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## Board views \$3.1 million bond referendum on renovations for Rahway High School

Several Rahway Board of Education members and school administrators as well as school representatives and architectural firm spokesmen came together on Dec. 1 during a special meeting of the school body to examine a tentative budget breakdown for the Rahway High School renovations project.

The Board scrutinized a significantly pared budget for the proposed renovations to the high school as compared to a \$5.9 million bond issue placed before and defeated by the city's voters in February and April of this year.

According to Board Secretary Anthony Rocco, renovation work eliminated from the original \$5,990,000 bond issue would be funded by a series of five-to-10-year capital outlay projects.

He said, while referring to a budget of necessities, the renovations to the physical education department were not incorporated into the total cost of the bond package nor were the modifications to the music department, science laboratories or auditorium. He explained the Board had "to look at what was necessary and what the public would accept," adding the school body was eyeing an amount from \$2.7 to \$3 million.

Under the proposed plan exterior building repairs, including repoint brick work; wall repair or replacement; installing aluminum insulating windows in the original 1938 portion of the building; construction of an entryway for the handicapped and roof expansion joint repair, would total about \$446,000.

Miscellaneous interior repairs, including lighting work; toilet room renovations; provision of handicapped services; electrical repairs; hall locker repairs; installing smoke-partition doors and exterior door work, would amount to \$700,500.

The largest expenditure of \$1,706,000 would fund mechanical repairs to the building's heating and ventilating system.

This would include the upgrading of the existing system to comply with code and energy requirements and the conversion to hot water, unit ventilators and piping and temperature controls.

The installation of three new hot water boilers with combination gas and oil burners would complete repairs to the heating system.

The Board's decision was guided by an appointed committee comprised of various community members and educators who were enlisted to study the issue and convey feedback to the school body.

In the view of Board member, Louis Rizzo, who was a committee participant, the education body should not go "beyond \$3 million in order to comply with the committee's recommendations."

## Choral Club marks jubilee with concert

The Rahway Choral Club will celebrate its 50th anniversary on Monday, Dec. 12, at 8:15 p.m., when it gives its Annual Christmas Concert at St. Paul's Parish House at 80 Elm Ave., Rahway.

Earle Hartmann is the director and Miss Elizabeth Maury is the accompanist. Former members may attend. Tickets will be available at the door.

It was in the spring of 1933 the Rahway Men's Glee Club and the Rahway Women's Choral Club gave a joint concert under the direction of Melvin Reed. Miss Margaret Collyer served as the accompanist. The chorus was sponsored by the Rahway Elks and proceeds benefited the Crippled Kiddies' Fund of the Elks.

The Men's Glee Club disbanded, but the Women's Choral Club continued giving concerts and was for a time under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Weinheimer. Mr. Hartmann became the director in 1947.

Mrs. Earl Walters accompanied the group for a number of years. Miss Maury, a local piano teacher, has been the accompanist since 1957. She was also a member of the original chorus in 1933.

The Women's Choral Club belonged to the National Federation of Music Clubs and performed many times in the annual festivals of that organization.

For most of the 50 years, two concerts were given annually—one in the spring and the other at Christmas time. The songs have included religious and secular music. A selected group of men interested in singing joined the group, at each spring concert making full harmony in the presentation of show tunes, reports a spokeswoman.

In December, 1970 the participating men joined the Women's Choral Club officially and the new club became the Rahway Choral Club. Thomas Cregge is the current president.

A display of past events will be posted at the concert on Dec. 12. Audience carol singing will be included.

The chorus will sing "Gloria in Excelsis" by Vivaldi; Martens, "L'Espérance," a French Christmas carol; "Born in a Manger" by S. Rogers with soprano soloist, Virginia Pierson; Sicilian Bagpipers' Carol" by K. Davis; "The Carol of the Star" by H. Simeone and "Gesu Bambino" by P. Yon, with Jean Trolaro, a soprano, as the soloist.

Also: "Angels are Singing" by Coggins; "The Bell Song" by G. Young; "Glad Tidings" by D. Wagner; "It's Christmas Once Again" by H. Simeone; "Let's Have an Old-Fashioned Christmas" by J. Herman and "The Twelve Days After Christmas" by Frederick Silver.

