

## 1982 city police report endorses increased police rapport with citizens

Rahway's police force is attempting to improve relationships with city residents by having patrol officers take time out of random patrol and make an effort to personally introduce themselves to the public they service.

According to a statement by Police Chief Theodore E. Polhamus in the department's 1982 annual report, which was released to the Rahway News-Record last week, "We are attempting to return to the public the sense of security and well being the 'beat officer' once provided. In understanding the adage, 'One can never go home again,' I am a firm believer that success depends upon the effort."

Although admitting that last year's attempt to re-create the old "beat officer's" personalized service to his patrol area fell far short of the police department's intended goal, the chief said his department will strive to produce a directed patrol program that offers "the epitome in crime prevention and police-citizen co-operation once again in 1983."

He added the program has already been the focal point of a meeting he had with local citizen groups which had been invited by councilmen to sit with police administrators in an effort to solve problems.

In a related crime-prevention measure, the report points out the Downtown Security Taskforce was established in September by Mayor Daniel L. Martin and Chief Polhamus with funds from a Community Development grant.

The force was put under the command of Lt. Barry Henderson and Sgt. Morris Clay. Assisting them were Sergeants Ronald McKee and Kenneth Sides,

Patrolmen Darmon Toney, Louis Garay, John Burke, Daniel Pitts, William White, Donald Caulfield, George Barnick and Philip Reimer and Detectives William Shiel, Robert Disko and Edward Tilton.

From Sept. 16 of last year to Feb. 5 of this year 12 officers were assigned to patrol the downtown business district in teams of two officers each. Their duties were to strictly enforce the city ordinances and state statutes and to "thoroughly make the downtown shopping center a safe, secure and attractive place for the citizens of our community to shop."

The officers were assigned on Thursday and Friday evenings from 5:30 to 10 o'clock and on Saturday afternoons from 1:30 to 6 o'clock—the times determined to be the peak shopping hours when officers would be needed in the downtown area.

The schedule was changed periodically when it was felt the officers would be

needed on other days, such as during the Christmas holidays and a change in the regular routine of the tactical teams.

According to the conclusions reached in the report the teams accomplished

their mission with numerous arrests for drinking in public, loitering in violation of the city ordinance and failure to disperse when instructed to do so by police officers.

The report went on,

"Working with the regular beat men on patrol the downtown area was policed of all undesirables that had been congregating in the shopping district. The Downtown Security Patrol was always available to en-

force against violations of the law and to give assistance to other officers when needed."

It also pointed out the conviction rate of the security patrol was 100%, and no officer assigned to

the unit had to spend any time in court for arrests made during his tour of the downtown area.

Statistics kept from Sept. 16, 1982 to the middle of January indicate no thefts or robberies of citizens in

the downtown area occurred at the time the downtown security tactical units were on patrol. Included in these statistics are the municipal parking areas near and around the downtown shopping areas.

All persons arrested pleaded guilty to charges of arresting officers in the Rahway Municipal Court.

The budget allowed for the patrol from its inception through the Christmas season to the end of the grant was \$8,078. The total amount used by the tactical team, including that during the Christmas season, and allowance for detective surveillance, supervision, administration and record keeping as of Feb. 8, 1983 was \$7,632.

Although there was a total of 308 miles covered, no mileage had been paid for by the city as of the filing of the report, although there was \$446 left in the grant after the above expenses were paid.

One of the major themes of the chief's section of the report was the ability of the police to function well faced with economic cutbacks and fiscal restraints coupled with additional demands for services.

Thanks to an agreement with the Policemen's Benevolent Assn. whereby officers accepted compensatory time off in lieu of overtime money \$43,000 in overtime pay was saved, reports the chief.

He added a resource reallocation policy was instituted in order to stay within the budgeted salary and wages. Personnel from

the traffic division were incorporated into the patrol division's platoon schedule, and this re-scheduling permitted traffic officers to assume vacated patrol posts and thus reduce the need to pay overtime to patrol officers.

Other contractual cutbacks achieved reduced the number of supervisors on duty during the weekends and this eliminated a previous minimum manpower requirement.

Because of maintained traffic enforcement the accident ratio declined, and vacant patrol posts were filled without paying overtime, the chief pointed out.

The police director further stated, "In spite of the hardships imposed by an ailing economy the crime picture continues to show improvements. Violent crime, indicative of hard times, has increased by 15.3%, yet when placed in perspective with all crime the city showed a total decrease in crime of 4.2%."

