A part of the realization of the dream of three comrades in search of greater recognition for America's most distinguished military heroes came to fruition on Nov. 7 when the Union County Congressional Medal of Honor Library was dedicated.

According to Paul Angelo of Rahway, the supervisor of veterans affairs for Union County; the library is part of a continuing effort by himself and his two "partners," Raymond L. Collins of Alexandria, Va., a trustee for the Medal of Honor Historical Society, and Sister Maria Veronica, the supervisor of the United States Medal of Honor Archives maintained by the Freedoms Foundation in

Valley Forge, Pa. Mr. Angelo told The Rahway News-Record and The Clark Patriot the federal government's effort to begin and maintain a listing of Medal of Honor recipients began with President Harry Truman's directive to do so and was heightened when President Gerald Ford in 1976 issued an edict to have the graves of Medal of Honor winners

designated with special markers. the supervisor of veterans' affairs, the government does not maintain a list of the birthplaces or burial sites of the medal winners. A major part of this effort comes from Mr. Angelo, whose main sources of information are Mr. Collins

He added the discovery of one grave and the pursuit of the history of one medal winner will often help him get on the trail of another American hero honored for gallantry "above and driven back behind Union beyond the call of duty,' but forgotten for a time because records have been misplaced or family members have died.

Teach your children how to save selves

By Rahway Fire Chief James T. Heller As the holidays near and Yule finery abounds, it's a good time to review with your children the basic fire safev behaviors that could save their lives in a fire emergen-

Stop, Drop and Roll. This is the most effective ord and The Clark Patriot technique for extinguishing clothing and body fires-and it's easy to teach. Remember a child's instinct, if clothing ters to the editor or political catches on fire, will be either to run to you for instructions or make a beeline for the bathroom with the idea of using the shower to put the fire out. > STOP-Don't run-it only fans the flames. DROP-Fire burns up-so if you lay down, the fire n spread less quickly and is less likely to attack the face. ROLL-Roll from side to side until the fire is out. Young children don't need to know the reasons why ust drill with them, frequently, in short sessions. Have them do the behavior...until anywhere, anytime you can say, "What do we do when our clothes are on fire?" and be rewarded by the sight of your youngster performing the life-saving gyrations

> Stay Low and Go. This handy, memorable phrase describes the way to escape from a burning, smoke-filled building. Teach the child to crawl when smoke is present...to crawl to a pre-arranged place outside such as a tree or lamp post, and wait right there until others escape. The rationale for Stay Low and Go is, of course, smoke rises, so the best air remains near the floor. Older children-age five and above-can learn quite detailed techniques for home escape. In the event of a fire that strikes at night the child should be taught to do the

following when the smoke detector sounds Roll out of bed (without sitting up) to the floor and crawl to the door. Feel the door-if it's hot, fire is outside! If it's cool, open with care and crawl outside to the meeting place. If the door is hot, escape through the window using escape ladders if necessary. Of course, this training pre-supposes you've installed escape ladders on your second-story bedroom windows and you have a smoke detector in service. If you still haven't installed a smoke detector go out right now and give yourself one for Christmas. (P. S. Santa Claus won't mind if you open it and put it up before Dec. 25.)