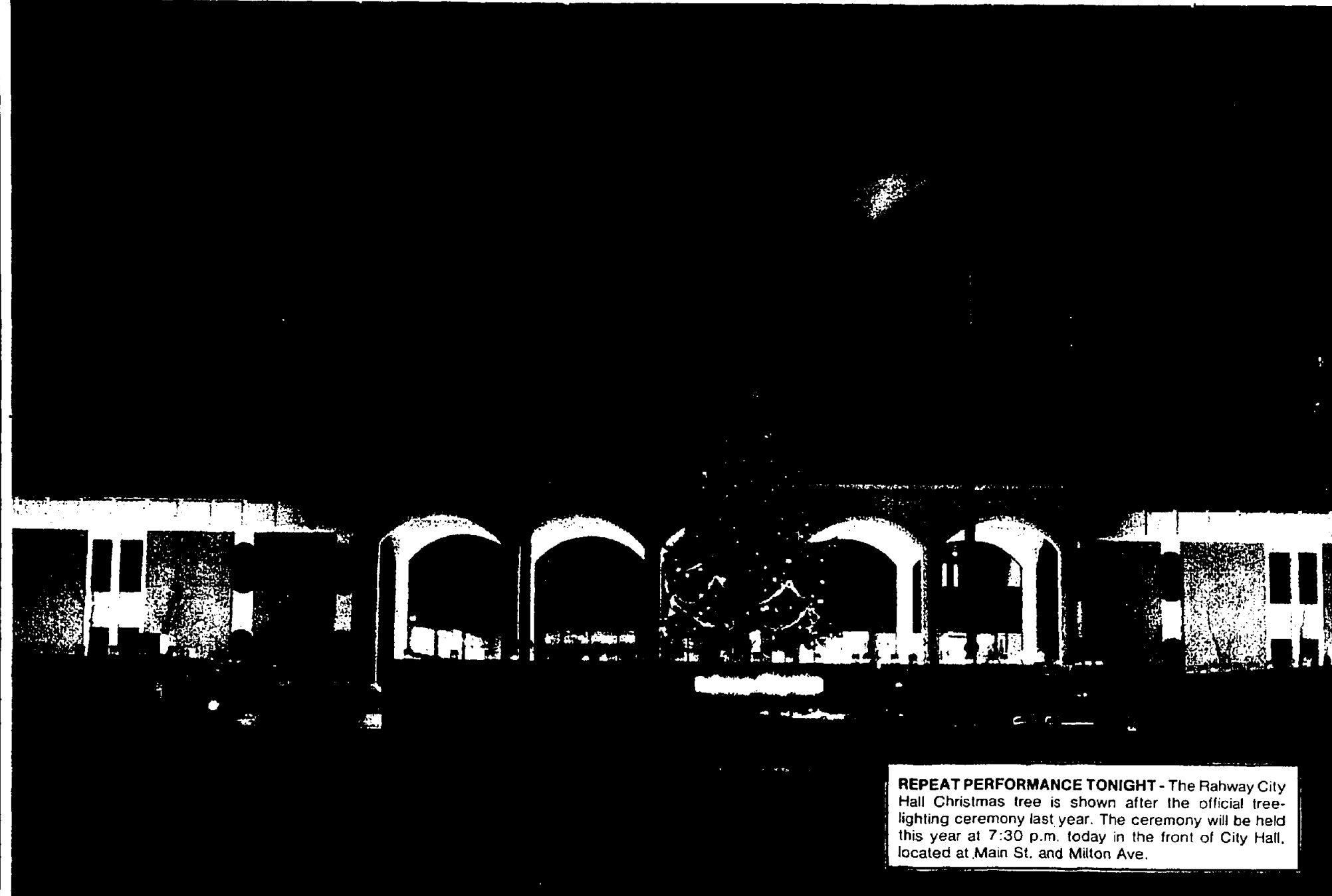
Christmas carols and music will add to the celebrations.

