A part of the realization of the dream of three comrades in search of greater recognition for America's most distinguished military heroes came to fruition on Nov. 7 when the Union County Congressional Medal of Honor Library was dedicated.

According to Paul Angelo of Rahway, the supervisor of veterans affairs for Union County, the library is part of a continuing effort by himself and his two "partners," Raymond L. Collins of Alexandria, Va., a trustee for the Medal of Honor Historical Society, and Sister Maria Veronica, the supervisor of the United States Medal of Honor Archives maintained by the Freedoms Foundation in Valley Forge, Pa.

Mr. Angelo told The Rahway News-Record and The Clark Patriot, the federal government's effort to begin and maintain a listing of Medal of Honor recipients began with President Harry Truman's directive to do so and was heightened when President Gerald Ford in 1976 issued an edict to have the graves of Medal of Honor winners designated with special markers.

However, according to the supervisor of veterans' affairs, the government does not maintain a list of the birthplaces or burial sites of the medal winners.

A major part of this effort comes from Mr. Angelo, whose main sources of information are Mr. Collins and Sister Veronica, along with the facts he gathers from searching cemetery records and speaking with

relatives, friends and acquaintances of medal winners.

He added the discovery of one grave and the pursuit of the history of one medal winner will often help him get on the trail of another American hero honored for gallantry "above and beyond the call of duty," but forgotten for a time because records have been misplaced or family members have died.

For the Nov. 7 ceremony George J. Albanese, the New Jersey commissioner of human services and the former Union County manager, returned to the Union County Court House in Elizabeth to dedicate the project he initiated in 1978—the county library listing the histories and burial places of Medal of Honor recipients born or interred in the Union County area.

Current available information in the library, which is housed in Mr. Angelo's office in the county administration building across from the court house, now includes the entire state.

The mission of locating some 400 recipients dating back to the Civil War has been spearheaded by Mr. Angelo, who calls the effort a pursuit he has enjoyed, "since my boyhood."

"The Medal of Honor is the highest decoration the United States can bestow on a soldier," he explained. "It was originated by President Abraham Lincoln and even generals must salute a Medal of Honor recipient."

As recently as two weeks ago Mr. Angelo tracked down a former slave who was given his country's highest honor.

A sergeant with Company B of the 39th United States Colored Troops from Maryland in the Civil War, Decatur Dorsey, was honored for planting the Union flag on Confederate land in advance of his regiment. When his regiment was driven back behind Union lines he carried the colors there and rallied the men.

Sgt. Dorsey's bravery, along with the valorous deeds of hundreds of other servicemen are now catalogued in Union County and are available to anyone researching these and other related topics. The permanent library is now open from Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"It's a kind of lost-and-found operation," the supervisor explains. "I get my first thread of information by searching through records or by word of mouth. Then I spend a lot of time in libraries and cemeteries trying to trace these brave men."

He said the ideal situation occurs when the discovery of one recipient leads to others and he thanks the area's news media for helping him reach the public.

Last month news stories, including one in The Rahway News-Record, on Gunner Sgt. Fred William Stockham of Irvington, led to nine other "finds."

Among those attending the Nov. 7 ceremony was Nicholas Oreshko, a World War II Army veteran who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor after single-handedly wiping out two German machine gun installations and killing 12 Germans.

Also present were Union County Manager Arthur J. Grisi, Walter Ulrich of Rahway, the deputy New Jersey Commissioner of Human Services, and Frank H. Lehr, the chairman of the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders.

The opening remarks were given by Edward Demarest, the chairman of the county's flag guardian committee, which consists of nine Union County veterans who specialize in educating school children and the public about the history and proper care of the American flag.

