Parking study: Improve Green Field; park at school, Jefferson, Trussler sites

The demands for parking created by those who use Green Field, the Union County parkland on Madison Ave., Rahway, should be diverted away from the eastern section of the field to a parking lot on the field's western border.

This is one of the prime recommendations of the study released Sept. 28 by the committee appointed by Rahway Mayor Daniel L. Martin to explore a solution to the parking situation in the area of the field, partly created by the expansion program at Rahway Hospital.

It goes on to say about the Green Field situation the large parking lot on the western side of the field is used to capacity only during school hours, and by properly draining and grading the center section of the field and laying out play areas and ballfields toward the center and eastern portions of the field parking would be diverted from the problem area to a lot that could accommodate it without problems.

The report also noted Rahway Hospital had offered to donate to Union County whatever fill it could from its expansion construction to help reduce the grading costs.

In a second recommendation, the parking study committee said use of hospital-owned property at Jefferson Ave. and Kaminski Dr. for parking should be approved and work should be done as attractively as possible.

Committee members also noted the hospital recently acquired additional properties on Jefferson Ave. that would enable those using the parking facility to have entrance and exit from Jefferson Ave., and thus not involve any side streets, such as Kaminski Dr.

A third conclusion reached by the committee was use of hospital-owned properties on Trussler Pl. for parking should be approved, with work being done as attractively as possible.

The committee recommended meetings with residents of the Kaminski Dr. and Trussler Pl. areas be conducted, either under the auspices of the city or hospital or both, in order to review and discuss both the general objectives and the specific intentions of the hospital.

Chosen Freeholders, that the county manager and engineering staff meet with representatives of the city, the Citizens Youth Recreation Committee, the Rahway Soccer Assn. and the Rahway Board of Education to develop a layout re-design of Green Field for recreational purposes in order to achieve the report's objectives.

Also contained in the report was an outline of the "serious parking and related traffic problem in the study area."

Within the past year, according to the report, the area suffered 61 reported motor vehicle accidents, and of the 13 involved personal injury.

The report continued, "A solution must be found that does the most good for the most people--does the most good for the entire community--and should be supported on that basis. The community should not be trapped into looking for a solution that pleases everyone because such a solution does not exist."

The hospital was commended in the report for being a definite asset to the community because it is the second largest employer in the city and 25% of its employees are Rahway residents.

The fact was also cited the hospital's presence has resulted in the city having many doctors and health professionals within or near its borders and the hospital has been a major selling point for real estate developers seeking to attract homeowners to the city.

The report added, however, "Were the hospital's present site to become totally glutted with buildings and blacktop, with no buffering or greenery, it is felt this positive influence would become a negative one. Consequently, it becomes almost mandatory that Rahway Hospital expand from its present site, rather than glut it, in order for the hospital to continue to be an overall positive factor in the community."

It was also suggested the hospital "do everything it can to continually improve its local public relations, public information and community involvement efforts."

Committee members continued, "Like the hospital, Green Field is a definite asset to the community. And just like the hospital Green Field is one of a kind in Rahway--there is no other recreational facility that gets the variety and volume of organized use as Green Field does. Additionally, its aesthetic value to the community is incalculable, and although the field receives little unorganized use the aesthetic value remains at all times."

They went on, "The committee believes for a relatively minor investment the overall value of Green Field to Rahway and to Union County could be significantly improved. Just as with the hospital site, glutting Green Field with blacktop would be adverse to community interests. Other solutions, with less impact on the community as a whole, must be found."

Additional parking must be provided in the area for the good of all Rahway citizens. It noted before setting forth the recommendations the committee had considered at length all known suggestions for a solution to the problem, including a parking garage, car pooling and shuttle buses to distant sites.