He explained, however, the increase in violent crime actually showed an increase of 24 robberies in 1982 over 1981.

The city's chief policeman added, "Of the 75 robberies that occurred in 1982, 43 cases were cleared by arrest, a tribute to the expertise of those officers who worked and achieved such high standards of performance."

Chief Polhamus also credited improved crime-prevention programs and Neighborhood Watch groups with helping to keep crime under control.

## Sewerage unit to discuss pre-treatment

The Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority has substantially completed development of its pre-treatment program in compliance with federal and state regulations.

The authority intends to adopt rules and regulations concerning use of its system. The rules and regulations will implement a system of permits. All non-domestic users who qualify under the rules will be issued a permit. The permit will stipulate the requirements with which users must comply in order to discharge to this waste-water treatment plant.

A final public meeting will be held at the sewerage authority, offices located at the foot of E. Hazelwood Ave., Rahway, on Thursday, June 2, at 2 p.m. The development of the entire pre-treatment program will be discussed in order to satisfy the federal and state requirements for public participation.

The final rules and regulations for use of the authority system will be available at the meeting.

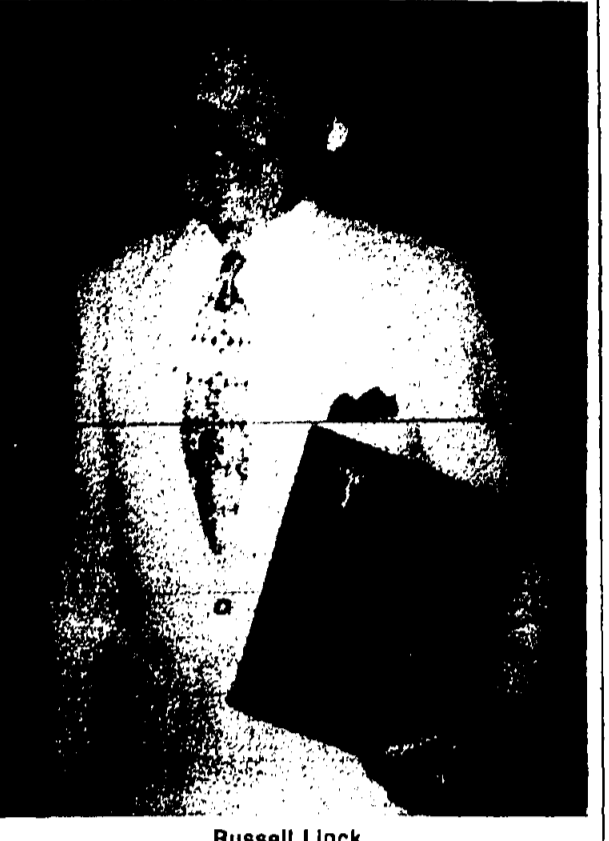

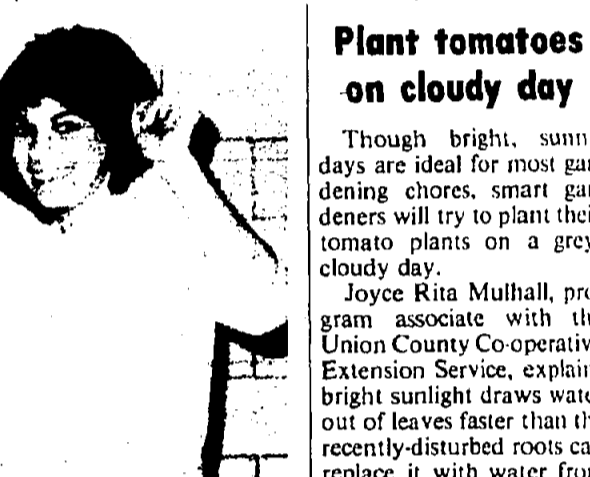

Jobs bill provides \$1.2 million grant

**Educational savings need encouragement**

The wave of anxiety last year over revisions in federal student aid and tighter eligibility for college loans indicated families on the average are having a harder time financing a college education for their children and do not favor sharp reductions in government assistance.

Rising tuition, escalating interest rates, and the increasing difficulty many young people are having in finding work made it next to impossible for many families to pay for college entirely on their own. Without federal loans and grants, few low-and-middle-income Americans could afford to send their children to college.

Widespread publicity about proposed cutbacks in federal college student financial aid programs led many people to mistakenly believe this kind of aid is no longer available, particularly to families with annual incomes of over \$30,000.

