Sale of \$6.1 million in bonds to include payment for City Hall

The sale of \$6,116,000 in bonds, combining a variety of projects authorized over a number of years by various ordinances, including street resurfacing, the construction of the city's Municipal Complex on Main St. and Milton Ave. and \$918,000 in water-utility projects was authorized Monday by a City Council resolution.

Included in one part of the package is \$5,198,000, which includes the \$225,000 bond ordinance for the purchase of equipment and furnishing for the new City Hall and Police Headquarters; \$149,000 for the resurfacing of various city streets; \$400,000 for the construction of an addition to the Public Works Garage, renovation of the Dock St. Pumping Station, relocation of the pistol range and picnic area and purchase of equipment for Public Works; \$81,000 for the city's contribution to the cost of the Union County construction of the Lenape Park Detention Basin for flood control along the Rahway River;

\$2,000,000 for the construction of the Municipal Complex; \$200,000 for another street resurfacing project; \$22,000 for the reconstruction of Montgomery St. between E. Scott and E. Grand Aves. and E. Lake Ave. between Thorn St. and Fernside Pl. and \$120,000 for the resurfacing of another group of streets.

The water-utility bonds include those for: Permanent repairs to water-utility trenches, water main installation and street repairs and rehabilitation and reconstruction of water-utility wells; improvement of Bloodgood's and Jackson's Pond and construction of a storage reservoir in the city.

The Council will accept proposals for the sale of the bonds on Wednesday, May 25, at 8 p.m. in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

Only Second Ward Councilman John C. Marsh objected to the bond-sale resolutions, saying he wanted to have a chance to separate the provisions for financing the City Hall Complex and the picnic area, which he opposed, from the street resurfacing program, which he said he was in favor of.

However, Sixth Ward Councilman James J. Fulcomer, although he said he may have disagreed with specific portions of the bonding, the resolutions adopted Monday only would help the city get funding, which had already been formally authorized by ordinance, before the statute of limitations ran out on the bonding.

Business Administrator Joseph M. Hartnett explained further a new federal law says the way in which bonds are sold will change on Thursday, June 30, of this year, and this might have an adverse effect on the sale of the bonds and the interest rates.

This is the reason he gave for having to move on the resolutions as quickly as possible.

Furthermore, according to Third Ward Councilman Max Sheld, this was the way the state required the bonding to be set up.

When the vote on the four resolutions concerning the bonding was taken, Councilman Marsh voted in favor only of the sale of the water-utility bonds.

In a matter related to the sale of the bonds, Alonzo W. Lawrence of 1343 Madison Ave. wanted to know where the city stood on arbitration cases it was now involved in with various contractors on the City Hall project, and he complained about an executive session on that matter on Dec. 31 of last year, which lasted two hours into the scheduled start time of the public Council session.

Almost all Dem committee hopefuls run off organization line in Primary

Virtually the only suspense in the Tuesday, June 7, Primary Elections for members of the major political party county committees in Rahway will be in the Democratic Party, where no nominations were made for both the male and female positions in the Fourth District of the Second Ward, in the First District of the Third Ward and in the Fourth District of the Fifth Ward.

In those districts those who receive the most write-in votes will win the seats. If no votes are cast the Democratic Party, at its reorganization meeting the Monday after the Primary, will have the option of appointing someone to fill each vacancy.

Despite the lack of contests, only two committee candidates, George Link of 653 Maple Ave., in the Second District of the Sixth Ward, and Edmond Geisler of 371 Princeton Ave., in the Fourth District of the Second Ward, will be running under the slogan being used by Democratic candidates in other municipalities around Union County, Regular Democratic Organization of Union County.

The other candidates will be running under the slogan, Democrat, which is the one being used by Joseph M. Hartnett of Rahway, who is running in the Democratic Primary for State Senate in the 20th District, which includes Rahway.

There are no contests on the Republican side, and nominations were made for all 48 seats in the city's 24 election districts.