The report continued, "During the recent controversy about placing parking at Green Field a great deal of attention was focused on alleged safety hazards to children that might be created. Yet it seems that not enough attention has been focused on those same hazards that are present because nothing has been done to solve the problem that exists now. The present high accident rate, frequent complaints about 'near misses' and traffic safety difficulties caused even for emergency-service vehicles, such as ambulances going to the hospital, stand on their own as reasons to solve this problem, not even considering the many other problems associated with inadequate parking."

Koczur, the city engineer; Thomas Schimmel, the city superintendent of public works; John Yoder, the president of the hospital; Theodore Polhamus, the chief of police, and Louis Rizzo, Sr., a member of the Board of Education.

Area's top historian bids adieu

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is an excerpt from "The History of Clark, N. J." by Brian P. Toal. It was submitted to The Rahway News-Record and The Clark Patriot following the death on Friday, Sept. 23, of Edward S. Ayers of Clark.

To tell the story of Edward Ayers is to recount the life of one of Clark's most distinguished citizens. He was a patriot, historian, husband and businessman--a king of civic-minded people who have dedicated their lives to benefit others of their community. Mr. Ayers was one of those rare people who were born of illustrious parentage, and who stamps the family execution with yet another generation of achievement. An example of the forebear family heritage can be seen in his grandfather, John Roliford Ayers (1808-1886), who was the first elected senator from Union County in 1857.

The son of Ira Campbell Ayers (1845-1912) and Mrs. Amelia Decamp Ayers, Edward S. Ayers was born in Rahway, at 57 Hamilton St. on Jan. 19, 1893. He attended public schools for his education, one of which was the Franklin School of Rahway. He then attended the first Rahway High School and was a member of its graduation class of 1912. He then attended Rutgers University.

After a period of time, Mr. Ayers' father died which resulted in his removal from college. His older brothers, Ira C. Ayers, Jr. and John R. Ayers (1895-1977) were drafted into service for World War I. This only left one male to run the family business, which was the famous Marsh Saw Mills of Rahway. It was located on Elizabeth Ave. Edward

Ayers continued to run the mill until he was drafted for service, but a plea from his mother to prevent him from entering due to the fact he was the last male of the family delayed his induction. When he finally had to report for duty the war had ended.

In a short period of time Edward Ayers returned to his duties of running the mill which the family would later sell. After it was sold he received a job as a business advisor for the Quincey Co. of New York. A position he held until 1931.

Mr. Ayers' life style continued in his own fashion. Examples of this style of life are not historically recorded and are left to the tables of time. He basically said time was a pattern of unreality until the year 1931, when his dear brother, John, was stricken with pneumonia. It seems Mr. Ayers put in a plea to God for John's recovery--for if his brother recovered he would dedicate his life to aid his fellow man and the efforts of almighty God.

He then became affiliated with the Young Men's Christian Assn. Fellowship Club of Rahway where he devoted hours of service to its causes. This occurred about 1932.

On Feb. 10, 1934 Mr. Ayers married Helen Mintell (1903-1965). Once married, he and his wife moved to the newly-developing Clark. They purchased a home on Wendall Pl., No. 19. This occurred in 1938.

It is at this point the Ayers name becomes a trademark to the residents of Clark. After the initial settling in their new home, the Ayers quickly became active in the community affairs of the township.

In 1941, Mr. Ayers initiated a committee to stop the federal government from building a housing

project to house shipyard workers in Clark. It was he who called for making the project into a separate township and calling it Winfield Park.

Mr. Ayers then pushed for the Legislature to change the form of government in Clark from the committee type to the commission type. He also established the slate of candidates of the new commission government.

In the latter part of 1945 Mr. Ayers established another committee to see the new state highway No. 4, now known as The Garden State Parkway, which was to run through the township, in order to benefit the township's residents.

It seems the highway commission wanted to run the highway down Madison Hill Rd. near the Rahway border and through the two cemeteries on the Madison Hill Rd. curve. But Mr. Ayers established enough support to have the Commission alter its plan to its present sight. In the late 1940's he continued his civic-minded efforts by creating Clark's first Boy Scout Troop, No. 44.