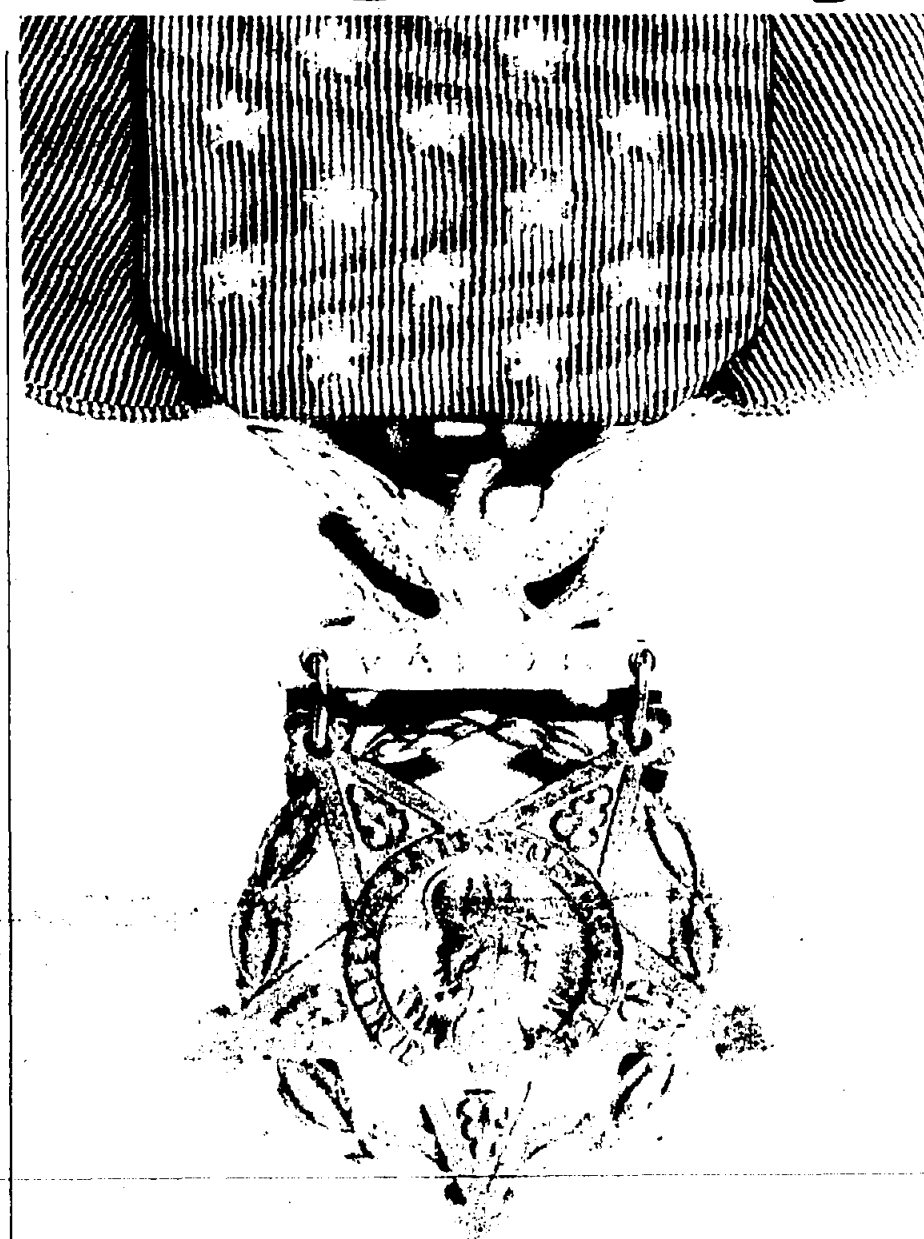
Union County flag officer, Jerome DeParlier, led the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by an invocation by Rabbi Yale Fishman of the Elmore Hebrew Center, a welcome by Mr. Grisi and remarks by Mr. Lehr.

Mr. Albanese conducted the dedication and following remarks by Mr. Ulrich, Edward Durning, a member of the Flag Guardian Committee, introduced the officials present.

The Medal of Honor Citation was read by Lee R. Chapin, another member of the Flag Guardian Committee.

After remarks by Mr. Oreshko, in which he described his own efforts which gained him the medal, and a description of the quest for the graves of medal winners by Mr. Angelo, the program closed with a benediction by Dr. Theodore Granberg, the pastor of the Elmore Presbyterian Church.

# Regional body elects Vaughn, Mrs. Muskus

The vice president of the Union County Regional Board of Education, which governs Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark, Joseph Vaughn of Berkeley Heights, was elected to become the new president.

Mrs. Vaughn succeeds Stephen Maricani of Clark, who resigned the position's post two weeks ago citing the heavy workload.

The new president has been on the regional Board since 1971. He was previously chairman of the communications committee and recently serves on the safety, personnel and safety committees.

He is employed as a news anchor for WABC in New York City.

Clown as the school was Mrs. Virginia Muskus of Clark.