Day Care Center slates open house

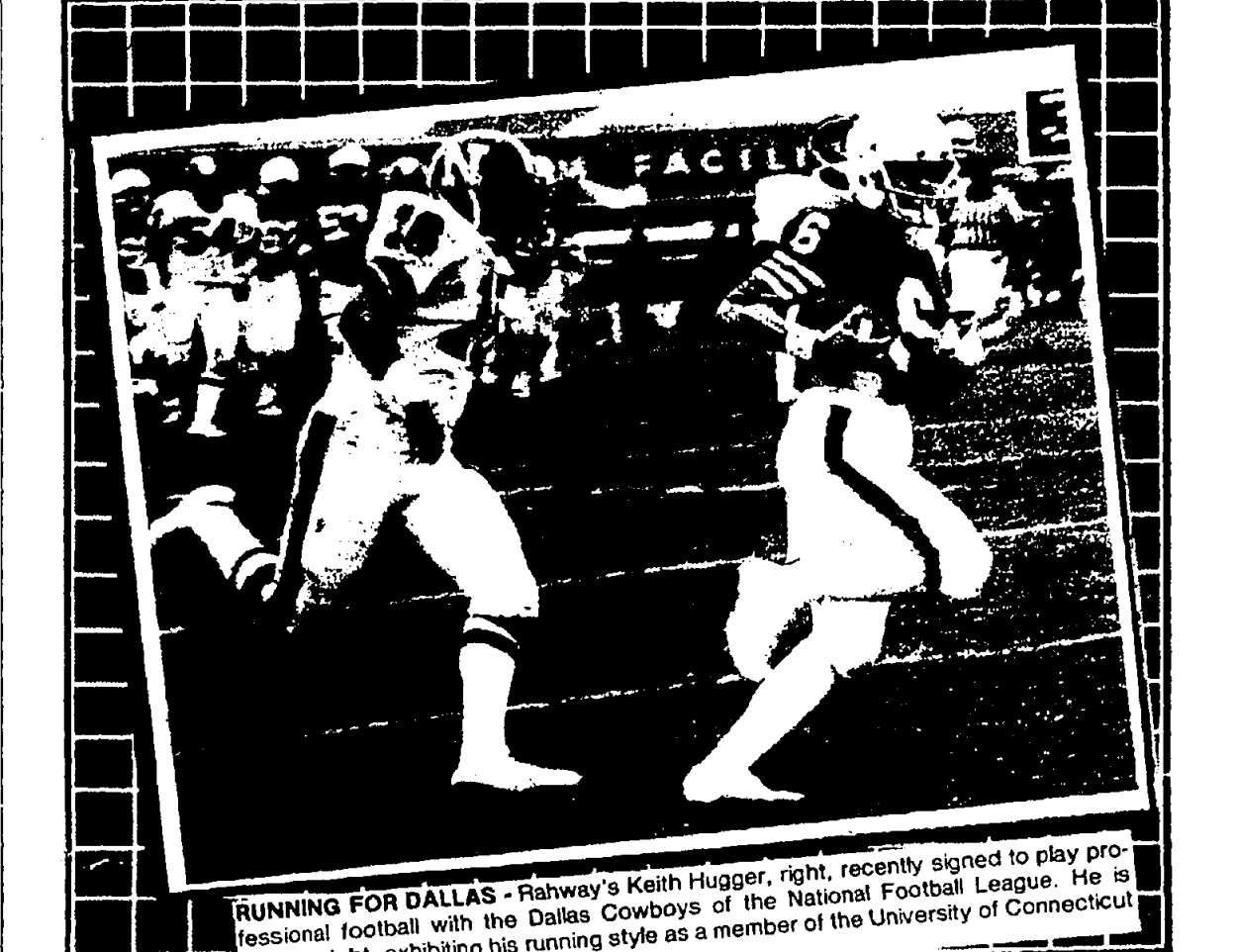

The open house is being held to acquaint Rahway area residents with the center and its program, as well as to celebrate its new location.

Starting with a new class of 12 children, housed in Rahway's First Baptist Church in 1971, the center grew so soon space was needed to house two classes across the street at Zion Lutheran Church.

The ever-expanding program necessitated the need for even larger quarters. So, after 10-plus years, the center moved its facilities to the New Brunswick Ave. address, formerly Columbian School, in Feb., 1983, reports a spokeswoman.

In addition to the pre-school and before-and-after-kindergarten program that serves children from three to six years old, the center also sequences a family day care program in 10 homes

