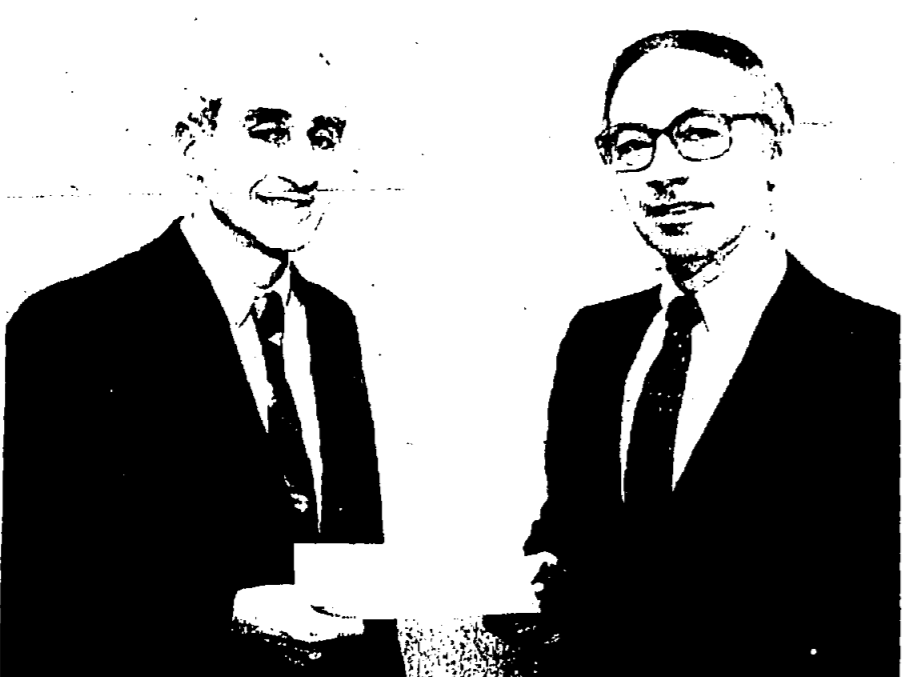

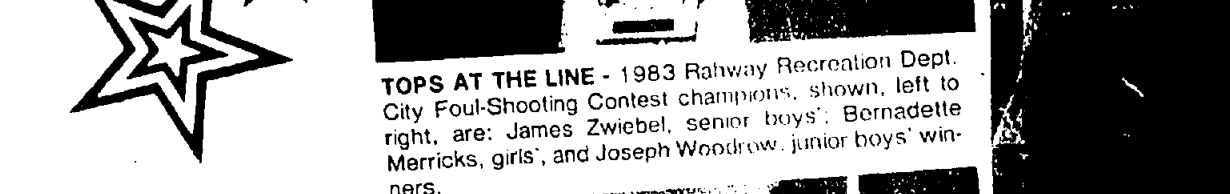

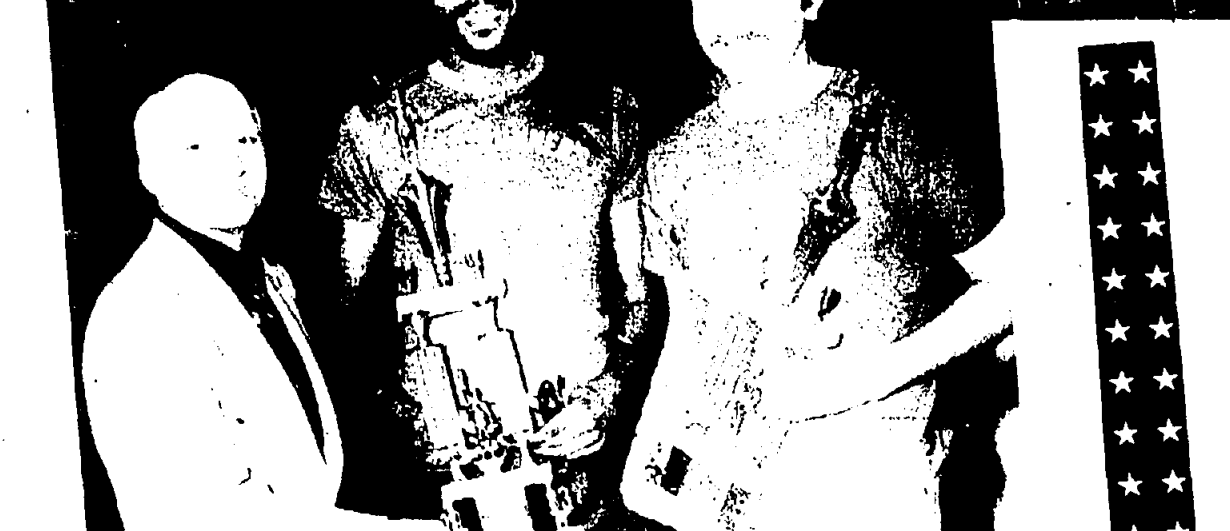

## Sheriff's officers train on firearms

Marking the first time members of law-enforcement agencies have trained under the new Union County Uniform Firearms Policy, 85 officers of the Union County Sheriff's Dept. are in the midst of a two-week training program at the Linden Police Firearms Training Range.

The new annual requirements will include both field and classroom instruction in legal liability, lawful use of firearms, the care and handling of weapons and the use of the service revolver and police shotgun.

"With few exceptions, the new policy is no more difficult than the training our officers have received in the past," said Ralph Froehlich, Union County sheriff. "The value of that training has been demonstrated by the professional manner in which our officers have shown responsibility and restraint in the use of firearms in previous incidents."

Sheriff Froehlich expressed his appreciation to Linden Police Chief Dominic Lello for allowing the sheriff's officers to complete 10 hours of firearms instruction at the Linden facility. The program will run to tomorrow.

## Bradley focuses on waste cleanup

"If we don't leave our children a clean environment, we are leaving them basically nothing," a New Jersey mother told New Jersey Democratic Sen. Bill Bradley, in an interview taped for his monthly television program, "New Jersey Now."

One of three participants in a segment about New Jerseyans who live near some of the worst toxic waste sites in the country, Barbara Vecchiarelli of Morganville described the fear and frustration of waiting for the cleanup at the Burnt Fly Bog site.