She has been a member of the regional Board for almost 10 years. She has also served as the president of the Johnson Parent-Teacher Assn. and as a member of the Band Parents Assn.

Mrs. Muskus previously served as the vice president of the education body and

as the committee chairman for safety and health and student activities and policies. She also served as a Board member on the district-wide Committee on Computer Instruction.

Board members also announced three major curriculum changes at the township school for the 1983-1984 school year. They include a new course, "Introduction to Business Computer Language," a third year of computer science and the combination of four English electives in a course called "English in the Modern World."

The coordinator for testing in the district, Dr. Frank Koenig, reported three ninth and 10th graders for whom retesting in mathematics and reading in the Basic Skills Tests became necessary this year scored high on the tests this year around.

Dr. Koenig also said in TASK and OHS-Common Mental Ability tests, which in September 1982, of all district students scored at or above the national average in reading, 91% were at or above the national average in English Skills and 92% were at or above the average in mathematics.

In other action, the Board:

- Approved the application to the state department of education for a grant of \$1,157.85 in the Transition Program for Refugee Children with funds to be used to provide additional English language opportunities for English-as-a-Second Language students through the purchase of textbooks, audio-visual materials and teaching supplies.
- Authorized the submission of a revised application for funds for the district's Basic Skills Improvement Program due to the fact the federal funding program has been increased by \$344 to \$89,604.
- Okayed an additional section of computer workshops for staff members and the payment of James Dougherty, Richard Fleischer, Arthur Krupp and David VanHart as instructors.
- Gave its permission for the development of an English workshop in which five English teachers would be teaching in instructional units.
- Approved the participation of Robert Kowalski, the girls varsity track coach at Johnson, in the Second Annual United States All-

Star Track and Field Clinic in Atlantic City on Thursday and Friday, Dec. 8 and 9.

- Authorized the township of Mrs. Barbara Halloran in the district as a clerk in the guidance office at the township school at a salary of \$10,378, effective on Nov. 16 of this year.
- Gave its permission for the payment of the adjusted salary rate of \$75 per day, effective on Nov. 4 of this year, to Dennis Martin for completing 10 consecutive days as a substitute teacher for Ronald Foster in the industrial arts department at Johnson.
- Approved an increase in the 1983-1984 salary of Ben Quattabium, a member of the special services department at the township school, from \$33,600 to \$33,800, effective on Thursday, Dec. 1, of this year for completion of 25 years of service in the district.
- Agreed to the payment of the following amounts for unused vacation days to employees who have left the district: Peter Matanga, custodian, \$1,152.32; Arlene Haria, clerk, \$126.60; estate of Edwin Layne, custodian, \$189.45; and Joseph Sant, the mathematics coordinator, \$4,905.88.

