In addition, eighth, ninth and tenth graders enrolled in the program, which is designed to prepare young minority people for college-level engineering studies.

The seventh-grade students participated in field trips to various sites including the Franklin Institute in Pennsylvania, the Public Service Electric and Gas Co. power generating plant in Linden, the Smithsonian Institute, the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island and the Environmental Education Center located at Dingman's Ferry.

The youngsters, who took advantage of the MIE summer program, which is

conducted year-long in the public school systems in Rahway and other areas, are among 430 students enrolled in the special program which was begun by Union County College in 1979.

The summer program serves as a motivating force for the continuation of studies afforded through the MIE project when the regular school year resumes in September.

The Minorities in Engineering Program is funded in part by local industries in the Union County area, including the Merck Company Foundation in Rahway.

Based on the principle people from minority groups will pursue careers in engineering if they are given the proper motivational and educational background at an early age, the MIE project ensures courses in mathematics, science and English taught to those enrolled in the program are taught with a stress on how students' learning can be put to use in engineering.

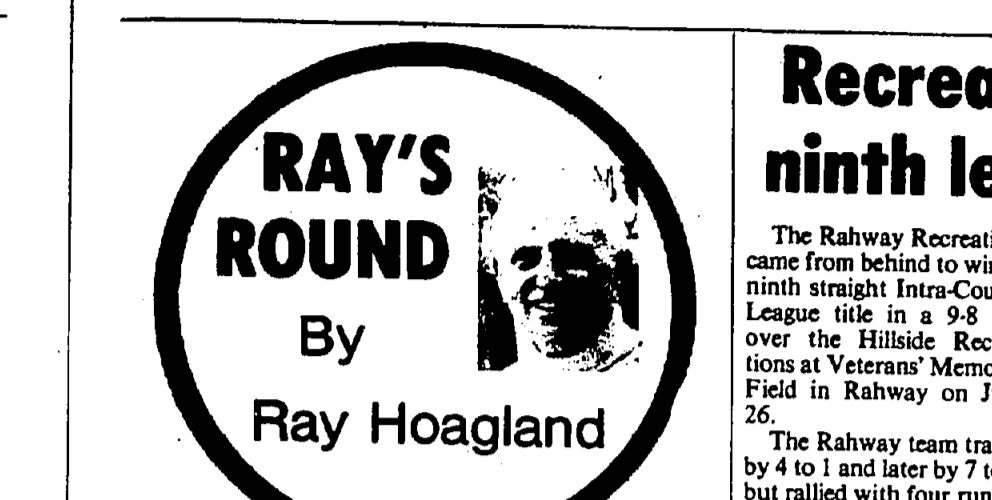

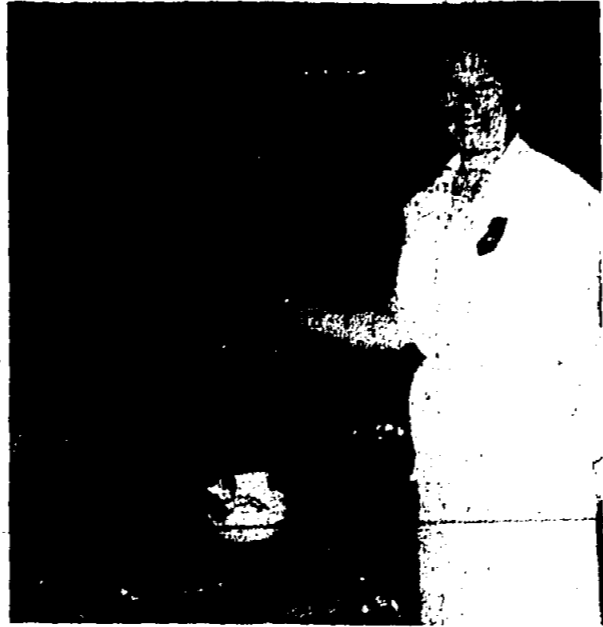
### Report offers aid in getting teachers

current and prospective teachers; re-training laid-off teachers in mathematics and science; offering better in-service and continuing professional development courses for current teachers, and giving tax incentives for industry for hiring teachers for summer work in high technology positions and for donating supplies and new equipment to schools.

The eight-member task force, which included the presidents of the New Jersey Science Teachers Assn. and the Assn. of Mathematics Teachers of New Jersey, was unanimously opposed to higher salaries for only mathematics and science teachers, since other teachers also leave the profession for better-paying private-sector jobs.

The task force also recommended against large-scale recruitment of retired persons from other professions. These persons would probably not have teacher certification and may not have the necessary temperament to be teachers, the committee said.

All 21 New Jersey counties have declared shortages in mathematics and science.

A recent survey by Dr. David Sousa, the president of the Science Supervisors Assn. showed 89% of districts responding to the survey had difficulty in recruiting new teachers, and those districts had lost 132 teachers of science in the last two years to private industry. Most went to better-paying jobs, as have many other teachers in a variety of subject areas.

Many students throughout the state are being taught by teachers with less-than-standard certification, since districts may hire persons with sub-standard cer-

tification when shortages exist, it was pointed out. The task force called special attention to its recommendation for a job bank, which "could help to alleviate the present problem of supply and demand throughout the state.