In fact, drastic cuts in the Guaranteed Student Loan, National Direct Student Loan, college work study, and State Student Incentive Grants were forestalled in response to the public outcry.

The lobbying effort by millions of students and their families paid off, and the student loan and aid programs were largely saved. The changes Congress did enact were primarily aimed at eliminating abuses.

There was an effort to reduce the rate of defaults on the loans, and to preclude wealthy families from borrowing money from the government at low interest rates and investing it at higher interest rates. These changes have been generally successful and have helped the programs survive.

Students attending most private colleges have found they can qualify for full government-guaranteed loans if their families' adjusted incomes do not exceed \$40,000. More affluent families are eligible for reduced assistance.

That kind of temporary tinkering with eligibility standards, however, is by no means a long-term solution. Congress must find a more equitable way of helping every American family to afford a higher education for students who are qualified to be admitted to a college or technical school.

Education savings accounts, like the Individual Retirement Accounts for retirement, appear to be one answer. Under a bill I am sponsoring, families could invest up to \$750 per year in an education savings account established for each child, to a maximum of \$3,000 per year for each family. They would receive a tax deduction equal to the amount in savings. Contributions would be made each year of a child's life until the age of 21, or when the child enrolled at a qualified college or vocational school.

The accounts would not be taxed when used for tuition, fees and reasonable living expenses while the child attended a qualified college or vocational school. Banks would report the income annually just as they do with the IRA's.

It can be argued larger amounts are needed for college savings, but the chances for passage of the legislation are significantly better with the more modest limits. Unless Congress acts to provide incentives to save for college, the burden on the taxpayers will continue to grow as the government funds student loan and grant programs at higher levels.

Finally, in order to protect the student loan program from ripoffs by students declaring bankruptcy, I also am a sponsor of a bill to close the loophole in the bankruptcy code. It would apply stricter standards in filing for Chapter No. 13 in cases involving federal student loans.

Colleges all over the nation have reported thousands of cases of students making only partial payments on the loans and then filing for bankruptcy.

In one court-approved settlement, a dentist who grossed \$78,000 in his first year of practice after graduation filed for bankruptcy because of banky settlements. One small private college received a total of only \$34 in repayments from student loans out of \$25,545 owed by 26 students who filed for Chapter No. 13 bankruptcy.

Unless students honor their obligations to repay the loans after graduation, the program will lose the trust and financial support of the American taxpayers, and Congress must be forced to consider more drastic measures.

**State gets tougher on criminals**

The get-tough policy New Jersey has recently adopted concerning crime is starting to get results. The most recent State Police statistics show crime in the Garden State has dropped by 8%. And this is the second year in a row a decrease in the crime rate has been documented.

In Union County the overall crime rate was down by 8%. Essex County experienced an 11% drop in the crime rate.

Statewide violent crime was down 3% with forcible rape showing a decrease of 9%, the biggest decline ever reported in that category.

The New Administration's efforts to combat crime are producing results.

The death penalty was re-instated last year. Additionally, under state law a jury does not impose the death penalty for pre-meditated murder, the convicted killer faces a mandatory 30-year jail term with no parole.

A three-year mandatory prison term was enacted two years ago for any criminal who commits a crime with a gun.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation says New Jersey is doing better than the rest of the country when it comes to fighting crime. Nationwide, the overall crime rate was down only 7% compared to our 8%.

New Jersey is launching a new program to combat the alarming rise in juvenile crime over the past 10 years.

In September a new juvenile justice system will take effect. It will provide equitable punishment for juvenile offenders based on the severity of the offense. Those who commit violent crimes or are repeat offenders will be given counseling instead of detention.

A new family court will be established to handle juvenile cases.

Many times parents refuse to deal with youngsters who are having trouble with the law. The family court will have the authority to order parents to become involved in the rehabilitation of their children.

Under the new law it will be easier to try juveniles 14 years old or older who are charged with serious crimes such as murder or aggravated assault, as adults.

New Jersey has made tremendous strides in the fight against crime. We must remain vigilant in the future to make New Jersey a safer place to live.

FIRE-WISE Teach your children to save themselves

By Rahway Fire Chief James T. Heller

Fire in the house! It's the one time every member of the family may have to fend for himself...yet, often tragically, it's the time when the little ones may need us most.

Accordingly, when teaching very young children about fire, the goal is to teach them the behaviors that will help them save their own lives.

If your child wakes up and the bedroom is full of smoke what will he or she do? Most children naturally tend to hide from something that frightens them. Too many firemen vividly recall the tiny, asphyxiated body they only came upon while cleaning up, because the terrified child had hidden in a closet or under the bed and died of smoke inhalation.