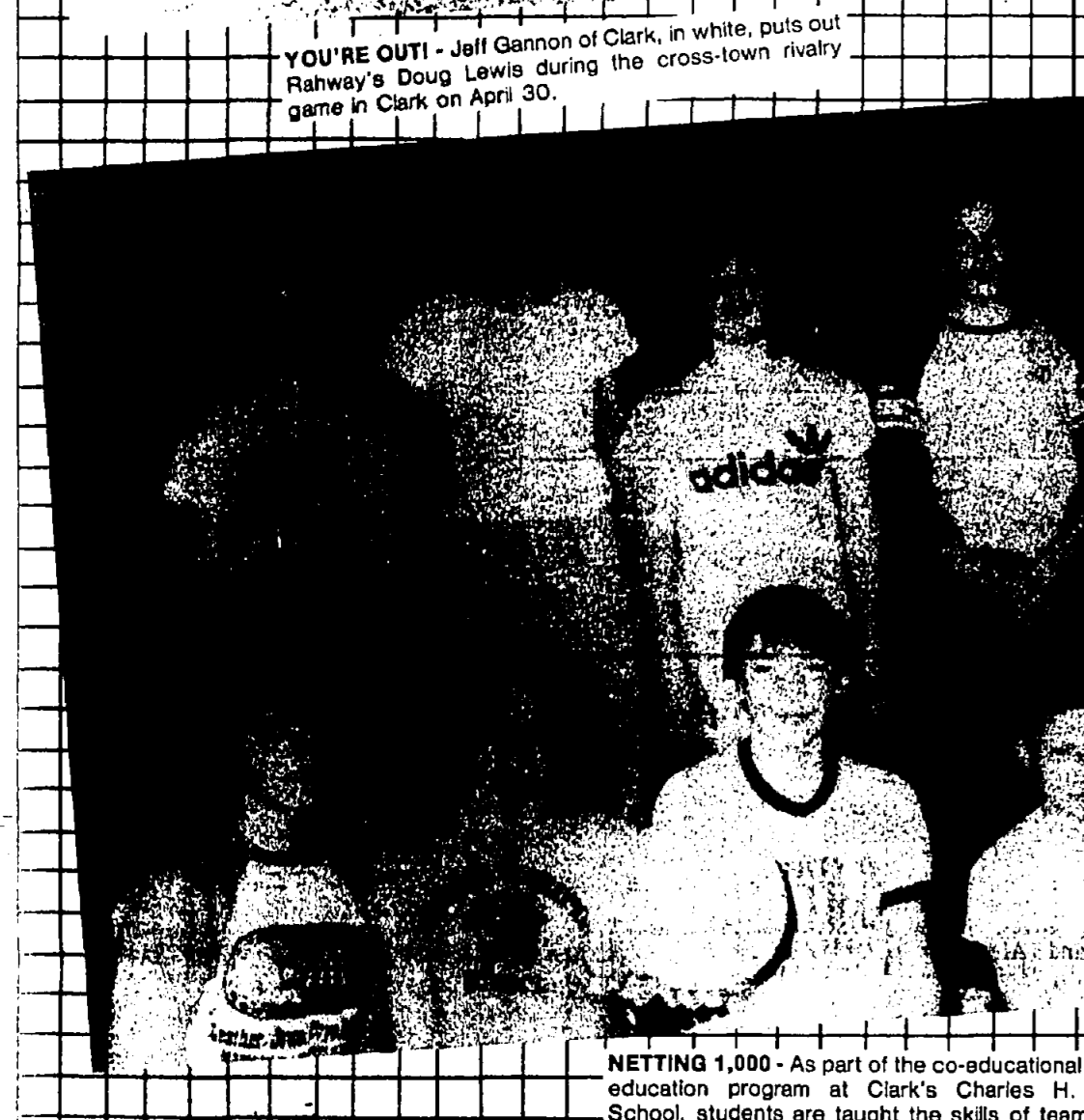

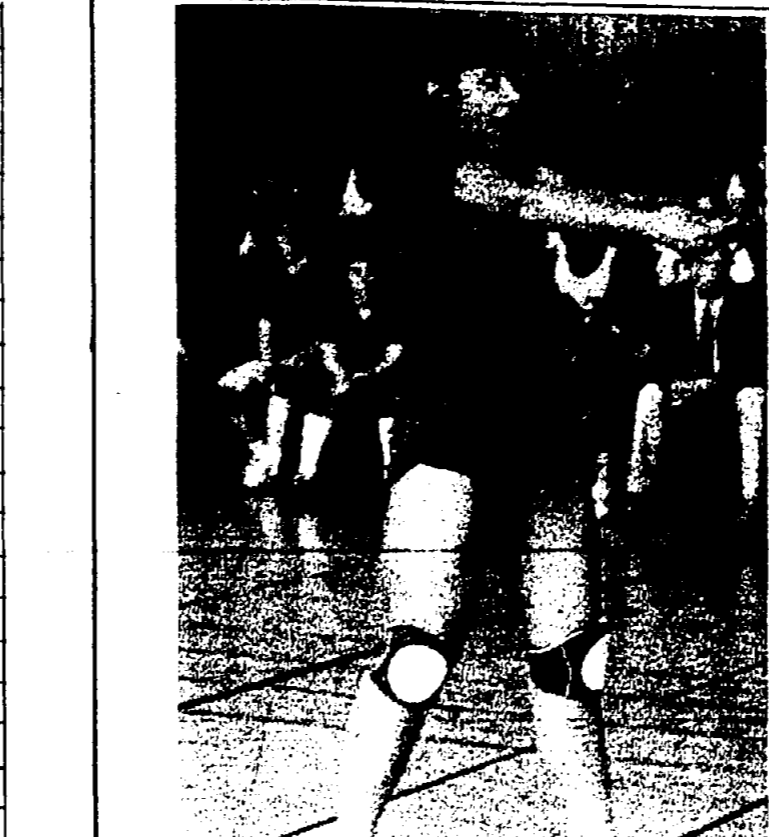