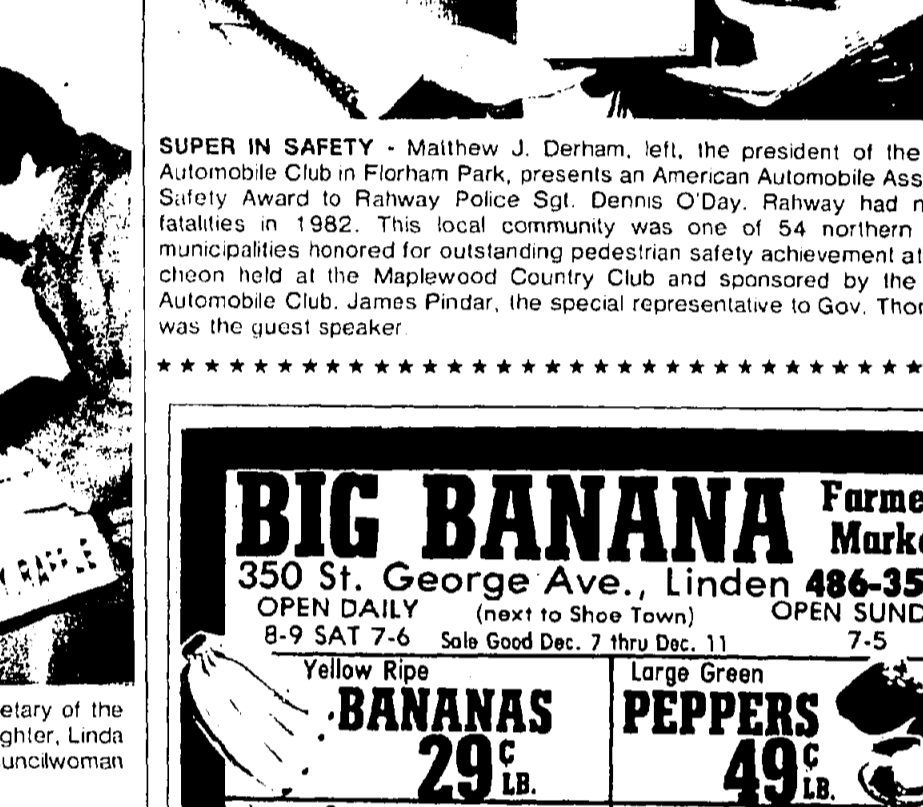


Choral society to perform 'Messiah'