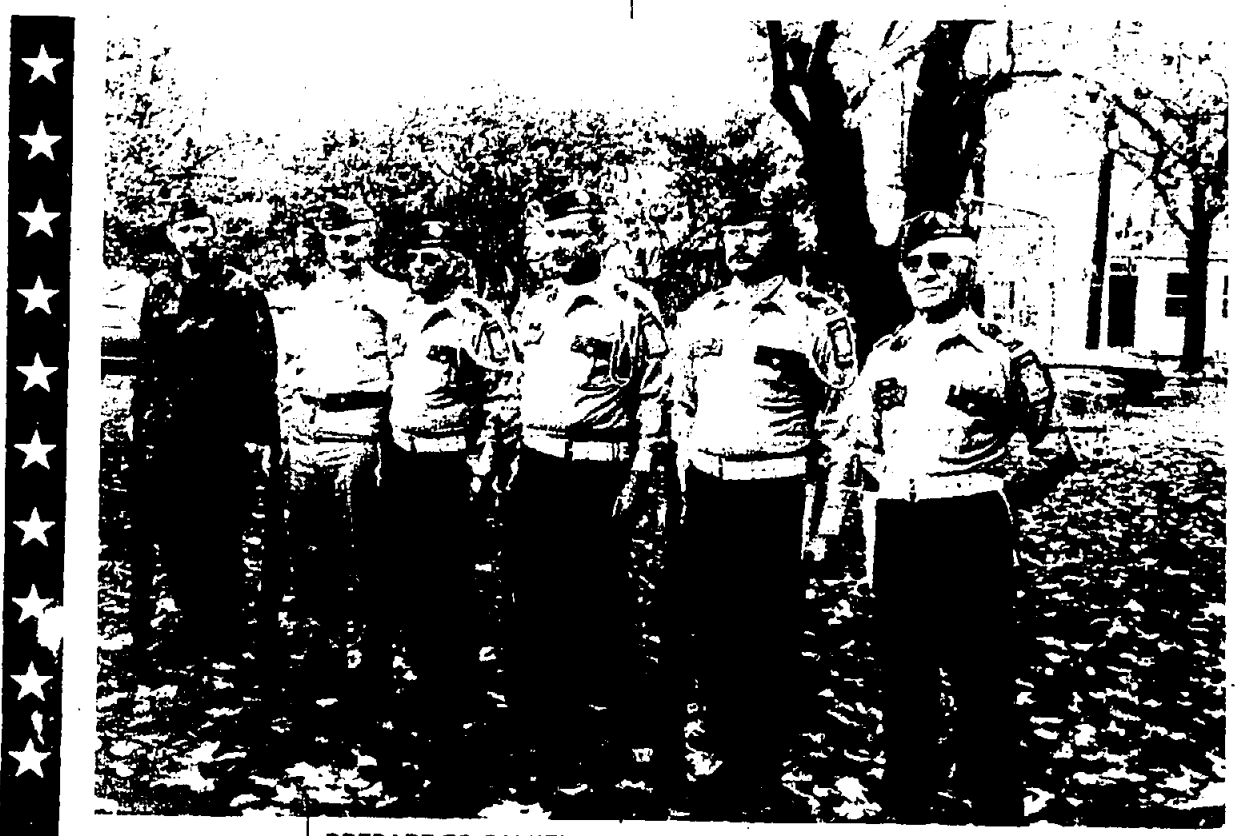

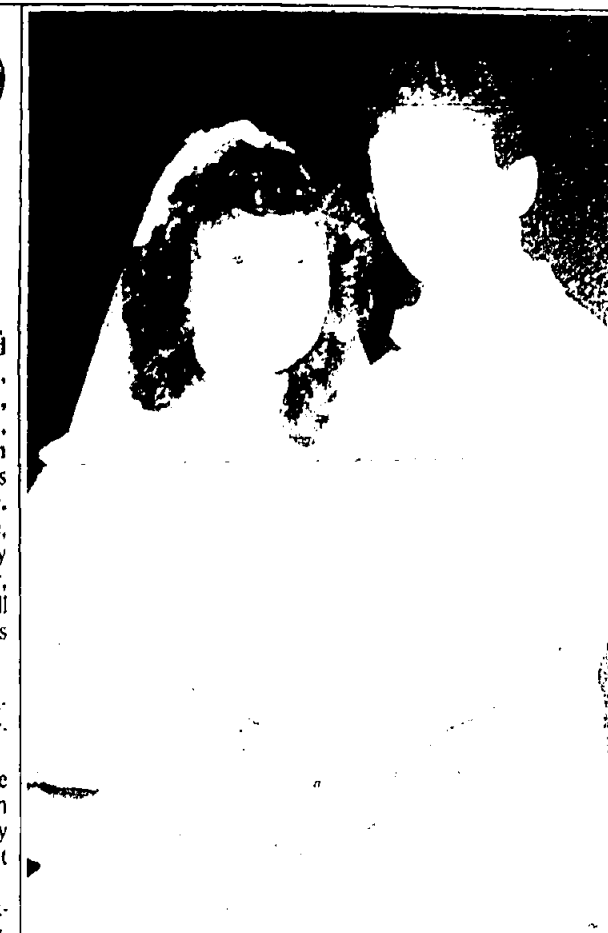

## Committee seeks collage president

An eight-member Presidential Search Committee has been appointed to seek candidates to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Union County College president, Saul Orkin, who died on Oct. 7. It was announced today by Sidney F. Lesser, the chairman of the college's Board of Trustees.

Joseph Kopf, the vice chairman of the board, was named by Mr. Lesser as chair of the Presidential Search Committee.

Severely with Mr. Kopf will be Vice President, the president of the college's Student Government Association, Dr. Donald Ball, a professor of English and chairman of the college's faculty, Frank A. Boland, a member of the board, Thomas J. Gallaghy, the chairman of the college's Board of Governors.

A new chief executive officer of the college will be appointed by the Board of Trustees with the advice and consent of the Board of Governors.