On Jan. 1, 1961 Mr. Ayers retired after 30 years of service to the Remington Rand Co., where he had

been a sales representative of Methods Engineer and Office Manager. He began his retirement in order to put all his efforts into the creation of the first Public Library of Clark.

Mr. Ayers was the creator and the founder of Clark's first Library. He developed the committee of the Friends of the Library and went on to become the library's president of the Board of Trustees, and served as president for 12 years. He was a member of that board for over 20 years.

After establishing the library, he became chairman of Clark's Centennial Celebration. He organized all of the celebrations and major events that marked Clark's 100th birthday in 1964.

Also in that same year, Mr. Ayers became a noted historian of the township. This occurred when he published "The Historical Review of the Township of Clark, New Jersey." Even though it may seem outdated now, it was the first documented reference text on Clark ever published.

The efforts of Ed Ayers were not limited by his past actions. In 1965, after his wife, Helen, died of cancer, he said he must do something as a memorial to his late wife. He went on to establish the Clark Senior Citizens Club in 1969 and the Clark Historical Society in 1969.

In 1966, the township honored Mr. Ayers by naming a street after him since he had no direct descendants. The street is named Ayers La. It is located off Raritan Rd., near Armstrong Dr.

In 1973, Mr. Ayers discovered the 593 Madison Hill Rd. House. It would later become the Dr. William Robinson plantation and home of the Clark Historical Society. In 1976,

Mr. Ayers became the co-chairman of the Clark Bicentennial Committee.

Due to Mr. Ayers' many years of service and dedication to the citizens of Clark, he would receive countless awards and elements of recognition. Some examples of these prestigious awards can be traced to 1973, when at age 80, he received a Papal Blessing from Pope Paul VI. Also that year, he was named citizen of the year by the State of New Jersey Library Assn. and also by the Department of New Jersey Veterans of Foreign Wars at their annual convention. There is a long list of awards, each well deserved.

In Mr. Ayers' final years he continued his community involvement when he became campaign manager for Republican Fourth Ward Township Council candidate, Joseph E. Alachi, in 1980.

On Feb. 6, 1983, the Clark Kiwanis honored Mr. Ayers with a testimonial 90th birthday luncheon where his many years of service to the township were honored. All proceeds from the luncheon were given to the Clark Public Library in

Electric firm bonds bid over 12.5%

Public Service Electric and Gas Co. on Aug. 9 sold through competitive bidding \$100 million of first and refunding mortgage bonds and \$30 million of \$100 par cumulative preferred stock.

The company's board of directors accepted a bid of 99.429% of principal amount at a 12.5 and five eighths percent interest rate for \$100 million of 10-year first and refunding mortgage bonds.

The new preferred stock will be entitled to a sinking fund sufficient to retire annually, commencing in 1988, a minimum of 15,000 shares and a maximum of 30,000 shares at \$100 per share plus accumulated dividends.

Proceeds from the sale of the new bonds and the new preferred stock will be used for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of its current construction program.