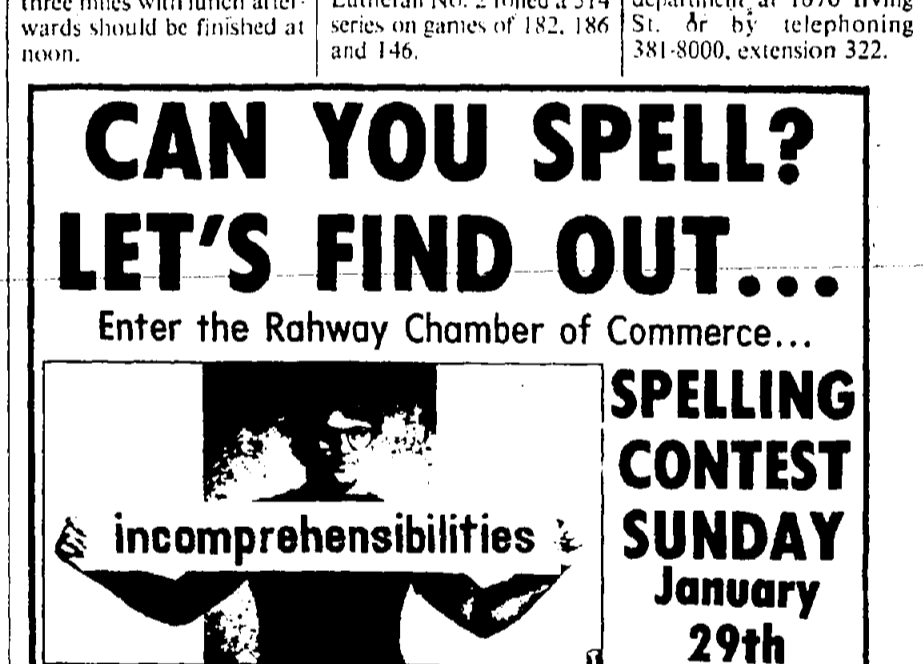

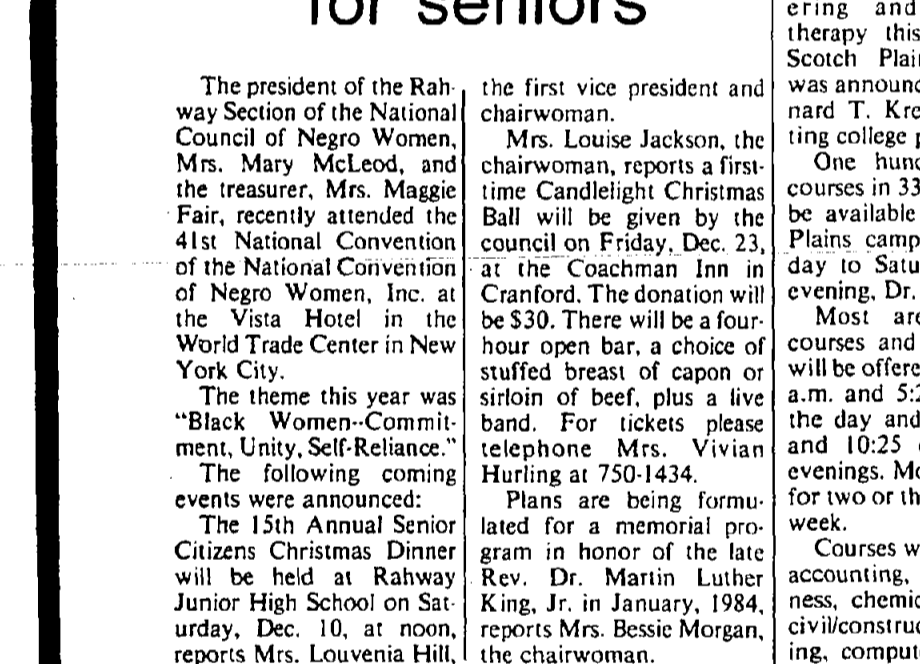

And you don't have to worry about zealous alumni paying players to attend their school.

Rutgers, in fact, has just the right talent to be a major power in Division I-A, and 19,000 fans a game would be a nice crowd. In Division I-A, Rutgers could give New Jersey a winning football team.

Can Rutgers afford the big time?

Dr. Edward Bloustein did not come to be president of Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, by being stingy.

He is, after all, a doctor of both philosophy and jurisprudence, a Fulbright Scholar, a Phi Beta Kappa and the former president of Bennington College, that place in Vermont that shows up every year near or at the top of the list of the most expensive places to send your kids to for four years.

That's why it was so surprising to hear Bloustein took a seat last week at the table with David A. "Sonny" Werblin and with a straight face announced Rutgers was going to be the big time to more would it be a second-tier school fighting and scratching the likes of Princeton. Rutgers would go after the big game, and to do that, a new coach, Frank Burns, was installed, and the schedule was upgraded with the likes of Penn State, West Virginia, Boston College, Pitt, Tennessee and Alabama.

Perhaps Bloustein thought that would be enough. But as the big schools came onto the schedule and the little schools dropped off the team's record tumbled downhill at a merry clip until this year the Scarlet Knights finished 3-6, losing to every Division I-A school on the schedule.

In the process, Rutgers learned a reality of big-time college football. Despite a merry clip until this year Rutgers lost \$300,000 on football this year.

Average attendance at home games was 19,000, and total ticket sales for home games came in the amount of \$750,000. The University of Michigan makes more at a single home game.

Obviously, apathy was running deep. "Good old Rutgers," the "Big Red," the "State U."

So, two weeks ago, Bloustein found himself taking a merry clip on the road to the ABC Game of the Week. That was the ceremonial statement, he got it, the coach, Frank Burns, a hard-working, loud and decidedly uncharismatic alumnus who simply did not have a big enough name to build a big program.

The second step was announced by Werblin and Bloustein on Nov. 30. To be brief, the step amounts to \$5 million, which is the cost of the basics expected of a major college football team. artificial turf, practice field, a fieldhouse and 6,000 more seats in the venerable Rutgers half-pipe in Piscataway.

The money, Bloustein emphasized, was out there, presumably in the pockets of wealthy alumni who are as eager as Werblin to see Rutgers crack the Top 20.

Now Werblin is looking for a coach with a name big enough to attract athletes big enough to stand up in the likes of Penn State.

That, of course, will cost a bit more than the \$50,000 or so Burns was making. Knowledgeable football people say \$100,000 is a nice starting figure.

