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Bill would expand food aid program

In a strong expression of bipartisan support, the House of Representatives passed legislation that would expand and improve our existing network of surplus food distribution to provide emergency aid to victims of the

The Emergency Food Assistance and Commodity Distribution Act, H. R. 1590, won passage in the House by a 389-18 vote, and would establish a two-year program for the distribution of surplus agricultural commodities to emergency food centers such as the Red Cross and food banks. Ongoing school lunch, senior citizen and other food and nutrition programs would also benefit from this legislation.

It is estimated some five billion dollars worth of commodities are potentially available for donation, including diligence. 2.5 billion pounds of dairy products. While such excesses point out the need to continually evaluate our agricultural price support programs with an eye toward changes were warranted, the surplus food we currently store should be put to its best possible use for needy Americans. Under the provisions of H.R. 1590, the Dept. of

Agriculture is authorized to expand its present distribution program consisting primarily of dairy products such as butter and cheese, to include other commodities such as rice, wheat, cornmeal and soybeans for which there is a Union County College Johnson Regional High great demand.

The bill also contains stiff penalties to discourage individuals from stealing, embezzling or obtaining by fraud any agricultural commodities under this program. Poor economic conditions have placed a tremendous

burden on hard working Americans who currently find themselves without a substantial means of support. It is my hope the Senate will act favorably on this legislation to provide a mechanism for the Dept. of Agriculture to move food from storage onto the tables of those in need.