Dr. Orkin, who served as the president of the college since its founding in 1982 and as the chief executive officer of its predecessor institution, Union College, since 1974, died unexpectedly on Oct. 7.

## Celanese gives college \$1,000

Union County College received a gift of \$1,000 from the Celanese Research Co. in Summit for its Minorities in Engineering Program, which was announced today by Dr. Leonard T. Kroenig of Westfield, the acting college president.

The program, now in its fifth year, is aimed at preparing young students in the junior high school grades for college-level engineering studies. The Union County College program, which works in conjunction with local schools, is funded in part by local industries in the Union County area. At present, the special program has an enrollment of over 400 young people.

## Pentagon's bidding must be controlled

Given the importance of national security and the size of the Defense Dept. budget it is not surprising Congress and the American people are engaged in an extensive debate over how much is enough to protect America's vital interests and to prevent a nuclear war.

One of the major arguments is far too much of America's resources are devoted to defense as opposed to social needs. During the entire decade of the 1970's, defense spending declined 19% in real terms compared with an increase in social and economic spending of 122%.

Under President John F. Kennedy defense spending consumed 44% of the budget, while social programs had a 25% share. Today the situation is reversed. Defense spending is down to 28% of the budget and social programs account for 44% of the budget.

But Americans have to find a way to demand every dollar spent before knowing if they will work properly. Defense spending is down to 28% of the budget and social programs account for 44% of the budget.

The General Accounting Office, the Congressional watchdog agency, reported the Pentagon buys many new weapons before knowing if they will work properly. Defense spending is down to 28% of the budget and social programs account for 44% of the budget.

What is needed is a health-care delivery system which performs organ transplantation on a systematic, equitable and routine basis.

Under the provisions of H.R. 4080, funds would be authorized to assist communities in developing and strengthening local organ-procurement agencies. These local agencies would be linked together by a 24-hour computer matching system and national patients registry.

This United States Transplantation Network (USTN) is one of the most important aspects of this legislation. It is intended to maintain a national registry of individuals who need organs and operate a 24-hour national computer and telephone system to facilitate the matching of donated organs with potential recipients.

The bill would also establish a National Center for Organ Transplantation within the Dept. of Health and Human Services. In addition to administering the development grants to local organ-procurement organizations, this agency would help to promote public awareness of the need to donate organs.

The National Organ Transplant Act also addresses the problem of reimbursement for organ transplants. Many transplant procedures are considered "experimental" by the U. S. Health Care Financing Administration and therefore not covered under Medicare. This policy has directly inhibited the coverage of these procedures by health care.

H.R. 4080 would help insure equitable and timely access to lifesaving transplants by calling for an annual study by the Dept. of Health and Human Services on the scientific and clinical status of organ transplantation. This information would, in turn, be provided to other major health benefit providers so coverage decisions can be based on the most recent findings.

This legislation has already been marked up by the House Subcommittee on Health and the Environment and I am hopeful it will be reported to the full House for consideration in the near future. The miraculous improvement in organ transplantation demands a national strategy to help insure the many Americans who can benefit from these advances will be able to do so.

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## Teach your children how to save selves

As the holidays near and Yuletide abounds, it's a good time to review with your children the basic fire safety behaviors that could save their lives in a fire emergency.

Stop, Drop and Roll. This is the most effective technique for extinguishing clothing and body fires—and it's easy to teach. Remember a child's instinct, if clothing catches on fire, will be to run to you for instructions or make a beeline for the bathroom with the idea of using the shower to put the fire out. Either tactic can be fatal.