Other firefighters will tell you that the children who survive are those who try to resist, the rescuers, more than the victims. Parents train their children against dangerous behaviors like these at an early age. Many children can absorb fire safety training in game form as early as the age of three.

Most easily taught are behaviors that can be presented as physical-movement games. "Stop, drop and roll," the defense against clothing fires, and "Stay low and go" for smoke escape are good examples. Both are easily absorbed by three-year-olds if parents will teach in frequent, short sessions in which the child actually performs the behavior.

A child who's been taught to "stay low and go" is far less likely to react in fear by hiding in the closet.

Of course, a child's fire training should be part of a home-escape plan for the whole family. That means each family member must know two ways out of his or her room.

Second-story bedroom windows should be equipped with ropes or ladders for climbing out, and every family member must practice with them. Children should sleep behind closed doors to delay the entry of smoke into sleeping rooms.

Around the fifth birthday most children can absorb training to test a door for heat and, if it's hot, to escape via the window.

Now, what about the child who runs from the firemen? One reason for this reaction is today's working firemen usually wear advanced breathing masks that hide their faces, while most cartoons and coloring books today use still depict firemen with visible faces. The child

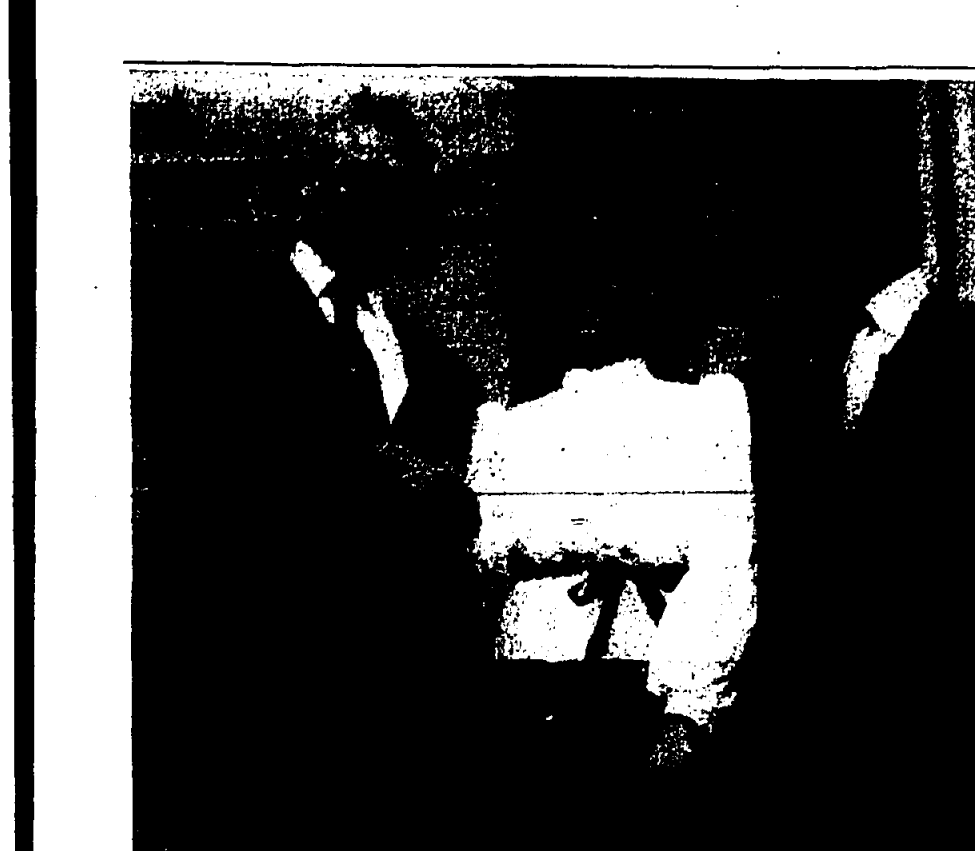

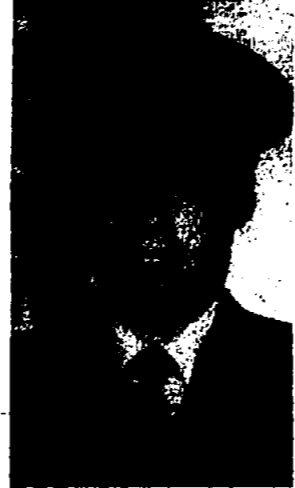