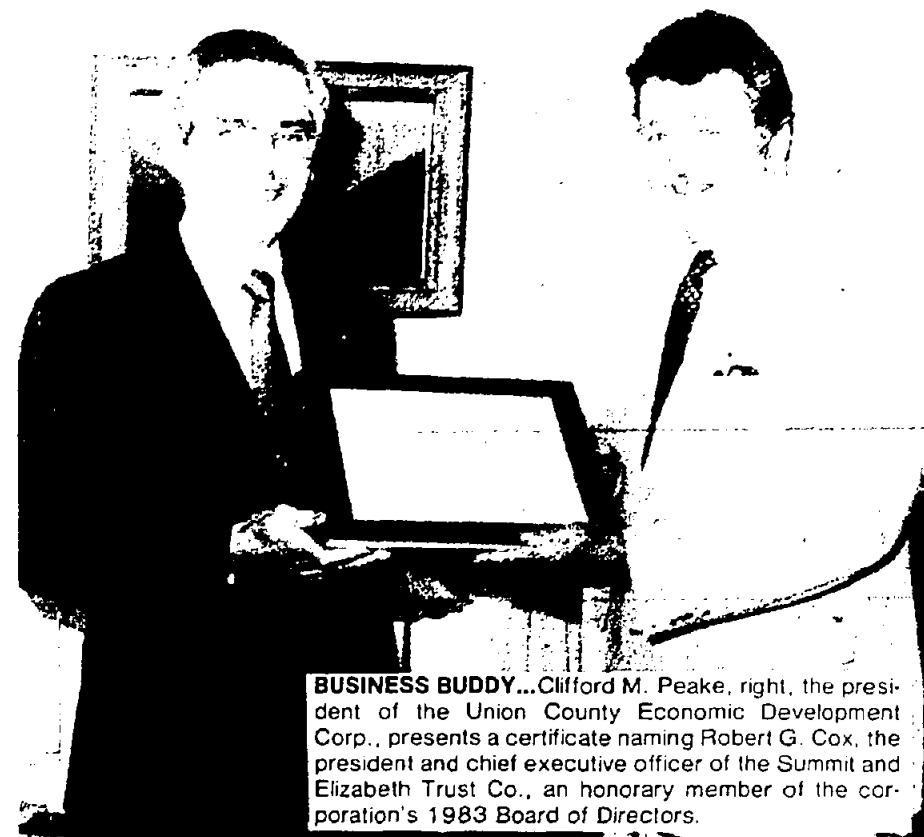

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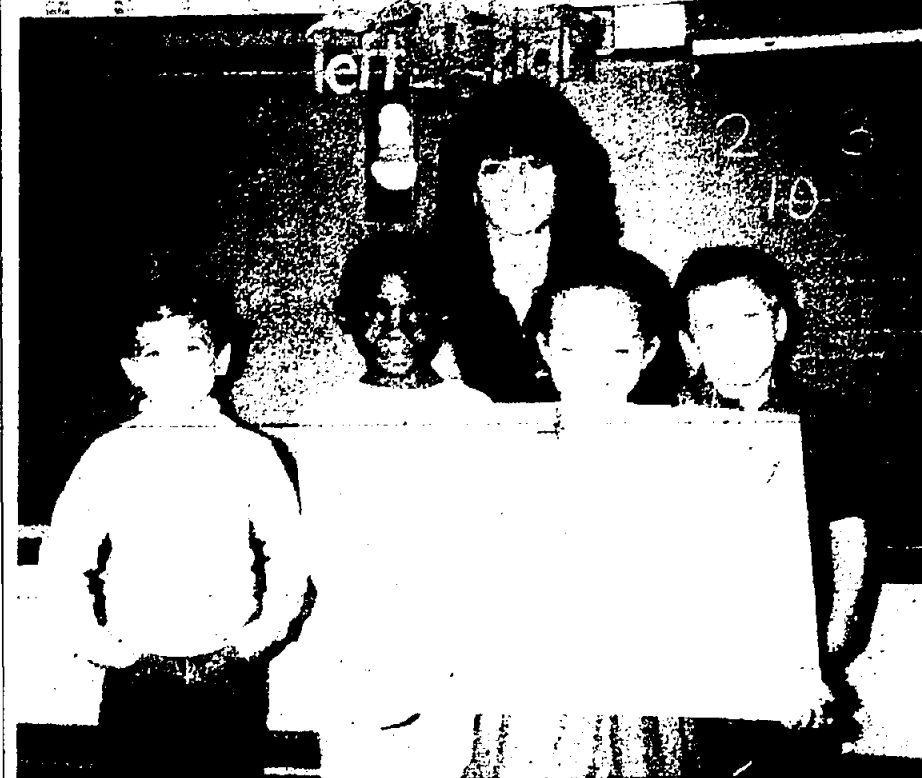
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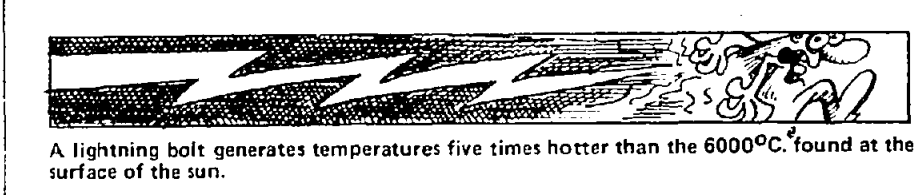