Teach kids to: STOP—Don't run—if only fans the flames. DROP—Fire burns up so if you lay down, the fire can spread less quickly and is less likely to attack the face. ROLL—Roll from side to side until the fire is out. Older children-age five and above—can learn the technique. Teach the child to crawl when smoke is present, to crawl to a pre-arranged place outside such as a tree or lamp post, and wait until others escape. 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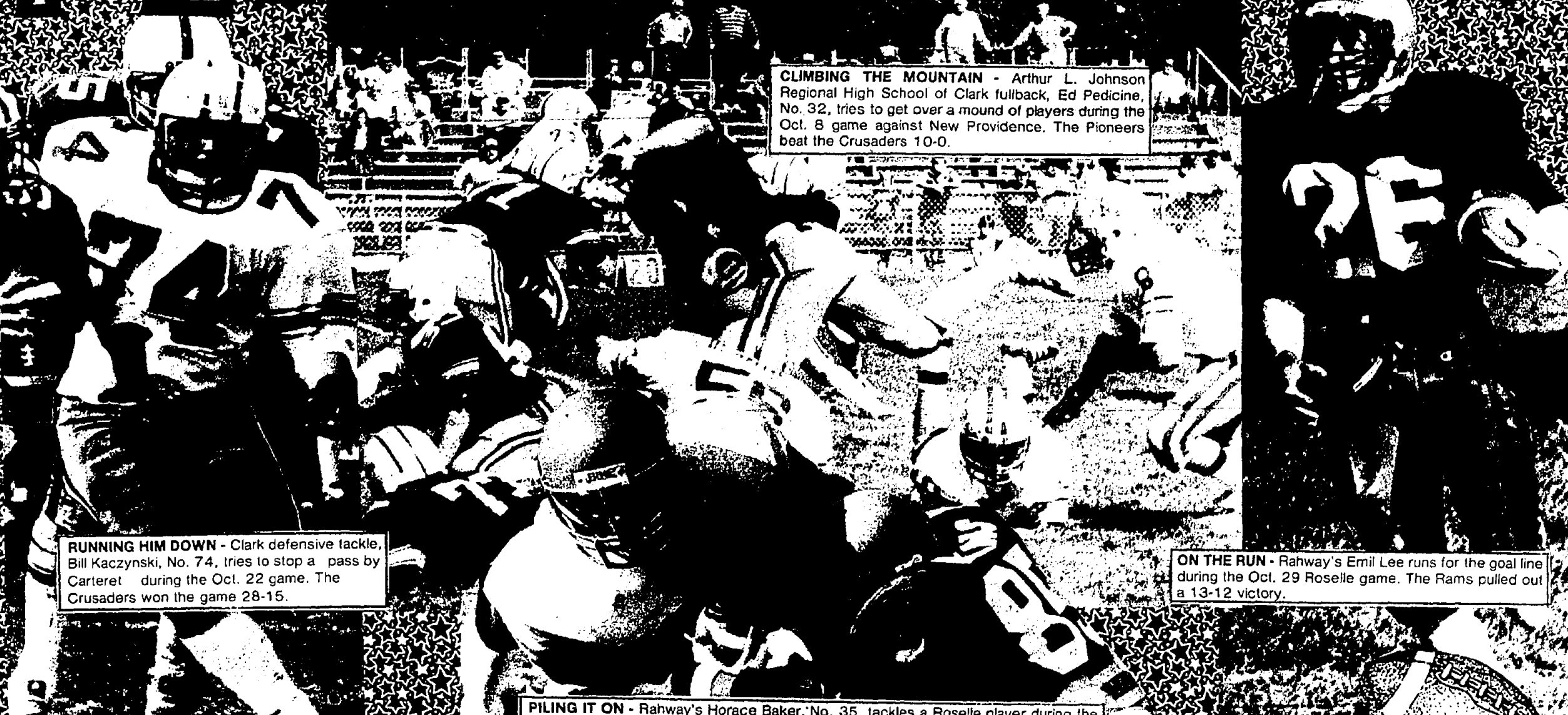

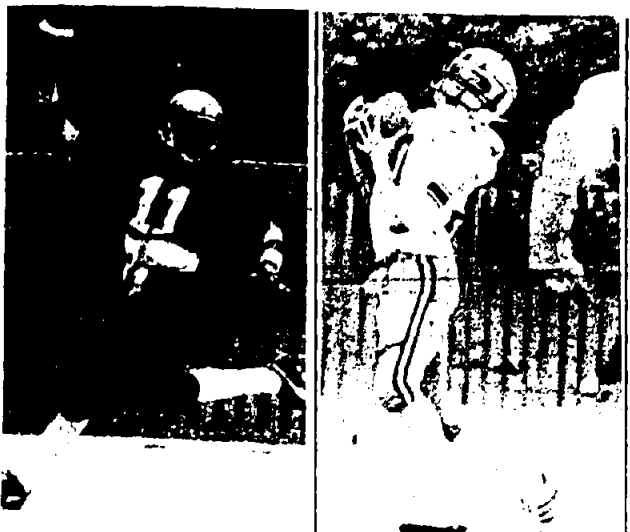
