







Job partnerships put many on job

October marks the official start of the Job Training Partnership Act in each of the 50 states including New Jersey, which is expected to receive more than \$80 million in funding for a variety of employment and training programs in our state. The Job Training Partnership Act, passed by both nouses of Congress and signed into law last October, is designed to provide job training and related assistance to economically-disadvantaged individuals, dislocated

workers and others who face significant employment bar-The ultimate goal of the act is to move trainees into permanent, self-sustaining employment. A program of enhanced and long-term job training services in this period of record-high unemployment is generally recognized as one of the most critical elements in our efforts to meet the employment challenges of the 1980's As a member of the House appropriations subcomnittee responsible for funding these vital job training pro-

grams. I have been working to ensure they are funded at a

level which will provide meaningful employment opporfunities to the many Americans who need them. A major element in the new act is implied by its title: The act places great emphasis on private/public partnerships in providing job training. To facilitate such partnerships, the law establishes Private Industry Conneils to plan job-training and employment-service programs among the 596 Service Delivery Areas which have been established throughout the nation. These councils are intended to serve as key mechanisms for bringing representatives from various segments of the private sector into the active management of the job training programs.

In addition to business and industry representatives these Private Industry Councils will be comprised of representatives of educational agencies, organized labor, rehabilitation agencies and other community-based organizations and economic-development agencies. Another important title under the new job training law is the dislocated-worker program, which will provide training andther assistance to workers who have been or expect to be faid off due to the permanent closing of a plant or industry. This title is also aimed toward the longterm unemployed who have little prospect for re-The law also includes a summer youth employment

and training program which is expected to provide 718,000 summer jobs for youth nationwide in 1984 The need for an effective job training program has never been more clear. Another danger was a burning leaf pile seldom showed visible flames...it just smoked. To a careless youngster approaching from upwind, it could be hard to distinguish a burning leaf pile from a pile suitable for jumping and playing in...with occasionally tragic results. So leaf burning is largely a thing of the past in America today. While a bit of Americana had faded away, a source of risk has been eliminated thereby...not a bad tradeoff. So please, don't burn leaves this autumn. Don't be ashamed to discourage your neighbors who do. A final safety note. As more municipalities require homeowners to rake leaves into large piles at the curbside. extra care is required to discourage children from playing in those leaf piles. Now and again a motorist forced to hug the curb will plow into a leaf pile which has spilled into the street. That's no place for your child to be hiding!

Job partnerships put many on job

October marks the official start of the Job Training Partnership Act in each of the 50 states including New-Jersey, which is expected to receive more than \$80 million in funding for a variety of employment and trainig programs in our stat

The Job Training Partnership Act, passed by both houses of Congress and signed into law last October, is designed to provide job training and related assistance to economically-disadvantaged individuals, dislocated workers and others who face significant employment bar The ultimate goal of the act is to move trainees into

permanent, self-sustaining employment. A program of enhanced and long-term job-training services in this period of record-high unemployment is generally recognized as one of the most critical elements in our efforts to meet the employment challenges of the 1980's As a member of the House appropriations subcommittee responsible for funding these vital job training pro-

grams. I have been working to ensure they are funded at a

level which will provide meaningful employment opportunities to the many Americans who need them. A major element in the new act is implied by its title: The act places great emphasis on private/public partnerships in providing job training, To facilitate such partnerships, the law establishes Private Industry Councils to plan job-training and employment-service programs among the 596 Service Delivery Areas which have been established throughout the nation. These councils are intended to serve as key mechanisms for bringing representatives from various

segments of the private sector into the active managenent of the job-training programs. In addition to business and industry representatives these Private Industry Councils will be comprised of representatives of educational agencies, organized labor, rehabilitation agencies and other community-based organizations and economic-development agencies. Another important title under the new job training law is the disfocated worker program, which will provide training andther assistance to workers who have been or expect to be laid off due to the permanent closing of a plant or industry. This title is also aimed toward the longterm unemployed who have little prospect for re-

The law also includes a summer youth employment ind training program which is expected to provid 718,000 summer jobs for youth nationwide in 1984

FIRE-WISE One tradition that's no real loss

By Rahway Fire Chief James T. Heller If you're old enough to drive, you're old enough to recall a delightful odor in the autumn air...a scent that just proves things aren't always what they seem. For as much as the smell of burning leaves brought pleasure to those of us who knew it, leaf burning was, in any number

of ways, really bad news. Today it's illegal to burn leaves in most localities Here's why a once-cherished autumn tradition had to goand how you can help your fellow man by obeying and helping to enforce leaf-burning laws. For starters, leaf burning is a very inefficient form of

combustion. The wetnes and poor ventilation of a typical leaf pile make for a lack-luster, smoky fire that puts forth a huge variety of partially-burned byproducts. In other words, outdoor leaf burning polluted the air something fierce. So the first consideration in outlawing the practice was ecological A second ecological consideration was leaves make

excellent fertilizer and it's a shame to see them go up in smoke. Fire educators spent years badgering the public to confine their leaf burning to covered metal baskets to reduce the risk of this type of fire...but open pile burning went on.

> Another danger was a burning leaf pile seldom showed visible flames...it just smoked. To a careless youngster approaching from upwind, it could be hard to distinguish a burning leaf pile from a pile suitable for jumping and playing in...with occasionally tragic results. So leaf burning is largely a thing of the past in America today. While a bit of Americana had faded away, a source of risk has been eliminated thereby...not a

bad tradeoff. So please, don't burn leaves this autumn. Don't be ashamed to discourage your neighbors who do. A final safety note. As more municipalities require homeowners to rake leaves into large piles at the curbside, extra care is required to discourage children from playing in those leaf piles. Now and again a motorist forced to hug the curb will plow into a leaf pile which has spilled into the street. That's no place for your child to be hiding!



Once a bus driver for a company that formerly picked up and dropped off Dayton students, the transportation director came to her post in the regional district five years ago.

"I took the job because I really enjoy doing something for the students," she said. "It's important to me their whole school experience is positive--starting with their ride in the morning.

A licensed school bus driver and state-certified transportation supervisor, she shares the same satisfactions and frustrations as the New Jersey Transit System dispatchers.

"I want the buses to run on time and safely," she said. "But on the rare occasion something goes wrong, I like to talk to the parents and students direct-

Discipline problems are usually referred to the assistant principal from the student's school. But occasionally Mrs. Glowacki interacts with the students.

She strives for constant communication with her drivers, too, holding breakfast meetings with them once a month after the students have been dropped off at school.