Miss Rajoppi: Let voters have facts

The Democratic candidate for Union County register, Joanne Rajoppi, today said she was "extremely disappointed by her opponent's recent campaign literature because the piece in question is a tissue of distortions."

"For example," the former Union County freholder director declared, "he stated 'the budget for the Register's Office is less in 1983 than it was in 1978.' This statement is simply not true."

The official Union County audits clearly show the register's total spending for 1978 was \$263,384.17; for 1979, \$273,791.75; for 1980, \$280,175.44; for 1981, \$283,571.24; and in 1982 he spent \$295,005.36. This year (1983) the register's budget calls for spending \$332,000, which is \$68,615.83 higher than in 1978, Miss Rajoppi added.

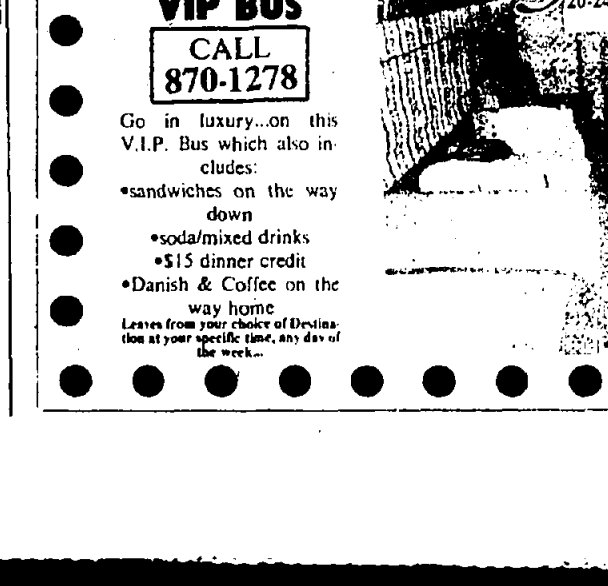

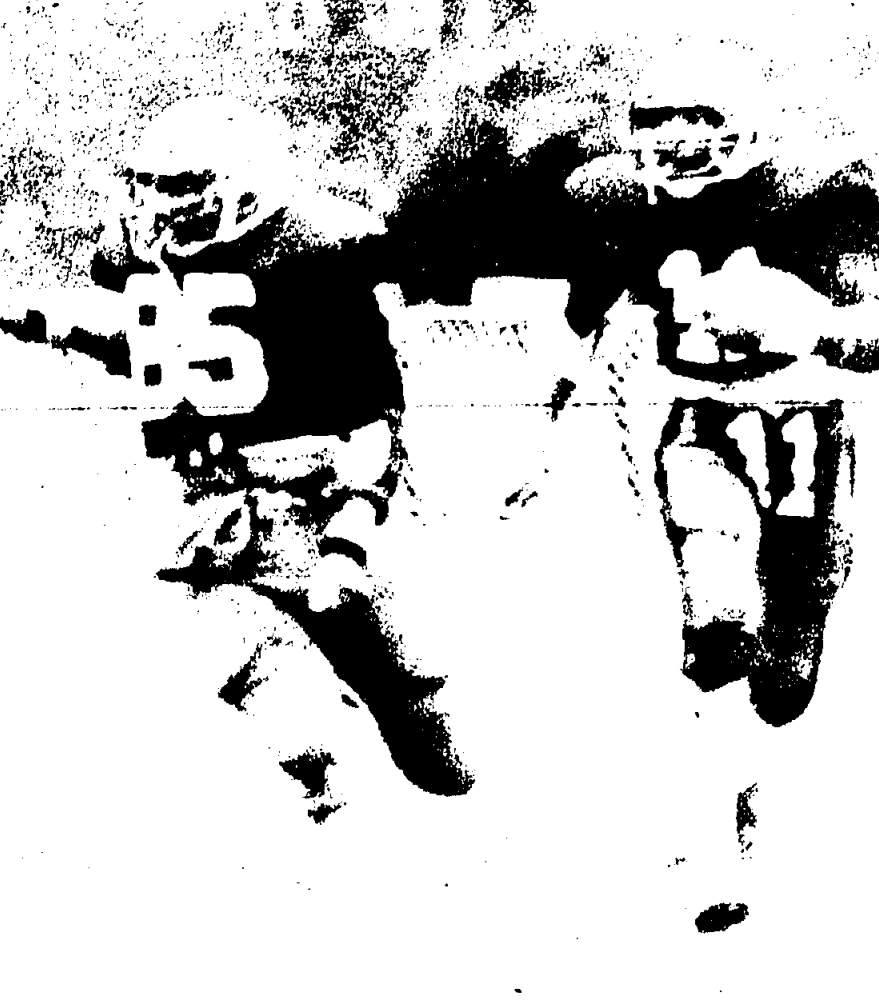

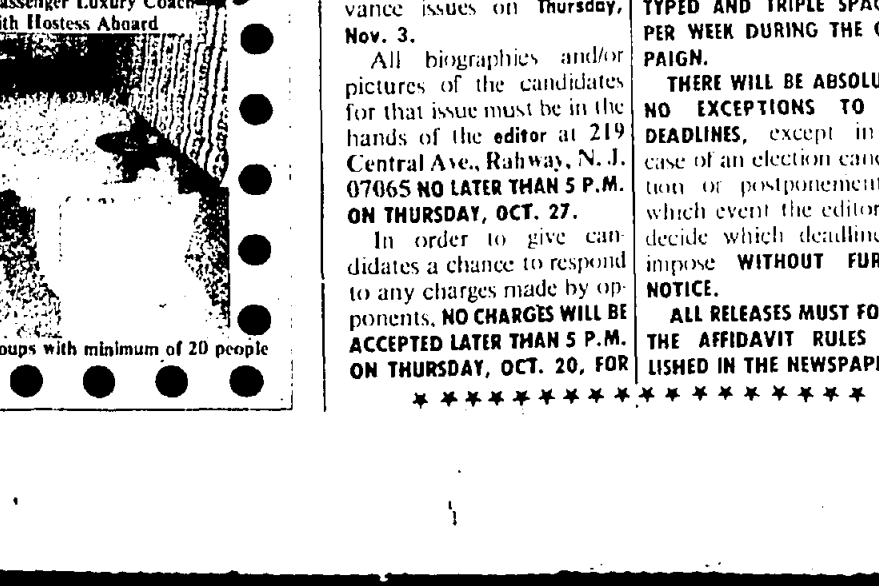

The company wants to pass along some of this newly-acquired knowledge to the public, according to Gerard Dalton, the general manager of directory services for New Jersey Bell.

where the person or business you want to telephone is located. This information gives the operator a clue that helps him or her find the desired number among the millions registered in the computer system. Once the location is keyed into a computer system, the operator can accept from clients additional information, such as a name and address, that will narrow the search.

Secondly, know the correct spelling of the party you want to reach. Try to recall if it's Johnson or Johnston while you have an operator on the line. Only type it both of you. Finally, if you call 411 frequently for a particular number, write that living down in your local telephone directory or on a piece of paper and place it near your telephone. That way you will have it at your fingertips.

Don't put brakes on your life

"Brakes that grind or squeak may be warning you of impending brake failure," reports Matthew J. Derham, the president of the New Jersey Automobile Club.