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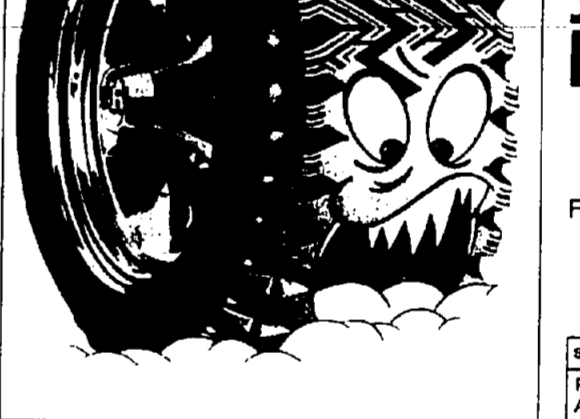

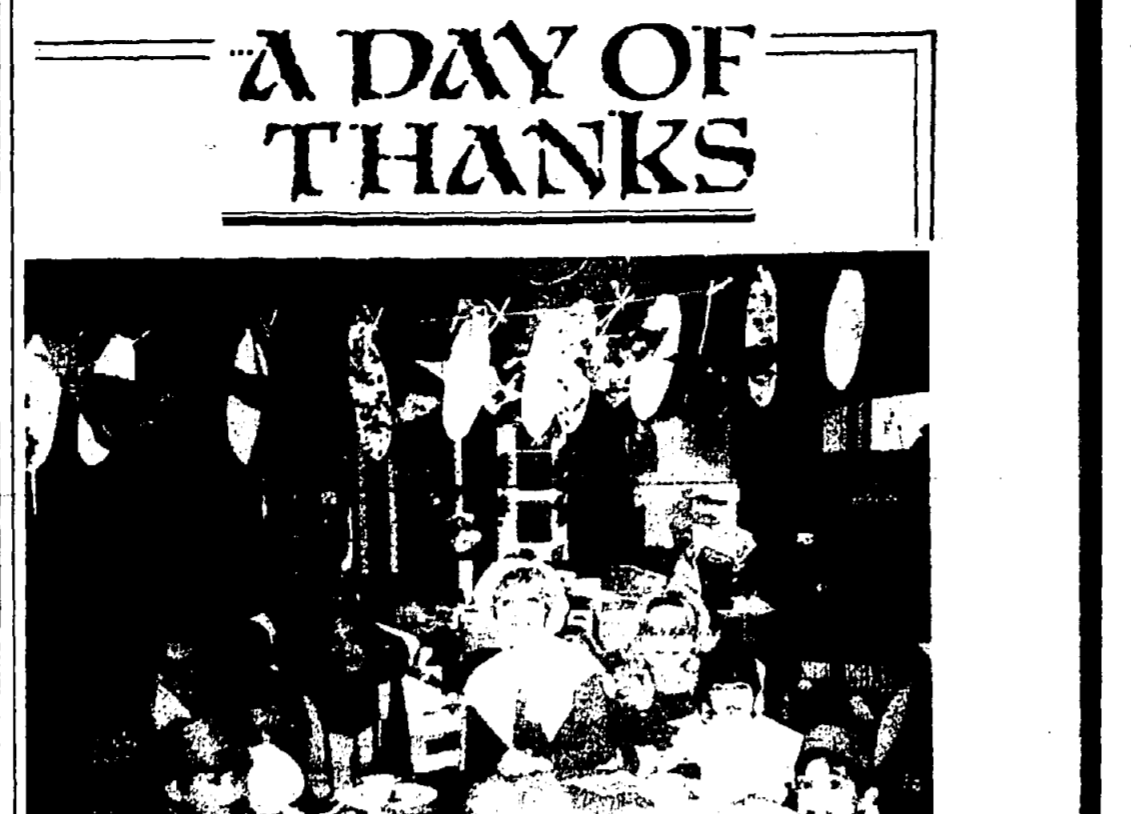

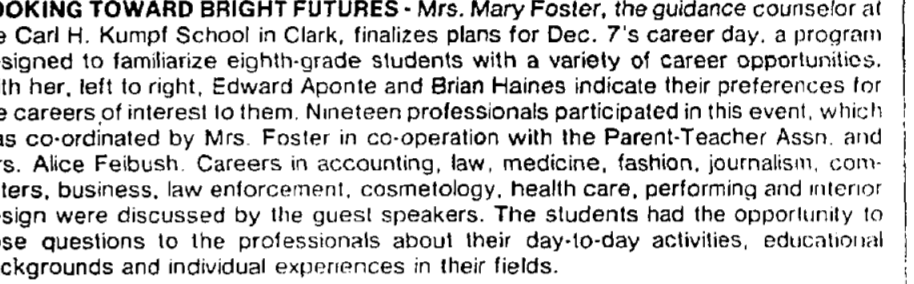
