The fact was also cited the hospital's presence has resulted in the city having many doctors and health professionals within or near its borders and the hospital has been a major selling point for real estate developers seeking to attract homeowners to the city.

The report added, however, "Were the hospital's present site to become totally glutted with buildings and blacktop, with no buffering or greenery, it is felt this positive influence would become a negative Consequently, it becomes almost mandatory that Rahway Hospital expand from its present site, rather than glut it, in order for the hospital to continue to be an overall positive fac-

tor in the community." It was also suggested the hospital "do everyting it can to continually improve its local public relations, public information and communi-

Ayers (1845-1912) and Mrs. Amiela Decamp Avers, Edward S. Ayers was born in Rahway, at 57 Hamilton St. on Jan, 19, 1893. He attended public schools for his education, one of which was the Franklin School of Rahway. He then attended the first Rahway High School and was a member of its graduation class of Rutgers University.

Mr. Ayers' life style continued in his own fashion. Examples of this style of life are not historically recorded time. He basically said time was a pattern of unreality until the year 1931, when his dear brother, John, was stricken with pneumonia. It seems Mr. Ayers put in a plea to God for John's recovery -- for if his brother recovered he would dedicate his life to aid his fellow man and the efforts of

Assigning points for moving violations committed by moped drivers will crack down on careless driving habits practiced by some moped drivers. Mopeds are very low to the ground and are difficult for automobile drivers to see. If a moped driver ignores stop signs and cuts in and out of traffic, accidents can be the result. In the eyes of the law, a moved is considered to be bound by the same rules of the road governing all other motor vehicles.

More than 4,000 people have been injured in moped accidents over the past four years and in 1982 10 people lost their lives. Tougher moped regulations should have a significant mpact on these statistics.

tinue to undermind American society. We are paying a heavy price for drug use in terms of lost production, broken families, crime, violence and welfare costs. On top of this burden, tens of billions of dollars in profits from the illegal drug trade are being used to corrupt police and government officials in this country and abroad, according to many well-informed authorities. The experience of the past few decades shows arresting small-time drug pushers and users does not solve the problem but merely shifts it to other areas.

In order to slow down the drug epidemic the United States must use its diplomatic influence to convince Columbia, Peru, Mexico, Pakistan and Turkey to clamp down on drug traffickers and the cultivation of illegal crops. Otherwise we should begin to cut off assistance to those countries until they get the message and begin to co-

• 5. Importance of fire extinguishers in the home. • 6. Fire-wise cooking, from keeping full sleeves away from burners to the right way to put out a pan grease fire-by covering with a pan lid-never with water.

• 7. The danger of overloading electric circuits and using too many extension cords. If a few of these items resemble the items for children---especially the ones about smoke detectors and home excape-there's a reason. These are things people of all ages in this country can stand to know more about.