Mr. Derham suggests you have your brakes serviced now if you have noticed any of the following signs of brake malfunction:

- Squeaks-caused by friction from the brake linings. Under extreme conditions, the resulting heat can damage the pads, linings, brake drums and rotors.
- Grinding sounds-caused by metal-to-metal contact, indicating your brake pads have worn through.

This may result in damage to drums or rotors.

- A low or fading brake pedal-may be caused by a leak in the brake system, air in the brake lines or the need for an adjustment.
- Pulling to one side-indicating a damaged brake line, or worn or uneven brake linings.
- Brake drag-caused by contaminated brake fluid or poor adjustment.
- Taking short cuts on brake work is unwise," concluded Mr. Derham. "If your brakes need work, invest in the best service you can get-and get them fixed."

Pvt. Johnson completes basic

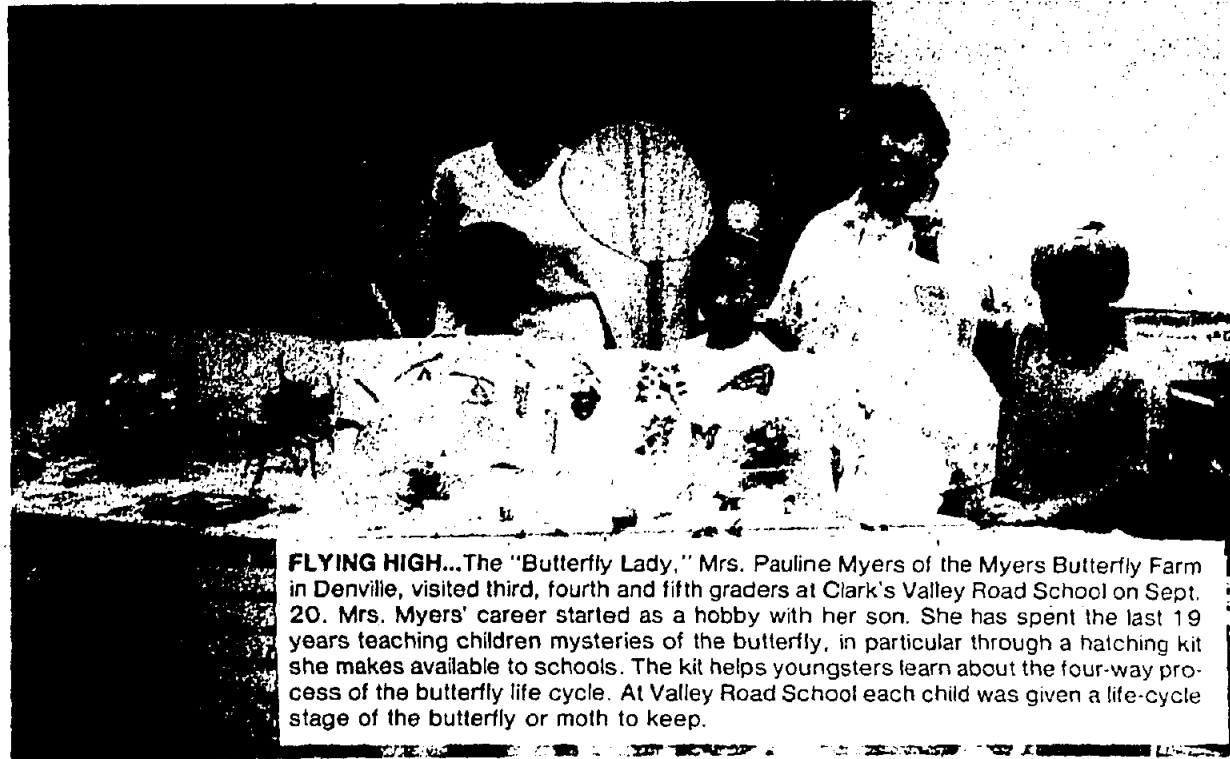
